We hope you had as much fun as we did at the Brentwood Park Grand Opening Celebration! Saturday was so full of smiling faces and sunshine!















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St. Louis Dental Center offers oral healthcare exams to veterans

Mark your calendar, and sign up now for the July 8 first-come, first-served clinic

Just announced, the St. Louis Dental Center will be hosting its July 8, 2023, Veterans Clinic, providing comprehensive dental screenings for veterans at no cost thanks to funding made possible by Affinia Healthcare. Through a unique partnership between A.T. Still University-Missouri School of Dentistry & Oral Health (ATSU-MOSDOH) and Affinia Healthcare, the St. Louis Dental Center is a federally qualified health center serving underserved and vulnerable populations. Many veterans have no health insurance or access to quality oral healthcare.

"This is our seventh year of welcoming veterans to the St. Louis Dental Center for nocost, affordable care. Our services are important because only 15% of veterans are eligible for dental care through the Veterans Administration," emphasized Herbert Silva, DMD, AT-SU-MOSDOH assistant professor, comprehensive care director, and leader of the Dentures for Veterans Project at the St. Louis Dental Center. "Additionally, when veterans are not in pain and can smile again, they are more likely to engage with work, family, and socialization. These meaningful connections can prevent isolation and desperation."

By the numbers, to date, more than 1,000 veterans have been screened and treated, and more than 550 veterans have received full and partial dentures.

Organizations that would like to be considered for the second grant cycle of 2023 must submit online letters of inquiry by August 25, 2023, and online applications are due on September 1, 2023. Applicants must be considered tax-exempt under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or be a public or governmental entity, such as a public school or health department, and serve the people of Missouri.





St. Louis Area Diaper Bank Hosts Second Annual Benefit Concert

The St. Louis Area Diaper Bank will host its second annual Fantastic Father's Benefit Concert on Thurs., Sept. 21 from 7 to 9:30 p.m. The fundraiser will be held at the .Zack Theater located at 3224 Locust St. Proceeds will benefit the nonprofit's diaper program.

The concert will feature JAM: Jackson & MARS, a high-energy live band and production that showcases Michael Jackson and Bruno Mars. The band includes a Michael Jackson impersonator plus Bruno Mars' look-alike who will perform 40 songs spanning 40 years. The evening includes drinks, hors d'oeuvres, a silent auction and raffle.

This year the St. Louis Area Diaper Bank – through a network of 70 community organizations, educational and health partners serving low-income families – will distribute 4.1 million diapers to more than 70,000 families in the St. Louis region.

Founded in 2014, the St. Louis Area Diaper Bank provides diaper and period supply access to the region's low-income families, as well as raises community awareness about the causes and consequences of diaper need and period poverty. The nonprofit is a member of the National Diaper Bank Network and its sister organization Alliance for Period Supplies, a nationwide nonprofit dedicated to eliminating diaper need and "period poverty" in America. The period supply program ensures access to menstrual hygiene products, which allows full participation in daily life with dignity.

The period supply program distributes period supplies through community partners and advocates for the elimination of "period poverty". This year the period program will distribute 1.1 million period products. Two-thirds of low-income women in St. Louis cannot afford menstrual hygiene products, with 46% of low-income women having to choose between food and period supplies.

Teens Learn Life Skills at Maplewood Public Library

Teens have an opportunity to learn a variety of skills on their journey to becoming independent adults. The receipt of a Spotlight on Literacy grant from the Missouri State Library, has allowed the library to purchase needed supplies and the hiring of experts in the fields of financial literacy and college bound literacy. Learning to Fly: Skills for Independent Living will meet weekly throughout the summer of 2023 with a limit of 15 participants. "The teens at our library have expressed an interest in learning and practicing the skills needed to be successful adults. This grant opportunity is providing us with equipment to offer cooking classes and more to our patrons," said Kim Royer, Youth Services Manager at the Maplewood Public Library.

Maplewood Public Library was able to purchase 20 additional STEAM ACADEMY Launchpads, Guided Learning Tablets, from Playway Products in March. Children from preschool - elementary school will benefit from the receipt of this \$3,259.00 grant from the Missouri State Library. This project is supported by the Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provision of the Library Services and Technology Act as administered by the Missouri State Library, a division of the Office of the Secretary of State.

From outer space to the farm and back to the dinosaurs, each learning tablet contains at least 6 preloaded activities. No internet access is needed to use the tablets.

"The Launchpad tablets provide families with an opportunity for kids to learn and play games on a tablet, without the fear of venturing into something questionable on the internet," said Kim Royer, Youth Services Manager at the Maplewood Public Library.

Brentwood High School Celebrates the Class of 2023



Students in Brentwood High School's 95th graduating class were awarded more than \$4.5 million in scholarships this year, Principal Dr. Edward Johnson said during the school's commencement ceremony held Saturday, May 20 in the BHS Auditorium.

Of the 54 graduates in the Class of 2023, 45 plan to attend a two- or four-year college. Students submitted 254 applications to 108 colleges and universities nationwide, and selected 24 different schools to continue their academic careers, including the University of Southern California, the University of Michigan and Saint Louis University.

In addition, one graduate has applied for postsecondary support through Missouri Vocational Rehabilitation, which specializes in employment and training services for students receiving special education services.

During her senior class reflection, Katherine Trostel encouraged classmates to cherish the experiences and relationships from their time in Brentwood, and to embrace uncertainty as they begin the next chapter of their lives.

"It's OK for us to wonder or even feel nervous and scared about what's to come," said Trostel. "But it is important to realize that your future is up to you. Cherish the unknown and let yourself be fully present in everything you do."

Senior speakers Joshua Kelley and Eloise Ayotte also shared words of thanks and inspiration.

"We are here because of you," said Kelley to family and friends in attendance. "Though we may not say it enough. Today, all of us here are grateful. We thank you and we love you."

"The Class of 2023 is a class of people who have laughed together, learned together, grown together, and most importantly, a class of people who have never failed to support each other," added Ayotte. "Live life seeking people and places where you feel supported, loved and trusted."

The Class of 2023 was awarded 127 scholarships, including 28 A+ Program candidates and seven Missouri Bright Flight recipients. Four students received National Career Readiness Certificates, two students completed career and technical education programs, two students earned the Missouri Seal of Biliteracy and four students committed to play sports in college.

This year's graduating class also includes 28 National Honor Society members, eight Spanish Honor Society members, seven Honor Thespians, six German Honor Society members and five French Honor Society members.

BHS Senior Earns State Academic Honor



Brentwood High School senior Eloise Ayotte has been selected for the 2023 Missouri Scholars 100, a statewide program that honors 100 of Missouri's top academic students in the Class of 2023.

"Eloise is the perfect example of a Brentwood student who took advantage of the opportunities afforded to her in high school," said BHS Principal Dr. Ed Johnson. "Her story as a successful student-athlete, accomplished journalist and advocate for social justice with a commitment to community service is inspirational." Missouri Scholars 100 is sponsored by the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals (MoASSP). Schools across Missouri are invited to nominate candidates for this recognition, with selection based primarily on a formula using the student's gradepoint average and ACT or SAT score. Each student nominated must meet the criteria of an "Academic Decathlon," which is designed to test the academic strength of the student.

To meet the decathlon requirements, the student must have had a minimum GPA of 3.750, a minimum ACT score of 29 or a minimum SAT score of 1,280, be ranked in the top 10% of the class and have taken high-level courses in mathematics, science, English and world language. Attendance, extracurricular involvement and citizenship are also considered.

"The Missouri Scholars 100 program is one of the premier academic recognition programs in the country," said MoASSP Executive Director Clark Mershon. "Students selected for this program have taken a rigorous course of study and maintained the highest academic standards. The Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals wants to celebrate the achievements and success of these students and their schools."

Mark Twain Renovation Project Update



With Mark Twain Elementary School renovations beginning this month, we wanted to share information about two projects that require work on the school's decorative stone wall along Dorothy Avenue and Litzsinger

New Stormwater Drainage System

As part of the renovations, the Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District requires a new stormwater drainage system that will run under Thompson Field and connect to the main sewer line at Dorothy Avenue. To complete this work, an 8-foot section of the wall along Dorothy Avenue will need to be temporarily removed. Highly qualified masons will oversee the removal and reinstallation of this section, ensuring its proper reconstruction. This work is scheduled to take place in June.

Updated Fire Department Access

To meet modern requirements for fire department access, minor alterations must be made to the wall at the school's driveway entrance on Litzsinger Road. These alterations have been carefully planned to have minimal impact on the appearance of the wall. Highly qualified masons will complete the alterations, ensuring they blend seamlessly with the original structure. We anticipate this portion of the project to take place in June.

We value the historical significance of Mark Twain's decorative stone wall and share the community's commitment to its preservation. Our team will take great care to maintain its integrity as we work to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at Mark Twain.

Eleven-year journey to reach majors seems easy compared to challenge now facing former Cardinal Brock Peterson

Brock Peterson knows what it's like to have the odds stacked against him.

Rising from being selected in the 49th round, the 1,450th player picked in the 2002 draft out of a small town in Washington, to



reach the major leagues with the Cardinals 11 years later was not easy.

That challenge, however, seems easy compared to the battle that Peterson now faces every day of his life.

It's been nearly two years since Peterson, happily living and working in Virginia after his baseball career ended, was enjoying a day at the beach with friends. It was July 3, 2021, a day that will forever be etched in Peterson's memory.

It's the day his world, as he had known it, ended. A diving accident left Peterson paralyzed from the chest down.

"I've pretty much lost everything in my life that I enjoyed," Peterson said. "I was a very active person and I didn't really like to sit around and be lazy. Pretty much everything I liked to do I can't do anymore.

"I really thought I was going to recover and get better and I didn't. Accepting that has been a real challenge."

It's a challenge that Peterson's friends are trying to help him fight. One of those friends, Dan Stillman, accompanied Peterson back to St. Louis last weekend for a reunion of the 2013 Cardinals. It was a trip Peterson wanted to make, even though he knew a lot of people were not aware of the injury that had changed his life.

"I could never have dealt with what he is dealing with," Stillman said. "I've never met a stronger person in my life, and I'm not just saying that. To go through what he has gone through and to be where he is and to be in the mental state that he's in is pretty impressive and admirable."

It was the first time Peterson had been back to Busch Stadium since he played his last major-league game in 2013. Going onto the field in his wheelchair for a pre-game ceremony was a reminder of what had been taken from him, but it also offered Peterson a chance to realize what he had accomplished – and the challenge he already overcame — as his new

A long journey to the majors

Playing professional sports had been Peterson's dream as he grew up. When the Twins gave him that chance, he took it, not realizing at the time that his road to the major leagues would be so long and winding.

From rookie ball in Elizabethon, Tenn., through stops with seven other minor-league teams, including 71 games in independent ball, Peterson persevered until that day came when he learned he was being promoted to the major leagues after playing 1,163 games in the minors.

Peterson had hit .306 with 22 home runs with Memphis at the time he was promoted, the best season of his career. Then-Triple A manager Pop Warner called Peterson into his office between games of a double-header to tell him to pack his bags for St. Louis. The Cardinals needed a replacement for Matt Holliday, who was going on the injured list.

"I waited a long time for this," the 29-yearold Peterson said on his first day as a major-leaguer. "For it to finally happen, it just means a lot to me." Said general manager John Mozeliak that day, "Very few players play 11 years in the minor leagues because usually they quit or are told to quit. For him to persevere I think is a very special story. As you can imagine, we're pulling for him."

Peterson made his major-league debut on July 20, 2013 as a pinch-hitter. He grounded out, but drove in a runner from third on the play.

Peterson would go on to play in 22 more games for the Cardinals, his stay in the big leagues interrupted by a short trip back to Memphis, where he hit three more home runs, when Holliday returned to the roster.

Peterson came back up to the Cardinals in September but didn't have the success he wanted, finishing the year with two hits, both singles, in 26 at-bats.

"I was very thankful to the Cardinals for giving me a chance," Peterson says now. "I'm thankful I was having a good season that year and they recognized that and



at least gave me a shot. I wish I would have played better while I was there, but it made my 13 years in he minor leagues (including two more years after he played in St. Louis) worth it to get even that little bit of time up there in the big leagues. I'm very thankful for that opportunity."

If Peterson had known the journey from rookie ball to the majors would take 11 years, would he do it again?

"Probably," he said after pausing a moment before answering the question. "Starting out when you are 18 and get a chance to play professional sports, that's everything you ever dreamed of. That dream is still very motivating, especially early on in your career ... I think I would do it again."

Peterson moved to Virginia Beach in 2012 and when he decided to retire at the age of 31 following the 2015 season, he enrolled at Old Dominion University, majoring in finance. After graduating, Peterson began working in medical sales.

"A lot of guys I played with or against lived in the area and we became good friends," Peterson said.

One of those friends was Stillman, a lawyer, who grew up in Virginia Beach.

"A couple of guys I knew growing up played with Brock and when Brock moved here, we had moved back from New York," Stillman said. "He basically became part of the family."

Stillman's 4-year-old daughter Sofia refers to Peterson as "Uncle Brock."

"I will be his Boswell here," Stillman said.
"The guy put himself through school after playing. That would be like me having a baseball tryout after graduating law school. And it was crazy how fast he did it.

"He got through school, was working and starting a new life. The timing of the accident was just tragic."

A day of fun turns into life-changing injury

It was just supposed to be a day of fun at the beach, hanging out with friends, something Peterson had done countless other times.

"I walked in the water multiple times that day where I dove and I knew it was shallow, like chest high," Peterson recalled. "I didn't jump off anything high; I jumped off a little floating dock that was only like a foot off the water. I got a running start and tried to do a shallow dive.

"I didn't really even feel anything. I felt like I just kind of got a little zap through my body for a split second. Then I tried to swim and I didn't feel like I was moving. When I opened my eyes my arms were just hanging in front of me.

"I realized what I had done. Instantly I knew that things probably weren't ever going to be the same."

Luckily for Peterson, one of his friends saw him in the water and rescued him before he would have drown. Unluckily, he soon found out how seriously he was injured.

"I think about it all day every day," Peterson said. "It's something that I don't think will ever go away. You realize how quickly things change when you get put in that situation. It was one decision that didn't work out for me and changed the rest of my life.

"I had done way stupider and way crazier things in my life and not gotten hurt. I was just trying to swim back to the boat and didn't make it. I should have known better. You hear about it happening to people all of the time but I didn't think it would happen to me.

"I was probably just too comfortable in the water. I was a really good swimmer. For a split second I forgot what the consequences could be"

As he began the long rehab process, Peterson thought that maybe the paralysis would just be temporary. He soon learned that doctors did not expect that to be the case. He has partial movement of his arms, but anything from his chest down, there is no function.

"I'm kind of a unique case," Peterson said. "I've got nothing new back. Basically everything function-wise that I have now I had to some extent just after my injury. I've gotten stronger and better with things that I have but it's been kind of a disappointing journey. Most people wake up one day and something new works – a leg, a finger, a hand, something. I really have had zero new recovery since the injury. I'm kind of your prototypical C5 injury where everything I should have I do and everything I shouldn't have I don't."

Having been a professional athlete who was in good physical shape, Peterson thought he would have been able to regain some of the movement in his body through rehab and physical therapy.

"I definitely think I'm a little bit better off than some people with the same injury, but with these injuries it really doesn't matter how hard you work," Peterson said. "I hate to say it but it's really all about luck. Some people are lucky and get better and some people don't. It doesn't matter how hard you work.

"My whole life basically I've been able to set a goal and say I was going to be able to do something and I knew if I worked hard enough and stayed on track that there was a pretty good chance I was going to reach that goal, whether it was weightlifting or sports or whatever. Now you can set a goal but you have no control over what's going to happen."

Trying to cope with the mental challenges is another hurdle for Peterson, one that he has been coping with for the last several months.

"In the last six months I've had to kind of accept it," Peterson said. "You want to be in denial and say you are going to beat the odds. I know a few people who have and so it gives you hope but at some point you just kind of have to accept it.

"It's a completely different lifestyle that no one can understand unless they are in it or have been through it. I really thought I was going to recover and get better and I didn't. Accepting that has been a real challenge."

Peterson has also had to deal with other medical problems that are compounded by his situation. "There was a couple of periods where I wasn't sure I was going to make it," he said.

Having problems breathing is a severe complication because Peterson is not able to cough or sneeze because he has no abdomen muscles that work. When he gets an infection or even a small cut, it takes a long time to heal.

He also has had to deal with the mental stress of worrying about all of the medical bills, knowing there have been some pieces of equipment that could have been helpful that he chose not to get because of the cost involved.

Peterson's mother has moved in with him to be his full-time caregiver. Friends like Stillman try to visit as often as they can, either taking him out to lunch or just hanging out at Peterson's house. Peterson said he probably watches more baseball games on television now than he ever did before. If the weather is nice he tries to go outside for a couple of hours a day.

Peterson is still taking physical therapy at Old Dominion and also is involved in a program of handicap workout classes at Kaizen Adaptive, which helps him mentally as much as it does physically. He also is going to counseling twice a week.

Adjusting to the changes in Peterson's life has been a difficult challenge, and Peterson is not sure that it will ever get easier.

"I was independent basically from the time I signed my first contract when I was 18 and moved away 20 years ago," he said. "Now I have to have help pretty much 24 hours a day. I think that's the most frustrating part, not being able to take care of myself the way I want to.

"I can do a lot of stuff on my own but there's still things all day every day that I need help with. I want to be helping take care of somebody else and raising kids right now and instead I'm being taken care of. It's not what I ever wanted to do."

Hoping to go back to work

As his new reality has set in, Peterson has tried to think about the future. He would like to go back to work, maybe using his knowledge of baseball, but it would need to be a job that offered flexibility and recognized his physical limitations.

"Sitting around and collecting a disability check isn't my idea of living," he said. "But with some of my complications it just has to be right fit. I think I have a lot to offer still; but it just has to be the right situation for me."

Stillman believes the trip back to St. Louis might have been a step forward for Peterson. It wasn't an easy decision to come and was one Peterson thought about for a couple of months since he had been invited originally through a Facebook message.

He had kept the news of his injury relatively private, with only his family and some of his close friends aware of what had happened. Going out in public would change that, but it's now a trip Peterson is glad that he made.

"It was the first time he had flown since the accident," Stillman said. "He was on the fence about going for a couple of months, but some of our friends really encouraged him to do it and thought it would be really good for him. I think the trip was a milestone."

As Peterson, now 39, has tried to accept a potential reality that his physical condition likely is not going to change, Stillman is holding out hope that there will be new medical discoveries or cures sometime in the future.

"I'm still blindly optimistic," he said. "That's my curse. You never know what's going to happen."

What is reality, Stillman knows, is that this is a battle Peterson is not going to endure on his own.

"You won't find a better support group that what he's got here," Stillman said. "Everybody who was friends with Brock, they are there ... Everyone who has been close to him has been a big part of his life since the accident.


"It's a testament to him and who he is, his character and his charisma."

Stillman now includes the Cardinals as part of the support team that is surrounding Peterson with love and support.

"I had never been to a Cardinals' game before, and it felt like a family," he said. "It seemed like it didn't matter if you played one game or 10 seasons. That memory will stand out in my mind the rest of my life.

"Based on what he told me it was the best thing he has done since the accident. It's the first time I've seen him that happy in a long time."



Across the Decades

Cecelia Avenue Lake



Cecelia. But this story really doesn't begin with me. My father, Nelson G. Morgan, who is now 102 years old, moved into that house in the summer of 1917. He was just short of his eighth birthday when his family bought the house incomplete. His father finished it. They moved there from Maplewood.

My father says that he was always told that the lake was formed sometime around or shortly after the Civil War. Apparently the area was being farmed and during a drought, hogs rooting in a low spot for water opened up a spring which flooded the space. This story may be legend, but he has always stuck by it as what he'd been told.

At the time his family arrived, the lake (yes, I've always called it a lake. I know others refer to it as a pond, but my dad always called it the lake and I've done so as well) was owned by a dentist named Dr. Coyle (sp?). Dr. Coyle lived and worked in the city and came to the house and farm on weekends. Much of the land north and east of the lake was grazing pasture for his cattle. The Wartenbee family were caretakers for Mr. Doyle. My father became friends with their sons.

When he first moved to Cecelia his mother wouldn't let him play in the lake because it was said to be about 25 feet deep with seven active springs seeping water from below. But as he grew up he was allowed to swim and fish just across the street from his house. If you have a copy of the 1969 Brentwood 50th Anniversary booklet, there is a picture of my father with a pretty good sized fish on page 69. Of course when the lake froze over during winter it was always popular for ice skating.

A lot of changes occurred when the street was further subdivided. In fact, a large stone cistern was built right in the center of Cecelia in front of the Cook/Languth house just north of my father's. It was quite large and cars driving up and down Cecelia would have to carefully manuever around it. I mention this cistern because when the lake was frozen, large chunks of ice were cut out and stored in it with straw for use in warmer months.

According to my father, the Wartenbees were still caring for the property at the end of World War II. David Cook, who had grown up next door, also lived there as caretaker after he was married.

I was born in 1948 and the lake was always a beautiful thing to me. A family with the last name of Crowe (sp?) lived there as I grew up. By then, the lake was fenced and I never fished or swam in it, but the Crowes allowed skating in the winter. I remember how the kids on the street would anxiously wait for the ice to thicken properly. Mr. Crowe, (I remember him as a tall man with black hair) would drill through different parts of the ice to check its thickness. Every day he would tell us the thickness in inches and how much it had to go. When it was thick enough, we had our sleds and ice skates ready to go.

I would take my sled and run and then bellyflop on it. It would go forever. Or someone would take the rope and spin me around and around. My birthday was in January and on my tenth birthday I received a pair of skates. I was so excited and fortunately the lake was soon frozen over. I was down as much as I was up, but progress was being made when disaster struck. This was ten years before Blues' hockey, but kids still played ice hockey when they could and older boys used the lake as one great big hockey rink. They skated in and out of everyone, fighting for possession of a puck. These were high school boys and they paid little attention to a ten-year-old trying to find his ice legs. A powerful shot caught me just above the left eye. I went down like a light and there was blood everywhere. My dad took me home and there was no more skating for me that day. I was so disappointed when, during my healing period, the weather warmed, the ice melted, and I subsequently outgrew the



new skates. I believe it was the next year that Mr. Crowe began to prohibit skating. Something about insurance. I suppose it was my accident that contributed to the ban, but no one ever said.

One of the most fun things of those skating days was the bonfire. Today there is a huge new home on the Salem side of the lake, but that space used to be a fairly flat and large shore area. Logs, limbs, sticks and whatever were gathered there and set ablaze for the skaters to warm themselves. Some would roast marshmallows and it seemed that everyone brought a thermos of hot chocolate. As a little guy, I was always in awe of the high school boys hugging and kissing their girlfriends around the bonfire.

Ducks and geese frequented the lake from time to time. They never wintered-over, but some would make it their summer home. One summer in the early sixties there were some interesting residents; a large white goose and some smaller brown ducks. The goose was an ugly character. He had all kinds of red bumps on his bill and face and was quite bossy to anyone close by. One summer afternoon this goose left the shade of the lake, wandered through the yard, across the street and into my front yard. He honked and I gave him some bread. This started a daily routine. You could almost set your watch that he (sometimes accompanied by the smaller ducks) would arrive in our front yard at four p.m. He would honk, hiss, and demonstrate with his long neck until my mother or I would come out and feed him some bread. This went on for a couple of months. We were disappointed when he finally took flight and left.

It was about this time that Mr. and Mrs. Jim Orton purchased the lake property. They were a wonderful older couple that basicly bought the place as a retirement home. Mrs. Orton made great cookies and they soon hired me to mow their lawn. It was a large yard, but easy to mow because of the many big shade trees. However, trimming the lake fence line along the street sidewalk took forever and was not in the shade. I believe there is still a stone wall along the lake shore next to the house. I helped to build that. Mr. Orton was concerned about erosion of the shore line so close to the house. It was to the point that there was only room for one person to walk between the water and the foundation. Since the lake was silting up, Mr. Orton saw an opportunity to kill two birds with one stone. I think it was 1965 and he hired me to help him. He obtained a fairly large dredge with a cable link to a cantankerous gasoline powered winch.

But first we had to build a retaining wall. That's where the flat white stones came in. We went out into the lake where it was nearing the house and began stacking the large rocks. The base rocks set well in the sticky, sucky mud and we slowly built a wall a few feet out into the water, curving around the edge of the lake. The plan was to dredge the lake, therefore deepening it and using the mud brought up to fill in behind the stone wall, thereby extending the shore outward and protecting the house.

The dredge scoop was a huge bulky metal thing that had to be dragged out into the center of the lake by pulling it as you swam. When it was in position, you dropped it and allowed it to settle into the mud. Then came the battle on shore with the winch. The thing had a mind of its own and fought against being started every time you pulled the rope. Once started, the clutch often fought you as much as the motor. But bit by bit, the engine ran and the winch began pulling in the muckfilled dredge. We then had to shovel the mud out of the dredge into a wheelbarrow, take it across the yard and dump it in the space behind the wall. Slowly but surely the mud displaced the water and the shore was extended to protect the house.


An unexpected bonus of the dredging process was that a large area along the shore was flattened into a gentle slope out into the water. Mr. Orton decided to build a beach. He ordered delivery of several truck loads of sand and the beach became a reality. The lake was still closed to the general public, but I could swim in it whenever I wished. The Ortons also had an old green flat-bottomed rowboat. I could take it out and row around whenever I wished. There weren't many fish in the lake by then, other than a couple large schools of goldfish. They were fun to watch swimming en masse under the sun light. But it was in that old boat that I made an interesting discovery, or at least confirmation of something my father had told me.


As mentioned before, he said there were once seven springs in the lake. Rowing around in that old boat, I discovered vast changes in water temperature at different areas of the lake. In much of the lake, the water was quite warm under the summer sun. However, in about four places I found the water to be very cold...as it came to the surface from some seepage below. Maybe those Civil War era pigs did open up some spring flows.

Filling the Gap to Pay for College – How Can I Use My Private Student Loans?

When you receive your award letter from your college of choice, you'll see a couple of important numbers listed – the estimated cost of attendance (COA), and any financial aid for which you are eligible, such as scholarships, grants, and federal loans/work study.

What is the Cost of Attendance (COA)?

The COA typically includes costs for one academic year:

- tuition and fees
- room and board (including a meal plan) or off-campus housing
- books, supplies, transportation, and other school-related personal expenses

Keep in mind that while some of these costs (tuition and fees) are fixed costs, others could be higher or lower based on your personal situation. For example, if you purchase used books or do not park on campus, your actual costs could be slightly less than what the college lists.

Many students will need more funding than what is included in their financial aid package to fully cover the balance, which is where private student loans come in.

What Do Private Student Loans Cover?

Great news – a private student loan like our education line of credit can be used for any items listed in your cost of attendance, or other education-related expenses! The amount you are eligible to borrow will be certified by your school, and the funds are sent directly to your college.

If some of the loan will be used to cover items not directly paid through the school, such as books, off campus rent, or a laptop, the school will issue you a refund for the excess amount. You may need to pay for some of these expenses before your refund arrives; in this case, be sure to use your refund to reimburse yourself and not for personal purchases.

Example: Your school receives \$15,000 from your loan disbursement. Only \$12,000 is needed to cover your tuition balance. The school will issue you a refund of \$3,000 to pay for out-of-pocket education costs. You can then use those funds to purchase necessary items, or to recoup what you have already paid.



The dairy story is on the MOOve with new Mobile Dairy Classroom

June is dairy month – the perfect time to thank the farmers who produce delicious and nutritious dairy foods. Originally known as National Milk Month, June Dairy Month highlights the health benefits of dairy foods and the importance of the dairy industry. Today, dairy farmers are not only making strides on the farm but also in the community by educating consumers on dairy cows, dairy farms and dairy foods.

For more than 90 years, the St. Louis District Dairy Council (SLDDC) has been able to contribute to this community movement. This year, in partnership with the Southwest Dairy Museum Inc., SLDDC is excited to bring the Mobile Dairy Classroom to consumers throughout Missouri and Illinois. The Mobile Dairy Classroom, a 32-foot classroom on wheels, began visiting schools in May, traveling through 10 counties in Illinois. Moving into June, the Mobile Dairy Classroom will reach even more consumers as it makes its way to county and state fairs, as well as to local community events throughout SLDDC's territory.

"Only 2 percent of Americans are connected to agriculture, so the Mobile Dairy Classroom tells the story of where dairy foods come from, and how dairy farmers take care of their land, cows and communities," said SLDDC nutrition educator and registered dietitian Maggie Cimarolli

Louise, the Jersey cow traveling with the Mobile Dairy Classroom, allows the classroom to be a fully-operational milking parlor. During the program, consumers of all ages see how Louise is milked and learn how milk travels from cow to carton.

In addition to learning about dairy cows and dairy farms, consumers are also educated on the nutritional benefits of dairy foods. "The Mobile Dairy Classroom teaches consumers that they need three servings of dairy every day, and that the nutrients in dairy help them to have strong bones, teeth and muscles," Cimarolli said. A serving of dairy can be 1 cup of milk, 1 cup of yogurt or 1.5 ounces of cheese, allowing individuals to tailor their dairy consumption to their eating habits and lifestyle.

Join SLDDC in celebrating June Dairy Month by following along with the Mobile Dairy Classroom as it makes multiple stops this summer, educating on all things dairy! The Mobile Dairy Classroom will continue visiting schools throughout Missouri and Illinois in the 2023-2024 school year.



Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

PUBLIC HEARING

Public Hearing Regarding Text Amendment amending Division 5 of Article V of Chapter 400 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Brentwood, Missouri, relating to Fences, Walls, and Screening Devices to address: (1) the aesthetics of such physical security measures, (2) access to the public right-of-way, sidewalks, and/or utility easements, (3) the structural soundness of such physical security measures, and/or (4) changes in the drainage of a property, and Accessory Uses and structure where fence regulations are discussed

The Mayor read the notice and gavel opened the public hearing.

Whitney Kelly presented that this item came out of Planning and Zoning last year because the Board of Adjustment received a fence variance. They looked at it to clarify the code and address any changes. Planning reviewed and recommended changes in March.

The Mayor gavel closed the Public hearing,

Public Hearing Regarding Text Amendment amending Section 400.1880 Lighting of the Zoning Code relating that new LED Lights have a maximum lighting to Corrected Color Temperature (CCT) to 2700K in furtherance of the public health and safety due to artificial lighting levels - Continue to the April 17th Board of Aldermen Meeting

The Mayor read the notice and gavel opened the public hearing.

The Mayor shared that this matter is not ready to be taken up tonight. Planning and Zoning still needs to address the matter and so have requested that the public hearing be kept open until the April 17th Board of Aldermen meeting.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderwoman Sims to continue and keep public hearing open until April 17, 2023 meeting.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS Mayor David Dimmitt -

Read a statement regarding the retirement of Sgt. Chris Gibson on March 28, 2023, noting his responsibilities and accomplishments in 24 years, and congratulating him on entering this

*Reminded everyone that election day is tomorrow (April 4th) and that Proposition M is on the ballot, encouraging those unfamiliar with this proposition to research it so he does not misrepresent the item. He named each of the candidates for positions; Mayor, Municipal Judge, and Aldermen in each Ward, stating each is elected for a two-year term.

Provided an update on the Lee Wynn Trail repair project being done by Castle Construction noting that the Board approved the lane closures to shore up the bank and put the trail and road back to safe condition. The cost is over

\$500,000 and was Board approved.

*Also noted that Russel Ave is closed between Brentwood Blvd. and Collier Ave. for MSD sewer repairs until April 15th

*Announced the Brentwood Park Grand Opening on Saturday, June 3rd from 11:00 – 2:00pm -more information to follow.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT Brentwood Bound Update

Craig Schluter, Navigate Building solutions gave report (Available in BoardDocs). He noted there was just one soft cost since the last Board of Aldermen meeting. There was an update to the categories of funding, showing the Arbitrage funding gained through the 2019 COP investment fund.

Mayor invited Eric Gruenenfelder to give an update on the status of the Brentwood Sports Complex and Field #1. Eric shared that we have scheduled with this field due to flooding. Discussion led to doing what we could do to get the High School season in, even if it was not a great field for this year. Phase 1 was to get infield dirt in place and leveled out. It is holding fairly well. Phase 2 is to do limited support for the outfield and do necessary improvements after Brentwood days to be ready for next year.

Flash flood events are averaging about 4-5 per year and the continual damage just adds to costs and aggravation. They are doing all they can to minimize issues with the fields. The best time to do work to support fields is November through February, but this year was difficult due to rain. The field and mound meet regulations, but field play availability has been rough. Doing best we can but looking forward to Sports Complex updates (and all parks) through the parks master plan.

What we are doing with Brentwood Bound is having a correlated effect on what we do with the Sports complex. We have not had water in the sports complex this year. We are hopeful this correlated effect helps us with future rain events.

Had first Master Plan meeting today, talked about challenges and looking forward to working on this. Following the Public Works Committee meetings provides a summary of this project

Mayor summarized that for Field #1 after consultation with the High School Athletic Director, decision was made to hire a company to handle the infield repairs, and we outsourced this project, due to company's expertise and equipment. Work has been done. We will outsource repairs to the outfield as well but wait until after Brentwood Days to do this work.

Field #2 & #3 typically used for adult leagues (High School uses sometimes as well) have had some work done on them already and we can address those concerns with work done in-house. Alderman Wegge confirmed that the city is doing the best that they can given the constraints

and appreciates the efforts to make the best decisions possible.

Steve Lochmoeller

Alderman Gould refined what work has been done on the infield. The infield dirt was leveled, but infield grass was not leveled. Eric shared that we made an investment in a roller to level that out and help improve grass in between games and start growing grass soon.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolution No. 1432 - A Resolution Approving a Change Order to the Professional Services Master Agreement with Navigate Building Solutions for Owners Representative Services for Brentwood Bound

Director Gruenenfelder shared information stating that the contract with Navigate for flood mitigation Phase 1 &2 and GRG Connector part A ended late December. This change order is to continue the contract (due to projects delays).

Alderwoman Tice asked if we are getting FEMA money to help pay for some of this – and Eric shared that we are in discussion with FEMA now regarding this. We are hopeful, but it has not been approved or denied our request yet.

Motion was made by Alderman Lochmoeller and seconded by Alderman Plufka to approve Resolution No. 1432 ...

Roll call: Motion carried by a vote of 8 (yes) to 0 (no).

City Administrator shared that the city participates with St. Louis County on this block grant which is to approve the block grant allocation from \$5000 to \$7500. Grant is still at \$20,000 (just allocation amount has increased). No resident in our community has applied yet so we are working to promote this throughout the community. Mayor asked how much was used last year, and Director Kelly said she does not have word on that.

Motion was made by Alderman Lochmoeller and seconded by Alderman Plufka for a second reading on this. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Second Reading was done by the City Attorney.

Motion was made by Alderman Gould and seconded by Alderman Shelton to perfect Bill No. 6454 into Ordinance form. Roll call: By a vote of 8 (yes) to 0 (no), Bill #6454 will become Ordinance #5085

Bill No. 6455 - An Ordinance approving a Text Amendment Regarding Fence and Wall Regulations of the City of Brentwood. First Reading

First Reading was done by City Attorney.

Director Kelly presented that this text amendment is looking at the city's fence regulations under Section 400.020 as well as Article 5, Division 5 to be reorganized and made clearer. It also includes a minor amendment to the swimming pool sections.

Alderman Lochmoeller inquired about Section 400.2400 item A – first sentence refers to Subsection (D) but should maybe be Section 400.2410 (D). Director Kelly agreed this was in error. It was also asked if fences were allowed in the front yard and the Director stated that current code allowed decorative ones up to 24 inches, but Commission board felt they should be allowed to go up to 48 inches if 50% open.

Alderman Wegge clarified that what has changed is front yard definition and fence height, and inquired if clarification on screening was done as he had interest in that section, Whitney referred to Section 400.2430 and noted that the part about "permit required" was moved up to the beginning, new section 2380, to make it clearer. (The redlined document with changes is available in BoardDocs.)







Jambalaya, Crawfish Pie, and File' Gumbeau

We recently traveled to San Antonio, TX for an international travel conference. On our way home, we cut across Louisiana before heading north. After having an elegant sufficiency of Texas Tacos, I was ready for some Cajun/Creole delights.

It's an easy drive across the Gulf Coast on I-10. Our first stop was Lake Charles, LA. for lunch at Steamboat Bill's On The Lake. This seafood restaurant spe-



cializes in Cajun/Creole preparations, and they do it well.

We have previously done the Boudin Trail, and when I saw Boudin balls on the menu I had to have one. Boudin is served as a sausage, or rolled, coated, and



fried. Every gas station, market, grocery store, restaurant etc. has their own closely guarded, secret recipe and they are all delicious. I also had a bowl of etouff'ee. Unlike some Cajun restaurants in St. Louis, it was not overly spiced. There was hot Cajun seasoning and hot sauce if you wanted it, but I didn't need it. It was perfectly spiced.

Sue ordered a "Gator" Po Boy. WOW, it was amazing, chunks of deep-fried white meat with a slightly sweet taste. It was incredible. A lady at the table next to us was enjoying a three-pound platter of crawfish. It looked good, but was way more than I wanted to try for lunch.

From there, we were back on the road to Houma, LA. And dinner at Boudreau and Tibodeau's. Cajun Cookin' restaurant. When I saw the place filled with locals, I knew it was going to be good

Sue had a crab cake pasta with a garlic cream sauce on a bed of angel hair pasta. It was a bit of a twist on Cajun cuisine, but it was excellent. She also had a "Sunset On

The Bayou"cocktail, a very tasty mix of pineapple and orange juice with tequila and grenadine.

I ordered the Trinity of Cajun dining, Jambalaya, Crawfish Pie and File' Gumbeau with a side of Hush Puppies. Once again, nothing was over-spiced, no swollen lips and burning tongue, just delicious seafood specialties. The Hush Puppies were wonderful corn fritters with pieces of sweet corn inside.

The menu is huge and there is something for everyone. The service was excellent and the price was very affordable. We definitely recommend Boudreau and Tibideau's for a real-deal Cajun dinner.

We started the next day with breakfast at Downtown Jeaux (pronounced Joe) coffee house. located on the town square, complete with a beautiful Victorian bandstand,



it is a gathering place for locals to start their day. Everyone waves, and says hello as they come inside and the outside tables are filled with local conversation and camaraderie.

Like many Louisiana restaurants, a Beignet for breakfast is a must, and Downtown Jeaux's were just as good, or better than the world famous Cafe De Monde in New Orleans. You have a choice on many different coffee blends to match your preference.

As I was enjoying my fantastic Beignet, I saw a plate go by with what looked like a mound of biscuits and gravy. In the interest of journalism, and my addiction to



B&G, I placed an order for only one biscuit and gravy. I found the source of "slingers and glue" perfection! That biscuit was so light and fluffy they had to bury it in gravy to keep it from floating off the plate. This without question the best biscuit and gravy I have ever tasted.

In conclusion, Cajun/Creole food is not screaming hot, taste bombs designed to destroy your mouth, tongue and lips. You will experience some different spicing tastes, but they are all good. You can add as much hot sauce as you like. Coastal Louisiana is a foodie paradise. You will find incredibly delicious Cajun/Creole delicacies that seem to come from their home kitchens, and you will be served by friendly people who make you feel like you're a long lost family member. The secret is for you to relax, enjoy, and come back for more.



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Blue Owl White Chili

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 (4 ounce) cans chopped mild green chilies
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 1/2 teaspoons dried oregano, crumbled
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 3 (16 ounce) cans great northern beans, undrained
- 6 cups chicken stock or 6 cups canned chicken broth
- 4 cups chopped cooked chicken, to taste
- 3 cups grated monterey jack cheese (about 12 oz.)

DIRECTIONS

1. Heat oil in large pot over medium high heat. Add onions and saute until translucent, about 10 minutes. Stir in garlic, then chilies, cumin, oregano, and cayenne and saute 2 minutes. Add undrained beans and stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and add chicken and cheese to chili and stir until cheese melts. Season to taste with salt and pepper and ladle into bowls.

FOR FREEZING: Pour soup into a rigid container (or freezer bag), label and freeze. To reheat, thaw in refrigerator overnight or simply put frozen soup into a largepot and gently heat, with lid on and stirring often, till heated through.

Casa Gallardo Perfect Guacamole

Ingredients

- 2 Tbsp minced onion
- 1 medium jalapeno
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- (optional) 2 tsp chopped fresh coriander

Juice of 1/2 lime

2 large, ripe avocados,

halved, seeded and peeled

1 large tomato, peeled, seeded and chopped

Lime juice Taco chips

Preparation

Combine 1 1/2 tablespoons onion with the jalapeno, garlic, coriander and lime juice in a processor. Chop using on/off switch. Turn into a mixing bowl.

Add avocado and mash with a fork. Add tomato and remaining onion and toss to blend. Season to taste with salt and additional lime juice. Serve at room temperature with taco chips.

Note: Can be prepared several hours ahead and refrigerated. Sprinkle guacamole with lime juice to prevent darkening.



2 Days In San Antonio

My husband, Kevin and I, attended our grandson Wayne Pritts's high school graduation in northern Texas before he left for his commitment to the U.S. Naval Academy in Rhode Island.

We were going to San Antonio next to attend an annual IPW Travel Conference. We stayed at the Hilton Palacio del Rio which was overlooking the 15 mile long riverwalk. After attending the conference we divided up our press visits to the local museums so that we could cover more of the destination.

We both went to the Witte Museum for a luncheon, "Where Nature, Science and Culture Meet." The museum was established in 1926 and is dedicated to telling the stories of Texas from the pre-history to the present. Permanent exhibits include: (displays of historic artifacts, and photographs), Texas art, textiles, dinosaur bones, cave drawings, Texas wildlife dioramas, as well as, traveling exhibits.

Kevin then attended the 41st Annual Tejano Conjunto Festival at the Guadalupe Cultural Arts Center. The mission cultivates, promotes and preserves traditional and contemporary Chicano, Latino and Native American Arts and Culture. The festival is an annual five-day long concert event attended by 10,000 conjunto lovers from around the world and is held at Rosedale Park. Conjunto is about music and dance. It is multi-generational, Mexican music mixed with German Ooompah music on the accordian.

Next, Kevin's group went to the Carver Community Cultural Center. The African-American community was prevented from joining San Antonio's social, cultural and educational life by segretion created it's own cultural center. In 1976, the Carver became a multi-ethnic and multi-cultural performing arts center. In 2007, the center was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The building was named The Carver to honor George Washington Carver. Nationally acclaimed African-American performances there by Louis Armstrong, Ella Fitzgerald, Lionel Hampton, Cab Calloway among other notable performers.

Sue went with a different group and we were supposed to visit the zoo, then it started raining so I only got to pet a snake. Next our group visited the Botanical Gardens and we huddled under a pavilion. I did learn how to make a delicious botanical drink using gin, proseco, sage, basil and mint...well shaken. Our next stop was at the Japanese Gardens where again it was raining. I saw some beautiful flowers and koi. I learned that San Antonio believes in repurposing its land. The Japanese Garden was designed using an old limestone quarry.

We watched the beautiful pink flamingos and even got the opportunity to feed them.

The skies cleared up and we went to Morgan's Wonderland. It is more than just an amusement park. In 2006, Gordon and Maggie Hartman observed their daughter, Morgan, wanted to play with the other kids while they were on vacation. But, the kids didn't want to play with her. Morgan's dad was heartbroken to see his daughter snubbed. You see, Morgan is a special needs child. Morgan couldn't understand why they didn't want to swim with her or play ball. Mr. Hartman is a philanthropist and business owner. In 2005, he sold his companies and established The Gordon Hartman Family Foundation so he and his wife could pursue their dream of helping children and adults with special needs. Their daughter was born with both cognitive and physical challenges. In 2010, Morgan's Wonderland became the world's first Ultra-Accessible fully-accessible theme park. Some of the unique rides are a train and swing that will hold a wheelchair. There is also a swimming pool for young and old alike. 
