Dear Falkner Swamp Friends,

Hope broke.

The top arm of the "E" on my red HOPE sign, that is, while I was putting away Christmas decorations in January.



Hope is a central theme of Advent and it is also one of the echoes of Easter. Not wishful thinking or optimism, Christian hope, says Sister Joan Chittester, "digs in the rubble of the heart for memory of God's promise to bring good out of evil and joy out of sadness and, on the basis of those memories of the past, takes new hope for the future. Even in the face of death. Even in the fear of loss. Even when our own private little worlds go to dust, as sooner or later, they always do."

The disciples found hope amidst the rubble of crucifixion and loss of dreams about their idea of a Messiah. Later, the apostle Paul would write to encourage the church in Rome, "And not only that, but we also boast in our afflictions, knowing that affliction produces endurance, ⁴ and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, ⁵ and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." (Romans 5:3-5)

Eastertide, the 50 day season that stretches beyond Easter Sunday, is an opportunity to renew hope, especially *participatory* hope that requires practice in order to manifest it. Not optimism, but deep trust in God's overturning of death, and the death-dealing ways of the world. Put away ruby slippers; break out your cleats.

Participatory hope looks like what William Barber II, now a civil rights activist and pastor, experienced when his family moved back to his parents' hometown of Roper, North Carolina, in the 1960s. Barber's grandmother would go out each Sunday afternoon to visit someone who was ill and suffering. "We'll be back shortly," she'd say, "We've got to go hope somebody."

Barber thought in her Carolina accent she was mispronouncing the word "help." Gradually it dawned on him that he heard her exactly as she said it. She was going out to hurting people, "people who were despised by the white society around them, downtrodden by the forces of poverty, and in the name of Christ she was 'hoping' them, bearing witness to the Lord whose wounds are still seen and to the Easter world that has overcome all hatred and oppression."*

Hope born of Christ and spread through the power of the Holy Spirit never breaks. It is born anew in us, revealed in us, shared through our words and actions.

My HOPE sign is whole again. It needed glue, a clamp, and some time. You can still see the crack. Participatory hope is like glue and the clamp; we spread it on the broken spot and hold each other tightly to help it stick. Suffering and pain leave scars but hope buffs them with life-giving meaning.



The cross is our symbol of Christian hope. As we walk this season of Eastertide, I will offer a sermon series on "the many meanings of the cross." We begin on April 7 with "The Great Reversal," where everything is backward! God reversed death at Easter, and so in our worship we begin starting with the end. Come and see!


Lucas Krause has decided for his Confirmation project, he will serve a lasagna lunch after worship on April 21^{st.} He asks if you can try to invite a friend to church service that Sunday and stay after for lunch. It will be a free will donation, for a local family. Lucas has come to learn this year that an 11 year old student at his school, Luis Maradiaga, was diagnosed with Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG), which is a rare and very aggressive, inoperable brain tumor. This family is in our Gilbertsville/Boyertown community and is facing difficulties in covering necessary expenses to help Luis.

What is DIPG?

DIPG is a type of tumor that starts in the brain stem, the part of the brain just above the back of the neck and connected to the spine. The brain stem controls breathing, heart rate and the nerves and muscles that help us see, hear, walk, talk and eat. These tumors are called gliomas because they grow from glial cells, a type of supportive cell in the brain.

SAVE-A-TAPE PROGRAM

Redner's is committed to the communities that we are a part of, and we want to help out the nonprofit organizations whose members shop in our stores. In this interest, Redner's developed our 1% Save-A-Tape program.

Here's how it works:



Your group must be a charitable or non-profit organization. Each member must stop at the store office or Customer Service area to get a Save-A-Tape card. By using this card each time you purchase merchandise at Redner's Warehouse Markets, your receipt will be designated as a Save-A-Tape customer receipt. To expedite your 1% payment, we ask that you total all the Save-A-Tape totals on your receipts. When you have accumulated enough tapes to receive a meaningful rebate, (at least \$50 rebate) please arrange them in an orderly fashion and give them to the Manager on duty. Please be sure to include verification of your totals and the entire register/sales receipts. (Example: calculator tape, computer print out, hand written summary etc.) They will then be verified and within eight weeks you will receive a check for 1% of the total amount of the tapes submitted. (Excluding items controlled by the government such as tax, milk and tobacco products) Laws prohibit discounting tax, milk or tobacco products.)
