President's ASL message

I received a card and award for being voted ODFL Volunteer of the Year 2023 by the ODFL Board. I am grateful for this recognition and would like to thank everyone involved.

I would also like to take this opportunity to provide some information about Ohio Deaf History Month. This is a month-long celebration that takes place from March 13 to April 15 every year. Ohio was the first state to recognize this event with the passing of Resolution 27 by Ohio legislators and the State Governor more than seven years ago.

There is also a National Deaf History Month, which used to be celebrated in March by the National Association of the Deaf (NAD).



However, last year, the NAD agreed to change it to April. The US Congresswoman, Joyce Beatty, is the sponsor of the National Deaf History Month bill, H. Resolution 290. The bill is still waiting for the US Congress members to vote on and pass it. Once passed, it will impact Ohio's Deaf History Month, and it will change from March to April. For now, Ohio is still following the March 13 to April 15 timeline.

Today, we are celebrating Deaf History Month!

Lastly, I wanted to mention that one of the ODFL Reps, JJ Bechhold, has put in a lot of effort to organize an ASL storyteller program. We discussed this idea with staff who work for the State Library of Ohio, and they felt that an ASL Storyteller would be a good affiliation with statewide Ohio libraries. 
Brad Race and I met with Ryan Burley, Ohio State Library Researcher. He showed us to the special collection

room where the very rare books are kept.

Ryan did some research and found some information about the production of boxes by the Ohio School for the Deaf (OSD) which I think sheds some light on the boxes.

One of the Books we looked at while you were here, "Historical and biographical souvenir of the Ohio School for the Deaf: seventy years' history of a notable seat of learning..." published in 1898 says that the Ohio School for the Deaf's Industrial department made 3,500 boxes a year for the State of Ohio for shipping bound volumes of reports. So, I'm thinking that our boxes may possibly have been made as part of that program.

The State Library of Ohio's Traveling Library program started in 1896 and by 1910 there were 1,387 boxes of 25-30 books that traveled around Ohio.


My name is JJ Bechhold. I'm the ODFL Columbus representative.


I recently completed a project that involved organizing my family's important documents. This included old school pictures of my mother, her report cards, and a letter from a friend telling a story about my grandmother, Amanda (McClintock) Hauswald, who founded the Supervisor School for the Deaf in East Cleveland back in 1930. I also included my own school records from Chamber School Deaf Day, East Cleveland, Greenview Jr High School in South Euclid.

I used to keep all these documents in a safe room in my house, but it's great to know that the Historical Society or Library Archives provides a temperature-controlled environment where they can be kept safe for many years to come.

Seven years ago, I donated seven boxes containing my family tree research, which my mother had been working on for over 30 years, to the Western Case Reserve Historical Society. It gave me peace of mind to know that these documents are now in a safe place where they can be preserved for historical purposes.

Lenora Culpher, the first DeafBlind student to graduate from Ohio School for the Deaf in 1919. She wanted to enroll in Gallaudet College, but she was not allowed because of her race. She was a mixed-race woman of Native American (Cherokee) and Black descent. The Ohio Deaf Friends of the Library has raised funds for a new gravestone in her honor, which will be placed at her resting place soon. Stay tuned for pictures in the future.



ASL Faculty and Library Collaborate to Celebrate National Deaf History Month

National Deaf History Month (NDHM), commemorated annually in April, brings attention to significant events in Deaf history, while also calling for reflection and activism. In celebration of NDHM, the University of Cincinnati's American Sign Language and Deaf Studies department and the <u>University of Cincinnati Libraries</u> have planned a number of collaborative projects with broad student impact throughout the spring term.

Several library exhibits are planned to open in April. The Walter C. Langsam Library will host two exhibits on the 4th and 5th floor lobbies, celebrating the history of Deaf achievements in the arts and media. Entitled *Deaf in Media*, the Langsam exhibits were co-curated by University of Cincinnati ASL faculty and the <u>College of Education</u>, <u>Criminal Justice and Human Services (CECH) Library</u> Head, with exhibit design and production by the UC Libraries Director of Library Communications and Design Co-op Student.

The CECH Library will also host two exhibits in April – one highlighting Deaf poets and one promoting children's books centering on Deaf characters and stories. The Deaf poets exhibit, a collaboration with the Elliston Poetry Room, will highlight poetry collections written by Deaf poets. These items were specially curated by a CECH Library student employee and Operations Supervisor. The children's book exhibit began with the purchase of new children's books, selected using a framework developed by students in the *Psychosocial Aspects of Deafness course*. Key tenants of the selection framework included attention to inclusivity, culture, stereotypes, authority, and accuracy. The exhibit design is a collaborative effort of the ASL Club and the CECH Library. Additionally, CECH Library staff and ASL faculty were awarded a Diversity Grant to fund the creation of this exhibit.

Lastly, an ASL story time will take place in April at Arlitt Child Development Center. Located on the University of Cincinnati campus, the Arlitt Center is one of the oldest demonstration preschools in the United States. Combining themes and rhymes already familiar to the class, ASL faculty and library staff are looking forward to delivering an ASL story time with our university's youngest students.[HJ(1] [FMK(2]

From the perspective of the library, the partnership with the ASL department has been educational and humbling. It's been a great honor to learn more about the Deaf community and Deaf culture by partnering on these educational and community outreach projects. We look forward to celebrating the exhibit openings and delivering an ASL story time alongside our ASL department colleagues in April.


Special Guest Speaker: Laurent Clerc's 4th Grandson, Laurent Holt | ZoomCast Speech


Holt shared how Laurent Clerc's name sign came to be: Clerc was accidentally burned in the face as a baby which left

OCRID has worked tirelessly to bring in Deaf presenters from Ohio and across the country in order to train both Deaf Interpreters (DI) and Hearing Interpreters (HI) how to improve their skills while working together as a team among a variety of partners. Practice like this does not come around often and as you can see the workshop attendees are enjoying every minute of it.

As you know, 70% of our undergraduates come from families with a combined annual income of less than \$50,000.


