McGee's offensive display spa

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MANSFIELD — Jay McGee has not turned back the hands of time but somewhere along the line in 1991, the Randolph Oiler running back has discovered the fountain of youth.

McGee continued his assault on Eastern Football League defenses by rushing for 161 yards to lead the Oilers to a 36-10 victory over the Hockomock Colts on Saturday

"It is just like Jay McGee is 18years old and running in the

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Brockton High backfield again," said Randolph coach Bob Turner, "We got excellent blocking all night especially from our fullbacks and he (McGee) just took care of the rest."

It was a shootout at the OK Corral in the first half as both teams had the offensive juices flowing. Hockomock had 13 first downs and a 105-yard performance from sensational running back Bernard Wiley in the first half. But the Colts could only muster a field goal from Scott Ross.

The Oilers were also on the move in the first half as McGee

(122 first-half yards) and Mike Waite (59) steamrolled through the Hockomock defense. The Oilers unlike the Colts turned that yardage into points.

Wiley began the night with a beautiful 52-yard run zig-zagging through the Oilers' defense to the Randolph 20. However, the drive stalled there and Hockomock settled for a 35-yard field goal by Ross.

Randolph wasted little time on its first possesion as Waite broke free for a 39-yard gain before blasting up the middle untouched for a 6-yard touchdown run. No Oilers game is complete this season without one superb play from Mark Harding and their fans did not have to wait long to see it. On a punt return, Harding took a handoff from a teammate at the 18, followed a wall of blockers down the right sidelines and dared the Colts to catch him. Hockomock could not as Harding's 82-yard punt return gave Randolph a 15-3

lead at the quarter.

It was a night of frustration for the Colts as two promising first quarter drives could only result in three points. That frustration mounted in the second.

A Wiley 10-yard run and 13-yard pass recpetion started yet another potential Colts scoring drive. Hockomock quarterback Fred Beissner hit Jon O'Brien who gave every indication that he would go the final 37-yards for the score. However, O'Brien was hit right before the goal line and Randolph's Lester Pina recovered the fumble in the end zone to end the Colts'

Randolph held that 15-3 lead into the third when John Pina made his first pass completion of the evening count. He hit Brian Heffernan in the right flat where Heffernan proceeded to blaze into the end zone untouched, 22-3.

Hockomock responded with a Mike Mulgrew 25-yard touchdown reception but the Colts could not convert the score into a momentum changer. Bubba Pina intercpeted a pass late in the third quarter. John Pina turned that turnover into a score as he hit Ricky Witt on a 31-yard timing pattern.
