Jones will work with private landowners across the southwest portion of the state helping them with wildlife and habitat management planning and securing funds to help implement those plans. "He will be a tremendous asset to WRE managers in the area as well as the Farm Bill Biologist team."

While there, he served as president of the student chapter of The Wildlife Society. His passion for wetland ecosystems stemmed from an internship at Loess Bluffs National Wildlife Refuge during his senior year.
