What *Sinningias* can be pinched to make a more compact plant? Paula

The *Sinningia* genus is divided into half a dozen different clades, or groups. Some flower with buds and



flowers coming straight out of the tuber, so nothing to pinch there. Others such as *S. leucitricha* have leaves with buds emerge together. The height and number of flowers are determined by the age/ size of the tuber.

There is a group that does branch fairly freely. Plants such as *Sinningia aggregata* and *Sinningia bullata* rarely go dormant and produce flowers in the leaf axils as well as at the tips. These plants can be controlled by pinching out the tips and getting side branching. Also the close relatives, *Paliava* and *Vanhoutea* can be pruned to keep the size down and still get flowers. These plants bloom once the base diameter (no tuber) of the stem gets wide enough. The upper growth, even though young, will flower if the stem is large enough.

Tough question to answer since the genus is so variable. But in general, if flowers only appear at the tips of the stems (*S. tubiflora* falls into this group) pinching will simply stop any flowering.

Mr. Gesneriad, Some large primulinas are reluctant bloomers. They produce buds which never develop into blooms and just dry up. What would encourage blooming? I had one that finally bloomed when I took it off the plant stand and put it on the dining room table where it was totally neglected and just got some distant natural light from a bay window. I am still trying to get some blooms from *P. Chiaki* and *P. Moonlight*. Barbara


Mr. G: Good question. I've had the same situations. Plants would sit with buds for months with small buds in the axils that just won't grow. It's a frequent problem. Some have suggested stressing the plant a little so that it really wants to reproduce. Many of the *Primulina* grow in areas with a very long dry spell (just dew for 3-4 months; no rain). I know my plants go through those stresses all the time. P. species V-27 sat for a year with buds. It dried out once to the point that the leaves were limp in the pot. It recovered with watering and I had open flowers a month later.


Donna's *Saintpaulia* 'Betty Jean' although bloom does not look like the advertized picture.




Donna's Sinningia noid


