Sinningia 'Towering Inferno'

Plant Delights Nursery introduction started its life when gesneriad expert John Farina crossed two sinningia hybrids, Sinningia 'Krezdorn Yellow' x Sinningia 'Apricot Bouquet' and subsequently sent us a packet of seed. After 3 years of garden trials, we christened Sinningia 'Towering Inferno' as the first introduction from the seedlings. Sinningia 'Towering Inferno' emerges from a dormant tuber in spring, producing huge 4' tall flowering spikes adorned with thick, fuzzy green leaves and topped with bright red, dangling, tubular flowers. For us, Sinningia 'Towering Inferno' starts flowering in mid-June and continues well into October. A site in bright full sun for at least half a day is necessary...even in hot climates. www.plantdelights.com

Mr. Gesneriad:

Remember how we put lower light plants at the end of our florescent tubes in the "old " days? The tubes gave off lower light at the ends. Does this hold true for the new LED tubes? Donna

Mr. G: There is still a little difference between the end of LED tubes and the middle, but probably not as much as fluorescent.

Mr. Gesneriad: Is there a difference in *Primulina cordata* and this other *Primulina*? Donna

Mr. G: Yes, the edges of *P. cordata* leaves are not quite as lobed. The photo shows them side by side with *P. cordata* on the right. The plant on the left is *Primulina glandulosa var. yangshuoensis.*

Donna's *Eucodonia*. This is a Eucodonia I started from seed from the Gesneriad Hybridizers' Association July 2018. Leong Tuck Lock from Malaysia made the cross: LTL 06-03 'Eucodonia hybrids'.





Donna's *Achimenes dulcis* is a species for which she purchased rhizomes on Ebay from a grower in Florida. She had never seen these rhizomes available before and was excited to grow them. She finds Achimenes a challenge. She planted the rhizomes and after the babies appeared, potted up to a larger pot, pruned the tips and wicked the container so it would never go dry. There is another large pot of more blooms to come from all the tips that were pruned that rooted and are growing well.

Several of my own seedlings have done well over the summer, producing multiple blooms. The first two are being watched for growth characteristics and potential naming. The third, another sister to the first two, is an example of a plant that probably "should" go on the mulch pile due to floppy, oddly shaped flowers. But the plant is strong and has earned a place in my kitchen window (and heart) because the blooms have a peachy inner glow when sunlight shines through them. I find the contrast with the lavender captivating and have "named" it Janet's Imperfection. Not every plant has to be fabulous to be well loved. The final plant is a Dale Martens seedling that did not produce the intended bi-colored double. But of the 9 that grew from that batch, this is my favorite because it makes me happy every time I look at it. And that's the point of growing Streps, right?
