INTRODUCTION

This Sunday's image of the life the risen Christ shares with us is the image of friendship. We are called to serve others as Jesus came to serve; but for John's gospel, the image of servanthood is too hierarchical, too distant, to capture the essence of life with Christ. Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other. This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.


COMMUNION

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Georg Friedrich Handel (1685-1759) is one of the most well-known composers of the Baroque period along with J.S. Bach. Originally from Halle, Saxony, Handel studied the organ as a young boy under Friedrich Wilhelm Zachow, and he later learned the violin, harpsichord, and oboe as well. He would go on to study in Italy where he wrote his first oratorios before settling in London to write Italian-style opera. Handel was also a notable organist, and he composed more than 20 concertos for organ - most of which Handel used as intermission features during the performances of his oratorios. As Italian opera began to fade in popularity, Handel switched to composing oratorio in English - most famously including the *Messiah* in 1743. *Theodora* premiered in 1750, and it was Handel's penultimate oratorio. Though it was not popular in its day, *Theodora* was revived in the 20th century and is regarded as one of Handel's final masterpieces.

François Couperin (1668-1733), also known as Couperin le Grand ("the Great"), was a composer, keyboardist, and the most renowned of the Couperin family of musicians. The Couperin family were deeply engaged with the musical life of Paris throughout the 17th and 18th centuries. By the age of 10, François was offered the position as organist for the Church of Saint-Gervais, and he would later serve as the harpsichord teacher to the royal children beginning in 1694. Over his career, Couperin composed four books of suits for harpsichord, a variety of motets, and the *Concert Royaux* - special chamber music for the King's Sunday evening entertainments. He is most well-known for his *Leçons de Ténèbres* (c. 1715), a set of three vocal pieces for Holy Week. Early music expert Jordi Savall has described Couperin as the "poet-musician par excellence."
