Monument to Evans-Howard Place Dedicated

In February 2019, as part of the celebration of Brentwood's Centennial, a group of people gathered at the Brentwood Recreation Center to celebrate their old neighborhood. These were the proud residents of the Evans-Howard Place neighborhood, a primarily African-American area located just east of Brentwood Boulevard. It has been the site of the Promenade commercial development since 1997.

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At that 2019 reunion, the former residents spoke proudly of this thriving neighborhood, filled with families, churches, a school, stores, and a sense of community. There was a rock with a plaque recognizing the community at the south entrance to the Promenade, but many thought a better and more prominent monument would be appropriate.

Soon after the "family reunion" in 2019, a committee of interested people formed and began working on plans for a new monument. The committee included: Dan Fitzgerald (president of the Brentwood Historical Society); Ed Holt (former resident and President of the Evans Place Improvement Association); Beth Miller Erman (Brentwood resident and author of a master's thesis on the area); Allison Reed (Brentwood resident who lived in Evans Place); and Ed Wright, Jr. (Brentwood resident and former alderman for the area).

After years of planning and design and with Dan's leadership, the committee was able to get commitments from the owners of the Promenade and the City of Brentwood to construct, install and maintain a new monument on Rose Avenue at the west entrance to the Promenade. On July 8th at 10 am, a crowd gathered to dedicate the new monument.

The monument features brick pillars in recognition of the Evans and Howard Fired Brick Company, which was located in what









is now Hanley Industrial Court. Also included are photographs of landmarks of the neighborhood such as L'Ouverture School, churches, and family homes plus an aerial view of the thriving neighborhood at its heyday. There will be a pathway to make viewing of the monument easier.

The crowd on the 8th included many former residents along with other interested parties. Alderman Brandon Wegge made remarks along with Dan Fitzgerald. Perhaps the most relevant and on-point remarks were by former resident, Allison Reed. As she emphasized the family atmosphere in Evans-Howard Place, Allison recited dozens of names of former residents. "We were all family. We watched out for each other and we miss that neighborhood." Allison remarked

Former residents gathered in front of the monument to cut the ribbon and formerly dedicate it. Many then lingered to examine the photos and to spin around pointing out where their homes were and who lived where "back in the day". It is hoped that people driving into the Promenade will pause and note the new monument-a monument to a neighborhood that was an important part of the Brentwood community for many years and will live on in our memory.

RESTAURANT REVIEWS

Authentic South Of The Border Dining in Bridgeton



La Tejana Taqueria is the real deal when it comes to Mexican culinary delights and the best part is that it is very affordable! We honestly felt like we could be in a family restaurant somewhere in Mexico.

This is not a fancy, gourmet restaurant. It is more reminiscent of a place off the main street of a small Mexican village. Casual dress is totally acceptable. This is a place that is welcome to everyone. And when you see goat soup on the menu, you know this is not Taco Bell!

La Tejana Taqueria is located on Lindbergh Blvd, about a mile south of I-70. If you are going south on Lindbergh exit at the Whitehall Manor U-turn exit. Turn right and then turn left in the strip mall area. If you are coming North on Lindbergh, take the Whitehall Manor U-turn exit and follow the same directions.

We began with the complimentary homemade chips and salsa and a mandatory Margarita. It was very tasty and larger than we expected. I had to try the goat soup. It was



a very rich clear broth with tender goat meat, and garbonzo beans. It comes with a side dish of chopped onions, chunks of lime, green peppers and parsley. I have had grilled goat at Indian restaurants that had a strong, umami taste, but this soup had a very mild taste with a hearty broth. This would be a great winter warm

up experience. I actually added some ground dry spices that were on the table to give it a bit of a boost. You should definitely try this. The



small bowl was almost a meal, so the large bowl would easily be a main dish.

Other condiments on the table were a green hot sauce and a red hot sauce. The green sauce was medium hot, but the red sauce had to have been a recipe from J. Robert Oppenheimer, the father of the atomic bomb!

I also had the Carne Asada plate. This was another larger than expected dish of flat-iron grilled flank steak with grilled green and yellow pep-



pers and onions. It was perfectly spiced and I brought home enough for another meal for two. Side items were re-fried beans and Mexican rice, neither of which came from a can and homemade tortillas.

Sue had two ala-carte fish tacos with lettuce and cheese, and were just what she wanted.

In the interest of journalism, we felt we had to try



a dessert. La Tejana Taqueria's Tres Leche Cake. It is a white cake made of cream, condensed milk and whole milk and is layered with raspberry jam and whipped cream. One piece



was more than enough for two people. Needless to say, it was delicious!

The total bill, including taxes was \$48.97, \$10.49 of which was the goat soup! La Tejana Taqueria is definitely affordable

Our server was very efficient, but not very chatty, as she apparently was not well versed in English. This was not a problem, and again, made us feel like we may actually be in a restaurant somewhere in Mexico.

They also have a Mexican grocery store and a liquor store as well. They are a one-stop shop for Mexican delights.

Bevo Mill: Cheddar Cheese & Chive Biscuits

Cheddar cheese & chive biscuits were a favorite at the Bevo Mill. Some customers came in just for the biscuits, which could be purchased for carry-out.

Yield: About 2 1/2 dozen biscuits

Ingredients

2 lb flour

2 tsp salt

4 1/2 Tbsp baking powder

2/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup dried chives

3/4 cup cheddar cheese, grated

1/2 cup oil

2/3 cup margarine, melted

2 3/4 cup milk

Preparation

Mix all the dry ingredients together thoroughly. Add the margarine and oil while mixing until all the oils are mixed in. Add the mild and kneed just until the mix pulls away from the side of the bowl. Do not over-mix.

Drop onto an ungreased baking pan from a large spoon. Each biscuit should weigh about 2 oz. Cook on a 400° F oven for about 20 minutes until done.

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Casa Gallardo: Perfect Guacamole

"So simple," said Ramon Gallardo, the owner of Casa Gallardo. "You take the avocado out of the shell, add a little onion, a little tomato. How simple is that? Yet people mess it up."

The problem, he said, is that Americans want to grind everything in a blender or food processor. They want their food to be smooth.

"But perfect guacamole is never smooth. It has lumps of chilis, lumps of guacamole. Our guacamole never sees the inside of a blender."

Yield: 1 serving

Ingredients

2 Tbsp minced onion

1 medium jalapeno

1 garlic clove, minced (optional)

2 tsp chopped fresh coriander

Juice of 1/2 lime

2 large, ripe avocados, halved, seeded and peeled

1 large tomato, peeled, seeded and chopped

Lime juice

Taco chips

Preparation

Combine 1 1/2 tablespoons onion with the jalapeno, garlic, coriander and lime juice in a processor. Chop using on/off switch. Turn into a mixing bowl.

Add avocado and mash with a fork. Add tomato and remaining onion and toss to blend. Season to taste with salt and additional lime juice. Serve at room temperature with taco chips.

Things Change in Brentwood... but Memories Remain

There are a number of Lustron homes in Brentwood. They were built in the late 1940's entirely of porcelain-enameled steel panels at a plant in Columbus, Ohio. Can't talk about Brentwood without mentioning Carl's Drive-In at Manchester and High School Drive. Teenagers loved to go there for hamburgers and root beer for many,many years. Even today, it is difficult to find a seat at either of the two counters during lunch time. Carl's has so many regular customers. The hamburgers and root beer are still terrific!

Understanding Dental Emergencies and Urgent Care Services Provided at the St. Louis Dental Center


The St. Louis Dental Center offers comprehensive dental care and emergency dental treatment through its Centene Urgent Dental Care Center. In an innovative partnership between A.T. Still University Missouri School of Dentistry & Oral Health (ATSU-MOSDOH) and Affinia Healthcare, the St. Louis Dental Center is one of the first of its kind to provide clinical training and services for underserved and vulnerable populations in a federally qualified health center public health setting.

Isaac Coronel, DMD, '23, is the urgent care specialist at the St. Louis Dental Center and staffs all Affinia Healthcare clinics as their full-time urgent care provider. A 2023 ATSU-MOSDOH graduate, he served as class president and has many other educational achievements.

"We are proud of Dr. Coronel, as well as his outstanding peers in the 2023 ATSU-MOSDOH graduating class," said Dwight E. McLeod, DDS, MS, ATSU-MOSDOH dean and professor of periodontics. "We are fortunate he has chosen to continue his work in St. Louis public health centers."

Urgent dental care is an emergency-based focus on the patient's chief complaint, rather than providing treatment plans for the entire mouth. Common complaints originate from non-restorable teeth, resulting in pain, thermal sensitivity, inability to chew, and sleepless nights. Patients coming to the St. Louis Dental Clinic present with broken fillings and oral pathological lesions, such as cancer, dry sockets, and jaw pain. The St. Louis Dental Center's Centene Urgent Dental Care clinic sees 30-35 patients on weekdays and 5-10 patients on Saturdays, equating to 185 patients a week or 740 patients a month.

"It's always rewarding when we are able to support our patients by resolving the issue that caused their pain," explains Dr. Coronel. "We believe dental emergencies are best managed by dental professionals in dental settings for the best oral health outcomes. When patients seek emergency dental treatment in non-dental settings, like an emergency room, palliative care in the form of antibiotic and analgesic therapy is likely provided. This may delay definitive dental treatment, potentially leading to worsening conditions or repeat

Free Monthly Transit Pass Available for First-Time Transit Users

As students get ready to head back to school and the workforce settles into more routine schedules, Citizens for Modern Transit (CMT), Metro Transit and St. Clair County Transit District (SCCTD) are encouraging people to get "Back in the Groove" by taking transit to get where they need to go. Those who are new to the public transit system can take advantage of a groovy deal – a free monthly transit pass to give transit a try for their school or workday commute throughout the month of October. Passes are available to the first 250 individuals who register between August 15 and September 15. Registration can be completed at www.cmt-stl.org.



"As we get back into a more regular routine in the fall, it is a great time to give transit a try," commented Kim Cella, executive director of Citizens for Modern Transit. "Plus, gas prices continue to fluctuate. This, coupled with parking and vehicle wear and tear, can make the expenses associated with driving quickly add up. Public transit is a convenient and cost-effective way to travel to work and school. According to the American Public Transit Association, a two-person household can save as much as \$10,000 annually by downsizing to one car and using public transit. The free monthly pass promotion allows new riders to try out the system and see just how easy it is to utilize."

Street teams will be downtown and near the Cortex Innovation Center and BJC Health Care during the morning commute on Tuesday, Aug. 29, from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. They will be talking to commuters about the benefits of transit and how riders can register to receive a free monthly pass throughout October.

Piazza Named Regional Teacher of the Year

McGrath Elementary School third grade teacher and Brentwood School District Teacher of the Year Lindsey Piazza has been named one of 34 regional honorees in the Missouri Teacher of the Year program.



EducationPlus and the St. Louis Regional Professional Development Center selected Piazza as one of 10 honorees from the St. Louis region, which were chosen by a committee of nine education professionals as teachers of excellence.

"Lindsey inspires students of all backgrounds and abilities to learn," said Dr. Alex Tripamer, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction. "Her relationships with students are exceptional, and she is constantly finding new ways to reach them."

Piazza believes students learn best when they are engaged in authentic, interactive and personalized learning experiences. She provides opportunities for her third graders to work together to solve real-world problems, and encourages them to celebrate growth and achievement at all levels. She recognizes the importance of building strong relationships, which has translated into both academic and social-emotional success in her classroom.

"My favorite things about teaching are the connections I make with students and the impact I can have on students," said Piazza. "Just seeing that spark that you can put into their eyes and into their minds is an amazing feeling."

Piazza is now eligible to participate in the statewide Missouri Teacher of the Year program, which is conducted annually by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. 


The above meeting took place on May 5th. After a fall in his home, Coach Titus was relocated by family to Florida. On Sunday, July 9, 2023, he

Hometown Boy Became Fire Chief... Robert H. "Bob" Niemeyer, Tuesday, July 11, 2023 Beloved husband of Lois (nee Lott) for 59 years; loving father of Karen (Duane) Reeves, Mark Niemeyer, and David (Karin) Niemeyer; cherished grandfather of Clare, Graham, and Emma Niemeyer; Luke, Katherine, and Meghan Niemeyer; Kelly and Alissa (Amy Moeller) Reeves, and

Jewel (Greg) Anderson; dear brother of David (Terri) Niemeyer; dear brother-in-law, uncle, cousin, and friend to many.

After serving in the Army Reserve, Bob found his home in the Brentwood Fire Department, with 50 years of service in Brentwood and the St. Louis Metropolitan area. He was awarded the Medal of Valor for a fire rescue and had been named Citizen of the Year by the Brentwood Chamber of Commerce. Chief Niemeyer was respected by firefighters throughout the area and loved by all Brentwood citizens. His smile and love for Brentwood will be missed.

The following is a reprint from The Pulse Newspaper announcing Bob's retirement in 2012.

Chief Niemeyer served the Brentwood community for more than 49 years. He started his career in 1961, as a Fire and Police dispatcher. In 1962 he was asked to join the Brentwood Police Department by Mayor Ray Parker and Acting Chief Al Null.

Fifteen months later, on September 16, 1963, Bob transferred to the Brentwood Fire Department, fulfilling his lifelong dream of become a Brentwood fireman. He worked his way up through the ranks and was promoted to Captain in 1968 and to Assistant Chief and Fire Marshal in 1980. On April 19, 1982, Mayor Jim Shelton and the Board of Alderman appointed Bob the position of Chief of the Brentwood Fire Department. He is now serving his 29th year as Fire Chief.

Over the years, Bob has received numerous awards, including Brentwood Citizen of the year in 1999, the Missouri Fire Rescue Award for Bravery and the Brentwood Fire Rescue

Throughout his firefighting career, Bob has performed nine life-saving rescues and has received over 30 commendations, including the highest honor a firefighter can receive, "The Gold Medal of Valor," for rescuing a one-year-old infant from a burn- ing home on Helen Avenue in 1966.

In 1995, Bob was honored by the City of Webster Groves for fighting a house fire at 46 Glen Road that almost cost him his life. In 1996, Bob was asked to be commanding officer at the tanker explosion in November 1996 when a tanker exploded at the intersections of I170 & Eager Rd.

One of Brentwood's most difficult fires to fight occurred at noon on Christmas Day, 1985. A fire broke out above the Brentwood bowling alley. At that time Gene Del Printing offices were located in this space. It was extremely cold and the area around the building became covered in ice. Chief Niemeyer and his men, along with crews from many surrounding communities battled the 5 Alarm blaze for almost 7 hours to bring under con- trol. Miraculously, they were able to save all the financial and billing records for Gene Del Printing; without which they might not have been able keep their business going.

On July 15, 2002, at 2:05 p.m., a 4 alarm fire broke out in the two rooms designated as the Early Child hood Center, at the Brentwood High School. Responding to the fire was the Chief Niemeyer, multiple Brentwood Fire Department crews as well as crews from surrounding communities. Around 20 trucks in all – fought the dangerous blaze. It took 2 hours to get the blaze under control which they managed to do without any further damage to the building.

One of Bob's proudest moments was in 1991 on Christmas Day when his men called him to the station. When he arrived, to his surprise, all the men were there, even those who were not on duty on Christmas Day. They presented him with a statue in his likeness dressed out in his fire gear. While the statue was being made, the men were determined to make it as exact as possible, so they systematically "borrowed" pieces of the Chief's gear from his car to use as models. Once that portion was done they would replace it and take another piece until the statue was completed. The statue even includes the fire smudges on his gear.

Chief Niemeyer lived in Brentwood since his parents moved here in 1946. He attended Brentwood Elementary School #1 and graduated from Brentwood High School in 1959. While attending Brentwood High School, he participated in basketball, baseball and football programs. Among other accomplish- ments, he was featured in the Brentwood Historical Society's 2002 edition of the "Brentwood History Book" and inducted into Brentwood High School's "Hall of Fame" in 2008.

Bob and his wife Lois, (married since 1963) who also grew up in Brentwood are the proud parents of Karen, Mark and



David, son-in-law Duane Reeves, two daughters-in-laws, Heather and Karin, and six grandchildren: Clare, Graham, Emma, Luke, Katherine and Meghan. Bob credits much of his success to God and his wife Lois, who took care of their home and chil- dren while he was on duty, especially on the many holidays and weekends. "Lois is in charge of everyone!" Karen is a project manager with Cass Bank, Mark is a Partner in the Onder Law Firm, and David is a Brentwood Fireman and accountant. Both Mark and David also live in Brentwood with their families.

Editor's Note: I would like to thank Bob for being such a good and dear friend to my father, Gene Dodel and our entire family. We thank Bob and his men for saving our business when we had a terrible fire on Christmas Day in 1985. The men went in and saved all of our important files, customer ledger cards and job tickets containing our customer's printing plates and negatives. This was before computers so it was very important to us that these were not destroyed.

I would also like to thank Bob for making my dad's funeral special for us by having the firemen in our parking lot saluting my father as we passed by on our way to the cemetery. Bob also led the funeral procession to the cemetery and I will never forget when I looked over at him

INSIDE BASEBALL

Scout's trip to West Point was one to remember – for the beauty of the campus and for signing Ross Friedrick for Cardinals

During his six years as the Cardinals' area scout responsible for evaluating amateur players in the northeast portion of the country, Jim Negrych never had a reason to go to a game at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point – until this spring.

He came away impressed – and glad that he made the trip.

"It was absolutely beautiful," Negrych said. "It might be the nicest campus I've been on. The view of rivers merging combined with the history of West Point ... it was really something."

As much as he enjoyed taking in the sights, however, Negrych was there for another reason – to watch a power-hitting first baseman, Ross Friedrick, who was on his way to breaking the Army record for most home runs in a season.

Friedrick also was on his way to establishing himself as a prospect, one Negrych and the Cardinals signed as an undrafted free agent just days after this month's draft.

The fact the Cardinals were able to sign Friedrick, who already has begun his professional career with the Palm Beach Cardinals, was due in part to all of the work that Friedrick put into the long and detailed process of applying to have his active duty commitment to the Army deferred following his graduation in May so he could pursue a baseball career.

It also was due in part to Friedrick's family having a St. Louis connection, and a friendship between a St. Louis businessman and Cardinals' executive Matt Slater, both of which were years in the making.

Growing up as a Cardinals fan

Friedrick called it a "surreal" feeling when he first put on a Cardinals' uniform to begin his professional career – joining the team that he has cheered for all of his life.

His family moved several times because of his dad's job, but during his childhood years, they lived in Chesterfield and Friedrick made several trips to Busch Stadium and also to spring training in Jupiter, creating a lifetime of memories.

"My Dragons T-ball team got to walk around the field and get autographs," said Friedrick, who listed Albert Pujols, Yadier Molina and Matt Carpenter as his favorite players. "When I got here to Jupiter, I remembered standing outside the parking lot to get autographs and seeing all of those guys. Now I'm here."

When they lived in Chesterfield, Friedrick's family became close friends with the family of Steve Gross, and the families remained close after Friedrick's family moved when he was in the fifth grade. In fact, the Gross family were special guests at Friedrick's West Point graduation ceremony.

Gross had constantly monitored Friedrick's baseball career at West Point, and through his friendship with Slater, made certain the Cardinals knew about him as well. Slater passed along the information to Negrych, who already was aware of how well Friedrick was playing.

Because he was a senior at West Point, however, more than just Friedrick's baseball ability was going to be involved if the Cardinals, or any team, wanted to try to either draft him or sign him as a free agent. They knew that his graduation carried with it a commitment to active duty that follows all of the cadets and all of the graduates of a military academy.

The Cardinals had drafted two players from military academies in recent years,

both pitchers, Mitch Harris out of the Naval Academy and Ben Yokley from the Air Force Academy. Harris had to serve his full five-year commitment before the Navy allowed him to join the Cardinals, while Yokley was able to play briefly in between his service commitments.

What Negrych learned, however, was that Friedrick had been able to obtain a deferment of his active duty commitment, freeing him to join an organization following his graduation.

"Delaying a commission in the Army, that's a big deal," said Army coach Chris Tracz. "It's obviously a bet on himself in so many respects. Ross's dream is to play professional baseball but he also knows that his responsibility to the Army at some point will be to be an officer. The pro option right now allows him to accomplish both."

The process of receiving approval for his deferment began last fall – an eight-month process of creating a packet of memorandums and statements that



had to be passed up the chain of command – starting with his coaches, through the administration at West Point, on to the Secretary of the Army, then the Department of Defense. All had to sign off on the application.

"One, he deserves it, and two, for our program and for all of the academies, having guys being able to go out and pursue a professional career is huge," Tracz said. "We have a football player who signed with the Vikings and now Ross. I don't think there's a better show of the type of players and people we have than these guys going on and playing professionally."

Friedrick said receiving word that the deferment had been granted – which came the same week he graduated with a degree in Systems and Decision Sciences – was as good of a feeling as the ceremony itself and "the ceremony was pretty awesome."

"I was passionate about both so I'm glad I get to pursue baseball first and do my service afterwards," said the 22-year-old Friedrick, who also delayed his commission as a Second Lieutenant.

The deferment can last as long as Friedrick's baseball career unless a situation comes up that requires him to be recalled to active duty, where he was set to become an artillery field officer.

If he wasn't playing baseball, Friedrick would have spent this summer and fall working as an athletic intern for the baseball team at West Point, then would have reported to Fort Sill, Okla., in January for an officer leadership course and an assignment to the 75th Field Artillery Brigade based at Fort Sill in Lawton, Okla.

It wasn't until his junior year at West Point that Friedrick began to think playing professional baseball was an option he could pursue.

"I wanted to keep playing the game that I love and try to pursue that dream that I've always had since I was a little kid," he said.

The desire to do what it took to make that possible, as well as being voted the captain of the Army team, were both facts that Negrych appreciated as he got to know more about Friedrick.

"He checked off every box that mattered and we definitely felt good about him going out and being able to give everything he's got and then do his service afterward," Negrych said. "He's a good player, a good hitter, is strong, and has all the tools where if it clicks and he hits enough he can work his way up

the organization.

"He's a worker, extremely disciplined on and off the field. He's going to do everything in his power to maximize his ability and that's all you can really ask for as an organization."

After joining the other recent draft selections and free agents who signed after the draft for workouts in Jupiter, Friedrick realized that for the first time in his life, playing baseball was all he had to worry about.

"The challenges that these guys go through are real," Tracz said. "When you can eat, sleep and drink baseball with some guys that untaps so much potential. Ross has proved it over the course of four years that he's a really good player but I think like anybody to not have classes to go to, to not have some of the commitments that any college has for their student athletes, I think there is some definite growth steps you can see immediately and hopefully long term too."

While other college players got to add games and experience each summer, Friedrick was going through military training.

"I'm excited to invest and focus on baseball year-round and see how high I can take my baseball career," Friedrick said. "I think it's going to allow me to get stronger and be in better shape. Being able to play year-round is going to help me learn and grow and overall just be a better player."

Setting the home run record

Friedrick was able to take a major step forward in his career during his senior season, when he saw his home run total jump for six as a junior to 17, breaking the previous school record of 13 homers in a season. Included in that total was a two-home run game at Navy.

"I figured I needed a little more power, not that I was necessarily trying to hit more home runs," Friedrick said. "It ended up working out. I got stronger in the summer going into my senior year. I just emphasized having fun that year and not pressing about things I couldn't control. It ended up working out."

Friedrick posted a .368 average, drove in 59 runs and scored 58 runs in 56 games. A 6-foot-4, 230-pound lefthanded hitter, Friedrick also had a .443 on-base percentage.

"He devoted himself to flexibility and strength training and really preparing for a 50-game season," Tracz said. "He was healthy the entire season and felt good or better than his three previous years.



"Like anything power and the ability to drive the baseball comes with time and I think he was kind of ready to unleash it a little bit. He always had good bat-to-ball skills but he really did a good job when he had a chance to open it up and drive the baseball. He was ready.

"He kind of went on a natural progression in a sense. This year he was able to take advantage of some real good situations. As a team we were pretty good offensively and he was around other good hitters."

This was the first season for Tracz as Army's head coach, but he has been an assistant at West Point in the past – and always has appreciated the type of people that the program attracts – even more than their baseball ability.

"You hope it goes without saying that if you get a guy from an academy that they

are going to do the right thing, that they are going to be willing and able to be a leader and somebody who you know is going to show up every day and do what they are supposed to do and work their tail off," Tracz said.

"Ross is one of those guys.

"This place means a lot to him and it's given him so much and he invested back into it. When you do that you see guys kind of lift the ceiling. That's a really, really neat thing about this place – these guys learn to understand that the ceiling and the limits that people can put on them are actually limitless.

"Whether Ross plays for a month or a year or 10 years, what he's accomplished and what he's set up to do in the future is pretty great. This place has always been about people and he's learned from a lot of great leaders. He's been around a lot of great people."

Joining the Cardinals

The Cardinals were not the only team interested in Friedrick. On the day he was at West Point, Negrych said "15 or 16" other scouts were there. Friedrick also had conversations with other teams before the draft, and was told he might be selected late on day three or to expect interest from teams as a free agent.

But when he wasn't drafted and could pick where he wanted to sign, the Cardinals were an easy choice.

Tracz said that even before Friedrick signed, he saw him wearing a Cardinals' jersey.

"At one point I was like, 'Why does he already have a Cardinals' jersey?" Tracz said. "When you go to games growing up and this is your team, that's a pretty special thing."

Friedrick made his pro debut last week, getting singles in his first two at-bats. His first home run came in his third game, on Saturday, pulling a pitch over the right field fence in Port St. Lucie against the Mets.

"Getting to see more and more live pitching has allowed me to get more comfortable in the box," Friedrick said. "I'm seeing it well. On the home run, I knew I got it good off the bat. It was a fastball low and in and I put a good swing on it. It felt awesome."

Negrych hopes it's the first of many home runs for Friedrick.

Negrych had a conversation with Friedrick over the telephone in the weeks leading up to the draft and



came away glad that he had finally made a trip to see a game at West Point.

"The kid himself is so impressive," Negrych said. "To know what those guys have to go through on a day-to-day basis to accomplish something and then you are also giving up some time that most people think belongs to them to serve your country ... it's unbelievable.

"It was almost to the point where at 38 years old, I was speaking to this young man and he was so impressive that you almost felt the roles were flipped at a certain point in the conversation."

Negrych's reaction did not surprise Tracz.

"The best part of this job for me is the uniqueness of it, but also the people you get to be associated with," Tracz said. "Ross will be a successful baseball player. I think he's going to do great. When you get to know him and the drive and determination he has, you just can't be more proud of him and I'm grateful I was able to coach him."

Healthy meal options, including dairy foods, support school success

School bells will be ringing soon. Along with the return to school comes a shift in daily routines, including mealtimes and mealtime options. Whether children and adolescents enjoy school-prepared breakfast and lunch, or eat breakfast at home and bring a lunch, well-balanced meals will set them up for success in school. Parents may find themselves overwhelmed by planning meals for the busy school year, but by simply adding a dairy food to each meal, parents can easily increase a meal's nutrition.

"Parents may find themselves scrambling for meal ideas as the new school-year routine gets under way," said Maggie Cimarolli, a registered dietitian and nutrition educator with the St. Louis District Dairy Council. "Dairy foods are an excellent choice to incorporate into meals as they provide protein, carbohydrates and healthy fats, plus provide vitamins and minerals. In addition, many dairy foods are extremely portable, such as yogurt and string cheese, making them perfect for meals on the go. Dairy options can also greatly simplify breakfast, which can be a hard meal to pull together on hectic mornings."

The federal Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend three servings of low-fat or fat-free dairy per day as part of a healthy eating pattern. Milk, in particular, adds to the quality of meals as it delivers 13 essential nutrients, including calcium, potassium, vitamin D and protein, in every 8-ounce serving. Calcium, potassium and vitamin D are nutrients of concern as most Americans — adults and children alike — do not consume enough of these nutrients on a daily basis. One 8-ounce glass of milk provides one-third of the recommended daily allowance of calcium, which helps support bone development.

"Encouraging students to buy milk with their school breakfast or lunch is an easy way to add a nutrient-rich food to a meal," Cimarolli said. "Milk also quenches thirst and can give students a boost in energy for afternoon activities. In addition, milk contains 8 grams of protein, which can help keep students full longer."

SLDDC Supports Schools

For this school year, SLDDC is supporting schools and families in two ways to ensure students are fueled for their busy days.

Approximately 500 school nurses in eastern Missouri and southern and central Illinois received a new back-to-school nutrition pamphlet from the SLDDC. This pamphlet provides families with quick, easy and nutritious options for breakfast, lunch and snacks. The SLDDC is encouraging the nurses to share the resource with parents at upcoming back-to-school events.

To help increase dairy consumption in the schools, the SLD-DC also awarded 29 Dollars for Dairy grants to 18 Missouri and 11 Illinois schools. The grants help schools afford new equipment to prepare or serve dairy foods for students. The SLDDC has offered this grant program since 2012. Schools may request up to \$2,000 per grant application. McGrath Elementary School and Mark Twain Elementary School in the Brentwood School District both received grants to purchase equipment to start serving smoothies during breakfast and lunch.

"This valuable grant program continues to backstop public and private school cafeterias in their efforts to provide the best meals possible for the students," Cimarolli said. "In the past, the grants have been used to purchase panini makers, smoothie makers, coolers and breakfast carts to serve dairy breakfast options. We are always excited to learn about the proposed innovative ideas."

The addition of cottage cheese to this recipe results in 12 g of protein per serving! Start off the first day of school with these fluffy pancakes to fuel your family.

Prep Time: 10 minutes Yield: 5 (2 pancakes)

Ingredients:

- 1 cup 2% cottage cheese
- 2 eggs
- 1 ½ tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. baking powder
- 1 cup flour
- ½ cup milk
- ½ cup canola oil

Directions:

In a blender, add all ingredients in the following order: cottage cheese, eggs, canola oil, milk, vanilla extract, sugar, baking powder and flour. Blend the ingredients until the batter is smooth.

Coat skillet with cooking spray or melt butter on skillet as it preheats. Once skillet is preheated, add batter to pan (1/3 cup per pancake). Once batter starts to bubble, flip the pancakes and cook until both sides are golden brown.

Serve with maple syrup, jam, peanut butter or fresh fruit. Store leftovers in refrigerator and use within 3 days. The pancakes reheat well.

VA loans are only available to active service members or veterans, and they're backed by the Department of Veterans Affairs. These loans often require no down payment.

USDA loans are a program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These zero-down- payment home loans are for lower income borrowers who live in rural areas.

Fixed or adjustable rate

Fixed-rate mortgages are popular because the mortgage interest rate doesn't change over the life of the loan. The rate to which you initially agree will be the rate you keep until you sell the home or refinance.

Adjustable-rate mortgages have low introductory rates that start out fixed, but then fluctuate upward. If you don't plan to stay in the home long, an adjustable rate mortgage could yield savings.

Mortgage terms

A 30-year mortgage is the most common term. Monthly payments are generally smaller, but you'll pay more interest over the life of the loan.

Shorter term house loans, like 10- or 15-year mortgages, are also available. You pay less interest, but monthly payments can be steep.

Down payments

Some conventional loans can allow for a down payment as low as 3%, but if your down payment is less than 20%, you'll also probably have to pay for private mortgage insurance. This monthly expense is typical on low-down-payment mortgages to protect lenders in case the borrower fails to repay their loan. Once you get up to 20% equity in the home, you can take steps to cancel your PMI.

Some government-backed home loans do not require a down payment, while others let you make lower down payments. Depending on the type of loan and the amount of your down payment, you'll have different requirements for mortgage insurance.

Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

PUBLIC HEARING

Public Hearing on the Application for the rezoning of property at 8817 Moritz Avenue from the from the PD-Planned Development Overlay District to the B Single Family Residential. Mayor Dimmitt read the above description and gavel opened the public hearing.

Whitney Kelly presented the information noting that the applicant wanted to tear down and rebuild a new home in the existing footprint and keep with the B single family district. Planning and Zoning denied the rezoning of this property by a vote of 6 (no) to 2 (yes) as it was deemed inconsistent with comprehensive plan for the redevelopment of that area.

Resident Dan Duffy (8904 Moritz Ave.) stated he has lived in Brentwood for 20 years and feels the rebuilds in the area have been wonderful and it is great to see. He prefers the residential instead of the commercial building and reported that the neighbors across from and to the left of this property agree and would prefer to keep the whole street as residential.

Sam Beffa (Carmody MacDonald/120 S. Central Ave. Suite 1800, StL 63105) spoke on behalf of the applicant Kingsbridge Homes LLC and shared a power point presentation. Kingsbridge Homes wants to continue the trend of rebuilding in Brentwood. He noted that it is currently zoned PD (planned development overly) and has been that way for 30+ years. However, nothing could be constructed on this site because of the setbacks and area requirements, so would like to rezone to B (single family) to keep with the area. As a new home, it helps protect/add to property value and tax revenue, as an \$800K home. They felt that the precedent was set when the Board overturned Planning and Zoning's decision on Powell Ave. construction and would like the same consideration, as this is a residential area. While intention for PD district is to hold property for further development, it has not been done in 30 years, and is not large enough for business to build on, so they would like it to be rezoned as single-family/residential.

Mayor confirmed that the reason they want to rezone is you cannot "rebuild" a home in the PD district, even though one is there now.

Whitey Kelly noted that the comprehensive plan called for it to be zoned PD for the redevelopment of the entire corner and building on Brentwood Blvd. The Planning and Zoning reviewed extensively and denied based upon the redevelopment of the whole corner.

Alderman Plufka asked if instead of rezoning with P&Z, if the Board of Adjustment could consider another option. Whitney responded that they could but is not sure how they might

Alderman Gould stated that the lot is undevelopable for PD zoning currently, and asked if the three lots adjacent to that are also undevelopable according to the PD Zoning? Whitney Kelly responded that those homes are all non-conforming, but lots are undevelopable individually.

Alderman Lochmoeller knows one of the commercial properties talked about is for sale, and asked if there is a developer wanting to assemble all three or four of those properties for a commercial development. Whitney is not aware of one at this time.

Alderwoman Tice asked how this is different from what was done on Powell Ave. Whitney Kelly noted she does not have the statistics regarding this (as it was done prior to her employment) but it is similar, and she would have to do some analysis of this. Alderwoman Tice asked if this could be researched and shared before they vote on this at the next meeting.

Alderman Plufka noted that the three buildings South of Veterinary clinic fronting Brentwood Blvd. to Moritz combined are not an acre and not enough real-estate to make it developable. Whitney was not comfortable responding, as it would be speculation what could be done.

John Suelthaus, Kingsbridge Homes, shared that his property and other parcels combined do not equal an acre.

Mayor Dimmitt gavel closed the public hearing. He noted that the item will be taken up under New Business tonight for a first reading.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Lois Truman (8710 Rosalie) asked what is happening with the Post Office. She stated that they are not always open and this building is prime property for the city, and could be better utilized. She noted some alternatives, and proposed an automated machine that is available 24/7 where you can get postage and drop packages, etc. She plans to continue to work on this project.

Karen Smith (Harrison Ave.) had a question regarding Bill #6466 regarding urban redevelopment. It sounds like we are aligning with the MO statute. One of the amended areas seems to be changing the definition of blight. She asked what the old and new definitions are- for comparison. Also, revising and modernizing certain other provisions of the city chapter - which includes eliminating the need for new request for proposal and also eliminating the need for a filing fee. Does this have to do with the redevelopment along Manchester.

Mayor Dimmitt shared that the Bill will be discussed under New Business items tonight and the Redevelopment plan is to be discussed by the 353 Redevelopment corp. tomorrow night (June 21st) at 7:00.

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS

Mayor David Dimmitt – shared the following items:

When Brentwood Bound projects are all done, Parks will have added over 5500 trees to the Park area. Many came down during this project, but we have put back that many and more, for a net plus of trees. We have received several awards which supports our view for tree city USA.

The 353 Redevelopment Corp. is reviewing the Greenstreet Redevelopment plan tomorrow (June 21st) at 7:00 PM. It will be livestreamed on You Tube and there will be an opportunity for public comment. The mayor noted the agreement is still being negotiated and will be brought to the Board for discussion and review on July 5th (First reading) and July 17th (Second reading).

Alderman Steve Lochmoeller - Ward 3

Thanked staff for a successful Grand Opening of Brentwood Park.

Alderwoman Kathy O'Neill - Ward 4

Noted the new Property Management Company (CPM) for Brentwood Forest coming in. No longer self-managed.

Shared that she will be leaving Brentwood and moving to Colorado and that her last meeting will be July 17th.

Alderman Jack Shelton- Ward 4

Shared he will also be leaving Ward 4 but is staying in Brentwood. His last meeting will also be July 17th. He and Kathy hope to work with the Mayor for replacements.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Brentwood Bound Update

Craig Schluter (Navigate Building Solutions) shared his report stating construction costs, soft costs and no changes in categories of funding since the last Board meeting. The detailed report is available in BoardDocs.

Evans Howard Monument Ribbon Cutting - Scheduled to take place on Saturday July 8th, at 10:00 a.m.

The City Administrator shared information on behalf of Dan Fitzgerald (Brentwood Historical Society), stating the time and date of the ribbon cutting event, and that the information will also be shared via social media and other media outlets.

Brentwood Bound - Kerb, Eck & Braeckel, LLP 1st Quarter (January 1, 2023, through March 31, 2023) Audit Presentation

The City Administrator presented that on behalf of the audit firm, there were no finding this quarter and they did not need to be present.

Extend Lease of United States Postal Service St. Louis Brentwood Retail Branch at 8764 Rosalie Avenue, St. Louis, MO 63144

The City Administrator shared that the Postal Service is exercising their option to extend the lease for five years and continue to occupy the current space.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill No. 6465 - An Ordinance Approving the City of Brentwood Sustainability Plan The City Attorney did the first reading.

Director Gruenenfelder introduced Andy Burkemper (Chairman of the Sustainability Commission). Andy presented some background information on the group, noting the Commission was formed in early 2021 and that this is the first plan to be developed. He shared that the members were polled for ideas, of which 100+ were identified, and they grouped the items into categories and prioritized them. They developed a plan outline and draft document with the help of the subcommittee. They completed the draft and presented to the Public Works Committee who unanimously approved, and he would appreciate the Boards consideration as well.

A second reading will take place at the next Board of Aldermen meeting.

Bill No.6466 An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 4302 Of The City Of Brentwood Relating To Urban Redevelopment Under Chapter 353 Of The Revised Statutes Of Missouri - First and Second Reading

The City Attorney did the first reading.

Mark Grimm (Gilmore & Bell) presented the information. He stated that they have been aware for some time that Ordinance #4302 was inconsistent with the amendment of Chapter 353 passed by the General Assembly in 2022.

He noted the General Assembly amended the definition of blight to cross reference the TIF definition of blight. All cities they work with are being advised to revise this information according to state law. In the Ordinance presented here, it matches and conforms with the new definition of blight for Chapter 353. The General Assembly tightened up what it takes to qualify for a blighted area.

He noted that according to Ordinance #4302, plans had to be submitted within 90 days of the Request for Proposal (RFP). Brentwood did two RFPs for this Redevelopment. Greenstreet responded to the second one about year ago and since the ordinance notes 90 days, it seemed unnecessary to require a new one, since we have the proposal they submitted. The Ordinance change is not to get around submitting an RFP, but if one has already been submitted, there is no need to do another one.

He also noted Ordinance #4302 has a \$1000 filing fee. Since Greenstreet has a funding agreement with the city and has deposited funds with the city to pay the city's required fees, there is no need to have to pay a separate filing fee. If funds are already in place to pay the city costs, there is no need to have a separate filing fee.

In Ordinance #4302 on the notice of requirements, the tax impact statement was required to be sent by registered or certified mail. It has been their experience that this takes a long time to get delivered and so have added provisions for overnight or hand delivery service as well because it could be quicker.

The Mayor clarified that the change in the law is based on legislation passed in August 28, 2022 by General Assembly, so we are wanting to update ours as well. We could have done earlier, but these are the same changes that would have been made then, as are being made now.

Mr. Grimm noted that the need for a second reading tonight is to have this complete because of the 353 Redevelopment Board meeting tomorrow night. We noted that this could have done it earlier, but wanted to get this housekeeping done now as we get closer to having an agreement.

Alderman Plufka asked about the definition of blight and the language for what was tightened up – asking if we now have to go back to PGAV to re-blight or rediscuss the areas that remain? Mr. Grimm noted the information includes a new qualification analysis and looks at the new

definition of blight and under current law does qualify as a blighted area.

Motion was made by Alderman Lochmoeller and seconded by Alderman Shelton for a second reading of the Bill. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

The City Attorney did the second reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderwoman Tice and seconded by Alderman Plufka to perfect Bill #6466 into Ordinance form. Roll called:

By a vote of 8 (Yes) to 0 (No), Bill # 6466 will become Ordinance # 5096.

Bill No. 6467 - An Ordinance To Rezone Certain Property Numbered 8817 Moritz Avenue From "PD" Planned Development Overlay District To "B" Single-Family Residential District - First Reading

The City Attorney did a first reading of the Bill,

Sam Beffa (Carmody MacDonald) responded that the three properties along Brentwood Blvd. with the subject property combined equals .63 acres which is shy of the one acre required for the PD district.

Alderman Lochmoeller commented that Planning and Zoning has a plan, but it is just a guide, and was designed mostly for box stores, which are not wanted anymore, and that we may need to look at this for current needs. Single family homes are "hot" (popular) now and an \$800K home should be considered.

Alderman Plufka noted that maybe obtaining a variance was suggested when they went to Planning and Zoning for the property as it exists.

Sam Beffa responded that this was not suggested. He stated they were told that single family is not allowed in the PD district, however after investigating, they found it is allowed in the PD, and felt this route was easier to pursue.

Mayor Dimmitt stated that we will bring this item back next month for a second reading.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Karen Smith (Harrison Ave) is interested in knowing what the characteristics are, and if we are doing some sort of tax incentives for this plan. Do the plan and agreement go hand in hand. The plan is vetted by Redevelopment Corp. but who does the agreement. Why was a new RFP needed in the first place/or legislation made so they do not have to do a new RFP.

Mayor Dimmitt explained that the Redevelopment agreement is not finalized yet and is still being negotiated, and the Redevelopment plan is going before the 353 Board tomorrow night. The plans are available online with supporting documents.

Mr. Grimm shared that the RFP submitted for this project was 15 months ago and would not comply with the 90-day requirement.

Brentwood Board of Aldermen Approves \$436 Million Manchester Road Corridor Redevelopment Project

The City of Brentwood Board of Aldermen voted unanimously July 17 to approve a \$436 million redevelopment agreement with Green Street Real Estate Ventures LLC.

The redevelopment area consists of approximately 77.2 acres located on both sides of Manchester Road between Mary Avenue (just east of Brentwood Boulevard) and Hanley Road in Brentwood. The Green Street project will focus on redevelopment of 40+ acres in this area.

The agreement provides for the use of real property tax abatement to incentivize the redevelopment and revitalization of the area.

"The Board of Aldermen has made a bold decision to ensure a bright future for the Brentwood community by renewing an area of our city," said Brentwood Mayor David Dimmitt. "This opportunity was made possible by the Brentwood Bound projects that have helped us overcome some of the community's long-term challenges, including flooding and public safety. We are pleased to partner with Green Street Real Estate Ventures as the master developer for this revitalization project."

The City's Brentwood Bound projects include Deer Creek Flood Mitigation, Manchester Road Improvements, and the Deer Creek Greenway Connector. Construction on these projects began in late 2019 and is due to wrap up in 2024.

"Green Street has been continually impressed by the professionalism and proactive community outreach that the City has engaged in and the community's dedication to being involved in the process," said Joel Oliver, Chief Development Officer for Green Street Real Estate Ventures. "We are honored to have been chosen as the Developer of Record for the Manchester Corridor Redevelopment Area. Our

team is eager to continue our partnership with the City and Community to fulfill their vision."

Green Street Real Estate Ventures presented their proposal for redevelopment of Brentwood's Manchester Road Corridor at the Brentwood 353 Redevelopment Corporation Board meeting on July 19, 2022, and to the Board of Aldermen on August 15, 2022. On August 30, 2022, Green Street hosted an open house session for community members to learn more and ask questions about the proposal.

On September 19, 2022, the Board of Aldermen unanimously voted in favor of the resolution to designate Green Street as the preferred developer of the Manchester Redevelopment Area.

After the September 19 meeting, the City of Brentwood began the process of negotiating an agreement with Green Street.

On June 21, 2023, the Brentwood Redevelopment Corporation held a public meeting to review the proposed Manchester Road Corridor Redevelopment Area Development Plan. At this meeting, the Brentwood Redevelopment Corporation recommended by a vote of 5 to 1 that the Board of Aldermen approve the plan.

On July 5, 2023, the Board of Aldermen held a public hearing regarding the Development Plan and the proposed Master Redevelopment Agreement. The July 5 meeting included a first reading of the proposed ordinance.

At the July 17, 2023, Board of Aldermen meeting, the Board held a second reading of the proposed ordinance and voted unanimously to approve the Master Redevelopment Agreement.



WGU Missouri Awards more than \$33,000 in Grant Funding to K-12 Teachers Across Missouri

WGU Missouri today announced it has awarded \$33,244 in grant funding to teachers across the state, funding their innovative classroom projects that foster learning in new, unique ways. The grants were made possible through WGU Missouri's "Fund My Classroom" initiative, and a total of 43 classroom projects were selected for funding.

The funding will go a long way toward making dozens of K-12 classrooms more engaging environments for students as they return to school this fall. A sampling of grants awarded include the following:

A \$5,000 grant, used to purchase 15 iPads that will allow fourth and fifth grade science and afterschool robotics club students at Black Hawk Elementary School in Kahoka to improve and further develop their computer programming and STEM skills.

A \$3,000 grant, used to purchase necessary materials for a new STEAM forensics detective lab class at Jarret Middle School in Springfield. Items purchased include a microscope, a camera, a USB SD card reader, SD cards, buccal swabs and kits for evidence collection, fingerprinting and testing simulated blood.

A \$2,360 grant, used to start a news channel in a third-grade classroom at Orchard Elementary in Jackson, allowing students to create news scripts on a weekly basis and further their technology skills. Items funded through the grant include a Go Pro Camera with a memory card, a Smart TV with a wall mount, a green screen and a MacBook.

A \$1,016 grant, used to rebuild the school library at Aspire Academy, which is part of Confluence Charter Schools in St. Louis City. The library had been closed for the past five years, and the grant will be used to purchase a variety of multicultural books, puppets and a mascot costume to help bring the library back to life.

A \$1,000 grant, used to obtain supplies and resources for the Life Skills Kitchen at Sherwood Middle School in Harrisonville, teaching special education students necessary life skills in cooking. Items purchased with the grant include a mini refrigerator, air fryer, microwave oven, bakers rack, measuring cups and spoons, reusable plates and cups, silverware, a can opener, multifunction island, surge protectors, a print cartridge and binders.

An \$890 grant, used to purchase gel electrophoresis kits and DNA kits to create a hands-on CSI lab at Fort Zumwalt North High School in St. Charles County that will allow science students to learn how DNA from poached tusks and different populations of elephants in Africa can be used to determine where poaching is occurring. A \$500 grant, used to purchase an AI-powered Bird Buddy Feeding box, allowing K-5 students at Wohlwend Elementary School in South St. Louis County to be able to watch live and recorded video footage of the birds that visit the feeder and learn about different bird species. A \$450 grant, used to add flexible seating to the special education classrooms at Moberly High School in Moberly and create calming areas for students. Items purchased with the grant include stimulating lights, comfortable seating, lamps, pillows, calm strips, sensory bottles, stress balls and fidget items. A \$300 grant, used to purchase a tabletop pottery wheel and associated supplies for an art classroom at Montgomery County High School in Montgomery City.



A \$250 grant, used to purchase materials that include vinyl for t-shirts, bakery items and beads that will enable students in the entrepreneurship class at Purdy High School in Purdy to create innovative items and receive, fulfill and monitor orders. WGU issued a call in March for K-12 teachers to submit their project ideas on the university's website by April 14 for the opportunity to receive full or partial funding. Most grants were awarded during Teacher Appreciation Week, which ran from May 8-12.

We have gone on several cruises of several types. This article will depict two cruises of two types.

HOLLAND AMERICA LINES (HAL)

Be sure to bring along a pair of binoculars for wildlife, glacier and scenic viewing.

Our ship started in Vancouver B.C. and along the INSIDE PAS-SAGE with ports at Ketchikan, Sitka, Juneau and Anchorage, Alaska.

Along the Inside Passage you'll have the opportunity to see coastal villages, moose, brown bears, majestic Bald Eagles and other wildlife. We toured the Gastineau Channel

in a small zodiac and our guide promised that if we didn't see whales we would get a full refund of \$100. We saw several whales and the guide told us this area where the whales came back to every year was called their "kitchen" where plenty of food was available. We also got a camera lesson when the guide asked how many had cameras with them (all 6 of us did) and how many had read their instruction book. I took one of my favorite photos of the whole trip of a whale with water droplets dripping off its tail. We also saw seals lounging on the buoys. We hiked through the forest and ended up at the Mendenhall Glacier, which we discovered was half a mile wide.

Places to visit in Sitka (National Park and Raptor Center.) In Ketchikan see the Native American Totem Poles.

CELESTYAL CRUISES

Our most recent cruise was on the "Idyllic Aegean 7-day cruise" We sailed the Dodecanese islands in the Aegean. The most well-known islands are the blue and white island of Santorini, also known for beautiful flowering bougainvillea and awesome sunsets. We walked along the cobblestone streets and had a choice if we wanted to ride the donkeys back to the ship or take the cable car down the slopes. There are many beaches in the Greek islands to cool off in.

Patmos is known as where John of Patmos or "John the Theologian" wrote about visions of the Apocalypse in the Book of Revelations in a cave. We went in the cave where the walls had a mosaic over the door. There is a chapel and alter, as well as, a gift shop. It is a UNESCO World Heritage site, also known as one of the most sacred sites of Christianity. From 1st Century AD. It is now known as Jerusalem of the Aegean or "Island of the Apocalypse.

In Rhodes, we went on a walking tour of old town with medieval Street of the Knights and saw the castle-like Palace of the Grand Masters of the Knights of Rhodes."

The Parthenon temple with Doric columns is an ancient citadel on the Acropolis and is a familiar site and be sure to see it at night. Be sure to eat octopus, and souvlaki and sip some Ouzo.

The ship has a 3-4 or 7-night itinerary and operates out of Athens. We cruised to several islands, including Mykonos, Milos and Kusadasi.

We have also cruised on the Mississippi River on a paddlewheeler; three of the European Waterways luxury canal barges in France; Viking on the Yangtze River and Carnival Cruise Lines in the Caribbean.

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
