District Selects Next Leader of Curriculum and Instruction

The Brentwood School District Board of Education voted on March 26 to hire Dr. Ronni Zagora as the district's next assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction, effective July 1, 2024. Dr. Zagora currently serves as the executive director of secondary education in Lindbergh Schools. "Dr. Zagora's exceptional expertise and



dedication to delivering high-quality, real-world learning experiences for all students and staff closely aligns with the priorities and objectives outlined in our new strategic plan," said Dr. Amy Zielinski, incoming superintendent of schools. "Her passion for teaching and learning will enrich the educational experience in Brentwood, making her an invaluable member of our leadership team."

Dr. Zagora brings 18 years of educational experience to her new role at Brentwood, including nine years as a district administrator responsible for curriculum development, professional learning and student programming. She began her career as a social studies teacher and department chair at Lindbergh High School, and later served as Lindbergh's director of curriculum and student programs.

As the executive director of secondary education in Lindbergh, Dr. Zagora manages the development and implementation of middle and high school curriculum, as well as professional learning opportunities for secondary teachers. She supervises and supports middle and high school principals and instructional coaches, and advises district leadership on policy and legal matters related to student services.

Dr. Zagora has been instrumental in developing and expanding college credit opportunities for Lindbergh High School students, including Early College and Dual Credit partnerships with St. Louis Community College. She also represents Lindbergh as part of the Success-Ready Students Network, a statewide initiative to design a better way for each student to engage in meaningful learning, demonstrate individual growth and prepare for future success.

As a member of Brentwood's administrative leadership team, Dr. Zagora will oversee all programs and services directly impacting student learning, growth and achievement, including curriculum development, instructional effectiveness, assessment and professional development.

"I am thrilled to join the Brentwood team and become a part of this wonderful community," said Dr. Zagora. "I look forward to building relationships with students, staff, families and community members, and helping contribute to the continued success of the Brentwood School District."

Dr. Zagora earned her doctorate in educational leadership from Maryville University. She also holds a master's degree in teaching from Washington University in St. Louis, and a bachelor's degree in international studies and Spanish from American University in Washington, D.C. She and her husband, Tony, have three children - Jamie, Teddy and Marty.

leadership and teamwork, and build community by connecting with like-minded high school students."



Secondary Math Teachers Share Innovative Practices

Valley Park School District math teachers recently visited the Brentwood middle and high school campus in preparation for their upcoming curriculum review process. Visitors were particularly interested in Brentwood's "Building Thinking Classrooms" approach, which focuses on critical thinking, creativity and collaboration to help students practice and master math concepts.

"The goal is to move beyond traditional memorization techniques, where students simply repeat information without truly understanding it," said Dr. Alex Tripamer, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction.

"It's inspiring to see educators from other districts recognize the impact our innovative teaching methods have on student learning, growth and achievement."

The Valley Park team observed four Brentwood educators over two weeks, including Natalie Sellers and Marissa St. Clair at Brentwood Middle School, and Jerry Schmidt and Dr. Kaitlynn Jansen at Brentwood High School.

During their observations, visitors experienced learning environments filled with thought-provoking questions, student-led discussions and collaborative problem-solving activities that reinforced the individualized learning of each student. Schmidt also highlighted the unique classroom structure that promotes student engagement.

"Students work in visibly random groups, standing at whiteboards instead of sitting individually, in a decentered classroom," explained Schmidt. "The structure of where students are thinking and with whom is an important piece of the puzzle."

"Our middle and high school math team does an excellent job of engaging students and drilling down the core concepts outlined in the Missouri Learning Standards," added Dr. Tripamer. "We appreciate Natalie, Marissa, Jerry and Kaitlynn for opening their classrooms and sharing their expertise."

souri Scholars 100 Program. This statewide initiative, organized by the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals (MoASSP), honors and celebrates the academic accomplishments of 100 outstanding students from the Class of 2024.

"This recognition is a testament to Amelia's exceptional character, hard work and positive impact on those around her," said Dr. Ed Johnson, BHS principal. "She serves as an inspiration to her peers and a shining example of what it means to excel both academically and as a leader."

Each year, schools across Missouri are invited to nominate candidates for this prestigious award. The selection process uses a formula incorporating the student's grade-point average and ACT or SAT scores. Nominees must also meet the criteria of an "Academic Decathlon," showcasing scholastic proficiency in 10 challenging academic events.

To be eligible, students must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.750, achieve a minimum ACT score of 29 or a minimum SAT score of 1,280, rank in the top 10% of their class and engage in advanced coursework in mathematics, science, English and world language. Additionally, students are expected to demonstrate excellent attendance, active extracurricular participation and exemplary citizenship.

"The Missouri Scholars 100 Program is one of the premier academic recognition programs in the country," said Clark Mershon, executive director of MoASSP. "Students selected

Ten questions the Cardinals will need to answer this season

If the Cardinals are going to bounce back from their last-place finish in 2023, almost every aspect of the team will have to be better than it was a year ago.

Specifically, the answers to these 10 questions likely will determine whether the Cardinals are still playing in October or once again fall short of the playoffs:

Can Sonny Gray be an ace?

The biggest bet the Cardinals' front office made over the winter was on Gray, signing him to a three-year contract to become their top starter. It's not ideal that he will be on the injured list on opening day, but the team's expectation is that he should not miss more than one or two starts because of his hamstring strain.

In the 30-plus starts that Gray hopes to make, he has to log innings, he has to give the Cardinals a chance to win and he has to be able to be a stopper and prevent long losing streaks – all ingredients of an ace. Even though wins have been devalued in recent years, for Gray to prove he belongs in the elite category, he needs to reach or come close to 20 victories. The last Cardinal to win 20 games in a season was Adam Wainwright in 2010, and they have only had four pitchers win at least 17 games in the last 13 years.

Will Nolan Arenado and Paul Goldschmidt hit?

The team's two cornerstone infielders weren't happy with their performance in 2023, and both know they will need to produce more this season. In Goldschmidt's case, he also had a very poor spring which leaves him with even more to prove as the regular-season begins.

The Cardinals have tried to surround Arenado and Goldschmidt with talented young players, but despite their potential, this team still will rise or fall in large part based on how well their two veterans perform. The team is looking for 30 homers, 100 RBIs and a .300 average from both.

What did manager Oli Marmol learn from last year's failures?

Marmol talked often over the winter, and also this spring, about all of the "self-evaluation" he underwent following the 91-loss season in 2023. Now it's time to see what changes that will produce.

Marmol won't have quite the pressure on him that might have been the case if the team had not given him a two-year contract extension this spring. The extension, however, won't produce more wins on the field by itself. Any manager ultimately is judged by the team's record and the scrutiny on Marmol won't go away if the team has another poor season – with or without his new contract.

Is Jordan Walker ready for a breakout season?

One of the team's mistakes last season was mishandling Walker, who was sent back to the minors when there was no reason to make that move. Walker comes into this season as the established starter in right field, and while he is still learning the position and will make mistakes, the Cardinals primarily are counting on his bat being productive enough that they can live with his occasional defensive flaws. Walker should be more comfortable this season, based on how much he learned last year, and a consistent role should let him improve on 2023's total of 16 homers, 51 RBIs and a .276 average.

What impact will Victor Scott II have?

A week into the 1985 season, an injury to Willie McGee opened a spot on the Cardinals' roster for 23-year-old rookie speedster Vince Coleman. Coleman used that break to start running his way toward 110 stolen bases and the NL Rookie of the Year award. Could the same thing happen this season with Scott, also 23, who made the opening day roster because of an injury to Dylan Carlson?

Scott has played only 163 games in the minors, none above Double A, and as recently as June 25 of last year was playing in Class A Peoria, on his way toward tying for the minor-league lead with 94 stolen bases. He also won a Gold Glove. Scott will get a chance to play, and even if he is hitting ninth, he could provide a major spark to the lineup – if the team will turn him loose on the bases.

Should fans be worried about the new rotation?

The front office's off-season quest to add "pitching, pitching, pitching" led to the signing of three free agent starters – Gray, Lance Lynn and Kyle Gibson – all veterans with a history of eating innings, to go with returning starters Miles Mikolas and Steven Matz.

Zack Thompson used Gray's injury and a strong spring to wedge himself into the rotation. It will be interesting to see how long he stays there when Gray returns. After a rough stint in Florida, Gibson offered a glimmer of hope in his final pre-season start in Arizona, allowing only one run, no walks and striking out nine in five innings against the Cubs.

Did the off-season moves improve the bullpen?

One of the reasons the Cardinals suffered so many blown saves in 2023 – in games which they actually led – was an injury that took Ryan Helsley out of that role. If he is healthy, that alone should make the relief corps better. Helsley also figures to have a much-improved supporting cast, even if one of the off=season additions, Keynan Middleton, will begin the year on the injured list with a forearm strain.

The three other newcomers, Andrew Kittredge, Riley O'Brien and Ryan Fernandez, all right-handers, join holdovers Giovanny Gallegos, JoJo Romero and Andre Pallante, with Matthew Liberatore earning the final spot, at least for now.

Who will get the most starts in the third spot in the batting order?

If, and that is a big two-letter word, Goldschmidt is in the second spot and Arenado fourth, and they are hitting, this spot could be one of the best places to hit of any lineup in the majors. It seems tailor-made for lefthanded-hitting Nolan Gorman, who has proven he can hit against lefthanders, has improved his plate discipline and should be the team's best power hitter.

In the 112 games when Donovan did not hit in the leadoff spot, his replacements scored a combined 70 runs. One of the changes that Marmol has said he wants to make this season is to bring more stability to both the defensive positioning and the batting order. Sticking Gorman in the third spot and leaving him there would be a good place to start.

When will Nootbaar, Edman and Carlson be able to play, and what will their roles be when they return?

The easiest part of this question to answer concerns Nootbaar, expected back in mid-April. He will return to his projected spot as the starting leftfielder, with Donovan moving back into his role as the DH/second baseman/Swiss Army knife, playing wherever he is needed.

The future for Edman and Carlson, when they return, isn't quite as clear and likely depends mostly on how Scott is playing or if the team is dealing with another injury. Both could find themselves regulated to a backup role with limited opportunities.







Three-time National Jewish Book Award recipient will headline the third Annual Staenberg Lecture on April 15, in partnership with the St. Louis Kaplan Feldman Holocaust Museum.

The Annual Staenberg Lecture, presented by Maryville University in partnership with the St. Louis Kaplan Feldman Holocaust Museum, will take place Monday, April 15, 2024, at The Factory in Chesterfield, Missouri.

The event will feature noted author and podcaster Dara Horn. Named one of the "Best Young American Novelists" by Granta Magazine (2007), she has published five novels along with her highly acclaimed book, People Love Dead Jews: Reports from a Haunted Present (Norton 2021). This collection of essays takes on the crisis of antisemitism with clarity and insight, along with Horn's trademark humor; setting the table for critical conversations among Jews and non-Jews alike. She also hosts a companion podcast series for the book.

Horn's nonfiction pieces have been featured in The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, The Washington Post, Smithsonian, and numerous other publications. Her books have been translated into twelve languages, and named to lists that included: Notable Books (New York Times); 25 Best Books of the Decade (Booklist), and Best Books of the Year (San Francisco Chronicle). In addition to receiving three National Jewish Book Awards, she has been a finalist for honors including the Kirkus Prize; the Wingate Prize; the Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Fiction, and more.

This will be the third in a series of lectures made possible through a generous commitment to Maryville University from philanthropist Michael Staenberg, and the Staenberg Family Foundation. The five-year series focuses on contemporary social issues through the lens of the Holocaust, its lessons, and its historical significance.

"I am immensely proud of the Annual Staenberg Lecture, a beacon of knowledge and enlightenment in our community," Staenberg said. "It's an honor to support the critical conversations led by remarkable minds like Dara Horn, as we strive to combat hate and prejudice, and foster a more inclusive and understanding society."

Dairy farmers continuously implement strategies to protect the environment



April conjures thoughts of spring and new planting seasons. Along those lines, this month also highlights the importance of protecting the environment with the designation of April as Earth Month. Throughout the United States, industries are developing strategies to positively impact the environment, including the U.S. dairy industry. Dairy farms continuously do more with less and use best practices and innovations to reduce environmental impacts. These practices enhance the farms' economic and social responsibility for the benefit of local communities.

According to the United States Department of Agriculture, family farms comprise 96% of all U.S. farms. Most dairy farms in Missouri and Illinois are family-owned and operated and have fewer than 300 cows. Dairy farmers work where they live and care about protecting the land, water and air for their families, surrounding communities and future generations.

"Dairy farmers work hard at being good stewards of the land and providing excellent animal care," said Maggie Cimarolli, a registered dietitian and nutrition educator with St. Louis District Dairy Council. "As a result of dairy farmers' efforts, the cows produce nutritious milk. Milk provides 13 essential nutrients, including protein, calcium, potassium and vitamin D. Because of this robust nutrition package, the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend three servings of dairy a day. Dairy foods are also an affordable and accessible source of nutrition for many American families."

Dairy farmers are mindful of the planet and are committed to producing nutritious food through responsible practices regulated by federal and state agencies.

Animal care is job No. 1

Healthy cows are happy cows, and happy cows make more milk. Dairy farmers keep their cows happy and healthy by providing clean and comfortable housing, round-theclock access to fresh food and water, and medical attention when necessary. Dairy farmers work with a dedicated team that includes veterinarians, animal nutritionists and environmental consultants.

Manure management

Manure contains nutrients that improve soil quality and crop yield, including nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. When farmers fertilize soil with cow manure, the soil retains 20% more water. This moisture retention supports crop growth, especially during a dry summer season. In addition, dairy farmers reduce costs and contamination of clean ground water when using manure in place of commercial fertilizers.

Water quality is top-of-mind

Precision farming, cover crops and buffer strips protect waterways by reducing nutrient runoff on farmland. Cover crops help with soil erosion, improve soil health, crowd out weeds, control pests and diseases, and increase biodiversity. Buffer strips are protective zones of permanent vegetation between a farm field and a waterway. Buffer strips slow and filter storm runoff, hold soil in place and reduce the amount of harmful chemicals and microbes that enter waterways. State and local government agencies regularly inspect and test the water on dairy farms.

Manure is a renewable fuel

New methane digester technology heats manure and uses bacteria to break it down into methane-rich biogas. This gas is a renewable fuel that can generate electricity. Farms that use this technology generate enough electricity for their farm and more.

Vegetable Frittata

Celebrate spring with this light and delicious vegetable frittata. This versatile recipe is forgiving - use the vegetables and cheese you have on hand. Serve the frittata for breakfast or make breakfast for dinner!

Prep time: 1 hour Servings: 8

Ingredients

8 large eggs ¹/₂ cup milk

- 1/2 tsp. salt, divided
- ¹/₂ tsp. pepper, divided
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese, divided
- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- ¹/₂ red onion, diced
- 1 small sweet potato, chopped
- 1 small zucchini, chopped
- 1 medium red pepper, chopped
- 2 cups baby spinach

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 375°F.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the eggs, milk, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Whisk in ³/₄ cup cheese. Set bowl aside.

Spray the sides and bottom of a 12-inch oven-safe skillet with cooking spray. Add olive oil and heat oil over medium heat. Add the garlic. Stir the garlic as it sautés for 30 to 60 seconds. Do not let the garlic burn.

Add the red onion and sweet potatoes to the skillet. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring the mixture occasionally, until the vegetables begin to soften. Add the zucchini and red peppers. Season the mixture with the remaining salt and pepper. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the spinach; stir the mixture until the spinach wilts.

Pour the egg-and-cheese mixture over the vegetables. Scrape the sides of the pan to ensure all vegetables are in the egg mixture. Cook the mixture for 2-3 minutes, without stirring. Once the mixture begins to bubble and set around the edges, sprinkle the remaining ¹/₄ cup of cheese on top.

Transfer the skillet to the oven and bake for 22 to 26 minutes, or until the frittata is puffy, and the center no longer wobbles.

Remove the skillet from the oven and set on a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes. Slice and serve.





Dairy cows excel at upcycling

Dairy farms upcycle components of crops and food waste from other industries that would otherwise go to a landfill. This includes almond hulls, distiller grains, citrus pulp, soybean meal and cotton seeds. Dairy farmers use these materials, along with corn silage, hay, soybeans and alfalfa, as feed for the cows. Overall, 80% of a cow's diet cannot be consumed by humans. Cows, in turn, convert their feed into nutritious milk.

Dairy farmers reduce, reuse and recycle water

Water recycling is standard practice on a dairy farm. Dairy farmers can reuse water as many as five or six times. For example, farmers use water to keep milk tanks cool and then reuse it as drinking water for the cows. Farmers also use wastewater to flush barns and to irrigate crop fields.





PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

G. Alderman Jeff Gould - Ward 3- Announced that the Communication Committee meeting for March 19th was cancelled and will meet at next regularly scheduled date (April 16th). CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT A. Climate Pollution Reduction Grant

The Parks and Recreation Director shared that last year the East-West Gateway Council announced they were developing a St. Louis climate action plan funded by the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. They were putting together a regional submission for the grant, and funding it - so Sustainability Commission "shot for the moon" by including solar panels on top of the Community Center, EV Trash truck, EV street sweeper, and police vehicles, and charging stations for these vehicles

Now MoDNR is taking over the grant and would be willing to support all of our requests, however, they now are only partially funding this, and want us to take advantage of any tax credits available especially for the solar array which is a 30% credit equaling \$160,000. They want us to take advantage of public charging stations (they pay 90% for public and only 60% for private). They have asked for a quick turn-around and we would need to submit it by the deadline tomorrow, so grant can be completed and submitted by April 1st. We anticipate we will receive the ITC solar credit, and if we do the public charging stations, then our obligation for these two projects would be about \$199,000 as the city commitment. We would pay for this with FEMA money (when approved).
