 - Doug Tallamy, caterpillars, birds, monarchs, fireflies, all insects, not just pollinators
 - eliminate or reduce pesticide usage
 - Heather Holm, native bees, native plants, *leave the leaves*, and stems
- Doug Tallamy and Native Plants
 - native plants support insects – base of the food web
 - our gardens should be composed of at least 70% native plants
 - keystone species – plant a native oak, willow or cherry

- Lawn – Yawn
 - lots of lawn = lots of opportunities
 - the perfect lawn?
 - pesticides, water, energy, pollution, mosquito control companies
 - *No Mow May*
- WHERE DO WE START? Lawns – smaller & more environmentally friendly grasses
 - Fine Fescue Blends – *Earth Carpet Care-Free* Lawn Seed Blend – www.lacrosseseed.com or Prairie Nursery's *No Mow* Lawn Seed Mix – www.prairienursery.com
 - blends of creeping red, chewings, hard, blue & sheep's fescues
 - mix of turf type tall fescue blend (*Green Resistor*) and fine fescue blend (*Care-free*)
 - Tall Fescue Blend – *Green Resistor* Lawn Seed Blend + *Care-Free* blend
 - mix together in equal amount by weight and sow at 8#/1000 sq. ft.
 - prep, seeding and after-care, long-term maintenance, change mind-set – “weeds” are OK

- From Lawn to Meadow
 - Inspiration from Great Dixter - Fergus Garrett
 - Olbrich's first Meadow Garden – fescue lawn with minor bulbs
 - Olbrich's Moonlight Meadow – mix of short grasses, sedges and perennials - established with plugs. Great insect habitat.

- Journey of converting my mostly lawn dominated Yard to a Garden
 - *Betula populifolia* 'Whitespire Senior' - grey birch
 - *Tsuga canadensis* – Canadian hemlock
 - *Cornus sericea* 'Arctic Fire' – redosier dogwood
 - shrubs – less maintenance than perennials, require space, provide habitat and food (leaves and fruit)
 - *Hakonechloa macra* – Japanese hakone grass
 - *Chamaecyparis pisifera* 'Gold Mop' – sawara falsecypress
 - *Populus tremuloides* – trembling aspen
 - *Acer x* 'White Tigress' – striped maple
 - *Cornus alternifolia* - pagoda dogwood
 - *Cornus alternifolia* 'Bachone' – Gold Bullion pagoda dogwood
 - *Cornus x* 'Rutcan', Constellation ® - flowering dogwood (marginally hardy)
 - *Buxus x* 'Green Gem'- boxwood
 - *Taxus x media* 'Hicksii' – hicks yew
 - *Taxus x media* 'Tauntonii' – taunton yew
 - *Malus* 'Honey Crisp', 'Sweet 16', 'Zestar! ®' - apple
 - *Pyrus communis* 'Bartlett', 'D' Anjou' - pear
 - oyster mushrooms

- Sedge Meadow – the sedges
 - *Carex pensylvanica*, Common Oak Sedge
 - *Carex radiata*, Straight-styled Wood Sedge
 - *Carex rosea*, Curly-styled Wood Sedge
 - *Carex albicans*, White-tinged Sedge
 - *Carex flacca*, Blue-green Sedge
 - *Carex grisea*, Wood Gray Sedge
 - *Carex montana*, Mountain Sedge

- Nigel Dunnett-inspired log wall, Longshadow bird bowl, homemade bee houses
- Sedge Meadow - the perennials
 - *Anemone nemorosa*, wood anemone
 - *Athyrium filix-femina 'Lady in Red'*, lady fern
 - *Dicentra cucullaria*, Dutchman's breeches
 - *Dodecatheon meadia*, shooting star
 - *Epimedium 'Pink Champagne'*, Bishop's cap
 - *Eurybia (Aster) divaricata*, white wood aster
 - *Helleborus hybrid*, Hellebore
 - *Hosta 'Krossa Regal'*, Hosta
 - *Mertensia virginica*, Virginia bluebells
 - *Tiarella cordifolia*, foam flower
 - *Uvularia grandiflora*, large-flowered bellwort
- Be an eco-friendly gardener – be a little MESSY!
 - Leave the Leaves!
 - Leave the Stems and leave some wood logs & sticks too
 - Jumping Worms (Amynthas sp.)

- My Gravel Garden
 - *American Roots* – Nick & Allison McCullough
 - Design & Layout
 - 6"+ tall border/edge
 - 4-5" gravel depth – 3/16" washed quartzite chip or standard pea gravel
 - pot grown plants in 2 ½", 3 ½" or 4" (quart) pots
 - layout - random/naturalistic, stylized naturalistic, English border, etc.
 - tight spacing – 10-12" on average
 - Inspiration from gardens at Olbrich and Epic
 - Road Construction – fine fescue lawn to gravel garden
