### **MAYOR'S LETTER**

Dear Residents,

I want to wish everyone a belated Happy and Healthy New Year.

It is my honor and privilege to serve as Cranbury's Mayor in 2019, and I look forward to working with my colleagues on the Township Committee, Town staff and volunteers as we embark on an exciting 2019.

As most residents are aware, Cranbury is unique in that our Mayor is not an elected position, but one appointed by the Committee members. All of us on the TC were elected to the TC because of the faith and trust placed in us by the residents. None of us earned 100% of the vote which means we are accountable to all residents, and there are no individual or political mandates to try and push through. By appointing a Mayor each year, we put Cranbury first.

As we enter 2019, we'll be focused on our budget and ensuring we put our residents first. Our financial situation is in the best shape ever with continued growth anticipated and when compared to other town's in the best position of any town in the state over the past ten years. In fact, we're better than most towns have ever been financially.

We have a AAA Bond rating and compared to 10 years ago we have a lower operating budget, less debt and the highest surplus at any point in time.

I am also pleased to report that our two new officers are on the road and our initiative to slow traffic in the Township is coming to fruition. Around early April, you will see our Traffic Bureau back on the road. Based on resident feedback, we already noticed a significant change in vehicle speed, as well as in increased police activity in the second half of last year, and this will be our foundation in 2019. Everyone from our Police to our Township officials join in my statement that we will continue to use and review and all measures to make our roads safe.

As always, our staff and Township Committee stand ready to answer your questions and address your concerns.

As we again find ourselves amidst the winter months, we would like to share with our residents our Office of Emergency Management (OEM) Evacuation Plan. Be rest assured that should a weather event or natural disaster occur which places our community in danger, we will contact every single resident whether electronically or by direct contact to insure the safety of, and if needed, provide temporary shelter for our residents. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with our plan. Should you have any questions, you may call the Office of the Chief of Police. We will be happy to answer any questions/concerns.

#### **OEM Evacuation Procedure Info**

The primary official for evacuation functions within Cranbury Township is the Chief of Police.

The Police Chief directs and designates personnel to support traffic movement in, through and out of Cranbury Township. The Police Chief coordinates the evacuation of persons from locations within the Township that are, or may be impacted by, hazards that threaten life safety.

During evacuation operations the Police Chief will coordinate with other agencies to assist including, but not limited to, the Cranbury Fire Department, Cranbury First Aid Squad, Cranbury Township Public Works, Middlesex County Office of Emergency Management and the New Jersey State Police.

Hazards that may require evacuations within Cranbury include, but are not limited to:

- o Flooding
- Winter Snow Storm
- Severe Storms (nor'easters, heavy rains, thunder, lightning, hail)
- o Tornado
- o Earthquake
- Hazmat incident
- o Fire
- Terrorist Incident
- o Plane Crash

Actual areas of evacuation are event specific. Many factors will be considered in determining how and where an evacuation will occur.

Historically, evacuations have been rare within the Township. Such events are usually limited to a small number of individuals needing temporary relocation.

Public notification of evacuation orders will be disseminated in accordance with the Township's emergency communications procedures. This may include:

- Door-to-Door notifications
- Telephone alerts
- Mass Media outlets (radio, cable TV)
- Emergency Alert System
- Route alerting by emergency vehicles with PA systems
- o Nixle
- o Email / Social Media

The Cranbury Township Police Department and Cranbury Township Office of Emergency Management is fully aware of what needs to be done in order to make successful evacuation notifications to every single resident within this community. Rest assured that such notifications will be made either electronically or through direct contact with emergency personnel.

Additionally, Cranbury Township is prepared to designate and provide several locations to serve as reception / care centers. These locations may be used as heating / cooling centers, temporary shelter for limited evacuations or areas for residents awaiting transport to other, longer-term care and shelter centers through Middlesex County. Again, these locations are event specific.

### CRANBURY TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT

#### **RESIDENTIAL ALARM REGISTRATION**

Residents should annually complete the "Residential Alarm Form," which can be found on the Township website www.cranburytownship.org under "Police." This information is helpful in an emergency should assistance or police services be needed.

#### STREET LIGHT OUTAGE REPORTING

All residents are able to contact PSE&G directly if they need to report a street light outage in a neighborhood. PSE&G can be emailed at customerrelations@pseg.com or they can be called at 1-800-436-7734. If a resident is a PSE&G customer, they may also log in to their PSE&G "My Account" and report as well. It is important to note the pole number, street name, nearest cross street and an "in front of address" to help locate and complete the repair.

However, if a resident prefers to contact the Police Department and report it, in lieu of contacting PSE&G directly, they may call the Administrative Assistant to the Chief of Police directly at (609) 664-3238 and a report will be generated and PSE&G will be contacted immediately. Again, please have the information requested above for the Police Department as well. PSE&G has stated that the completion rate is approximately two to four weeks from date of receipt of order.

#### VACANT HOUSE REQUEST

Residents are to be advised that there is a secure "Vacant House Request" form on the Township website that can be used to notify the Police Department when a residence is left vacant for any period of time. This form should be used each and every time a resident is traveling and their residence will be left vacant.

The information provided on this form is sent securely to the Police Department. Please complete the form in its entirety, as the more information we receive from the homeowner, the better. If a resident is unable to utilize the website, they can feel free to call the Administrative Assistant to the Chief of Police at (609) 664-3238 to provide this important information. Officers are then alerted to the vacant homes during the specified timeframe.

Cranbury Township Police Department is seeking to fill crossing guard positions. Work hours: 8:00 to 8:30 am and 3:15 to 3:45 pm daily. For each half hour worked, you are paid for a full hour.

Uniforms/Safety Garments provided. Training also required — 20 hours hands-on and two hours classroom. Training provided to work all six posts throughout Cranbury. Background check required. ### SAFE MEDICATION DISPOSAL UNIT AT CRANBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Cranbury Township Police Department announces the addition of a Safe Medication Disposal Unit with Police Headquarters.

Chief Rickey A. Varga of the Cranbury Township Police Department would like to announce the addition of a new Safe Medication Disposal Unit located within the lobby of police headquarters. In conjunction with KidCents & The Rite Aid Foundation, a metal disposal unit mirroring a USPS Mailbox has been installed and is available for use weekdays, Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

This disposal unit is set up to place unwanted or expired medications in the drop-box to help prevent dangerous accidents with the children in your household. Chief Varga commented, "If we are able to help and possibly stop an overdose of any kind due to leftover or expired medications, then it is worth its weight in gold. To invest in the safe keeping of children in our community is our greatest endeavor."

The accepted medications are any prescribed medications (Schedule II-V controlled and noncontrolled substances) and any Over-the-counter medications. (Common dosage forms, such as tablets, capsules, ointments and patches.)

Unacceptable items are illegal drugs, needles, lotions or liquids, inhalers, aerosol cans, thermometers and hydrogen peroxide.

### **BOARD OF HEALTH**

#### **DOG AND CAT LICENSING**

Dog and cat licenses must be renewed every January. License forms can be found on the Township's website, www.cranburytownship.org or stop by the Township to complete one. Make checks payable to Cranbury Township or bring exact change to the Main Office at Town Hall.

#### If your pet passes away, please notify the Deputy Clerk at <u>jgolisano@cranbury-nj.com</u> so the licensing system can be amended.

Per state law, a license cannot be issued if the rabies certificate is not current. Failure to license <u>WILL</u> result in a summons being issued.

As of January 30th, 274 dogs and 45 cats have been licensed in the Township.

At the January 26<sup>th</sup> free Rabies Clinic, 49 dogs and 5 cats were vaccinated.

#### The next free Rabies Clinic will be on Saturday, September 21<sup>st</sup> from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. at the Cranbury Fire House.

Rabies Clinics in Middlesex: Please note that rabies clinics are held in most towns in the county all year long. Please check online at the Township website or contact Cranbury's Health Officer, at 799-0909 x1219, for more information on others. As always, the clinics are free of charge.

May 14th is Voter Registration Deadline for **<u>Primary</u>** Election (21 days before election) per N.J.S.A. 19:31-6



### **TAX COLLECTOR**

The Tax Collector's Office is located in the Municipal Building. Payments can be dropped off during normal business hours. It is the Collector's responsibility to collect all taxes from the residents of Cranbury.

Taxes are due quarterly: February 1st, May 1st, August 1st, and November 1st. There is a 10-day grace period for each quarter and if the 10th should fall on a Saturday, Sunday or even a holiday, the grace period is extended to the next business day. The bill you receive has 3rd and 4th quarters of the current year and 1st and 2nd of the following year.



Your tax stubs clearly state when the payments are due. Your tax stub should accompany your payment. If a receipt is needed, you **must mail the entire bill with an enclosed self-address stamped envelope**. If the entire bill is not enclosed your check will serve as your receipt.

If you use **bill pay** through your bank, please clearly identify your property with the address or block and lot in the memo line.

You may qualify for one of the following: Veterans, Senior Citizen, Widow, and Disabled Person. Call the Tax Assessor or Collector for more information.

#### PARKS COMMISSION

Winter is typically not the busiest time people use our parks, but there are a number of things you can do now. Cranbury Brook Preserve is a beautiful natural trail along Cranbury Brook where people can walk, jog, cross-country ski, bird watch. Whitethroated sparrows, hooded mergansers and yellowrumped warblers are just a few winter-only birds you can see along with year-round great blue herons, bald eagles, woodpeckers, and Northern cardinals or just enjoy nature from the benches along the trail. Reinhardt Preserve, Hagerty, Unami Woods, and Shadow Oaks all offer similar opportunities in a natural setting for outdoor enthusiasts. Heritage Park and its paved walkways are popular for walkers and joggers year-round. And on the occasional warm winter day, you can play basketball, tennis or cook out in Village Park or kick a ball around there or in Millstone Park and the West fields.

For history buffs, you can see barns dating to the 1700s in Barn Park, the farmland from Unami Woods, the monuments for World War I, Civil War and other veterans in Memorial Park and the sign there showing the historical uses on Brainerd Lake back to the 1800s and George Washington's trip through Cranbury to the Battle of Monmouth in 1778. There are also children's play areas in Village, Heritage and Millstone Parks. You can find out where these parks are located by going on the Township website (c<u>ranburytownship.org</u>), clicking on "Parks and Open Spaces" on the left side, and then on the specific park you'd like to see.

The Parks Commission is the steward of your parks. To that end, over the past two years and with the generous support of the Township Committee, we began a campaign to improve and enhance our parks. Working with our excellent Department of Public Works to minimize out of pocket costs, we have, among other items, installed signs to identify our parks, planted shrubs and flowers for safety and beauty, and repaired the fifty-year old fence in Village Park. This year we plan to focus on Village Park and repair the gazebo and pavilion, clean up the bike path and do other improvements.

Lastly, we seek your feedback as to what elements of our parks you like and use, don't like, and what additional elements you would like us to provide. ### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

#### **SNOW AND PLOWING**

This winter season has been pretty mild with the cold temperatures and the absence of snow - so far! As a reminder, when snowfalls are forecasted, it is best to remove vehicles, trash/recycle cans, basketball hoops, and other property from the streets <u>before</u> snow accumulation. This will help the County and the Township plow trucks do their jobs efficiently and will prevent any possible damage to personal property during the snow plowing process.

If you would like to park your vehicle where it can be safe from the snow plows, municipal parking lots are available for overnight parking during snow events Park Place West, in front of the senior complex; four public parking spots are located near the entrance of the Preserve, just off North Main Street; and there's Village Park.

State law stipulates accumulated ice and snow on vehicles must be removed it before driving, especially from the hood, windows and roof. For more information on this law and winter driving tips visit: <u>http://www.nj.gov/oag/hts/ice-and-snow.html</u>

Cranbury Township Local Ordinance Chapter 130-40 states that *throwing*, *placing or depositing snow or ice in the street or sidewalk is prohibited*. Any snow-blown or shoveled snow onto the street can be blasted onto your neighbor's property/driveway by the snow plows during plowing process. Be a thoughtful neighbor and shovel snow onto your lawn. As it melts, it will naturally percolate into ground, supplying water for your lawns, bulbs, gardens, trees and plants.

Cranbury has always been a neighborly town. If you live next to someone who could use help shoveling or have a fire hydrant near your property, take a few extra neighborly moments to help clear the snow fall.

#### SPRING LEAF COLLECTION

Soon warmer and sunnier weather will be upon us! Along with spring blossoms and clearing out the garden is the spring leaf collection program. **Leaf**  collection will begin March 26<sup>th</sup> and the final collection begins on April 22<sup>nd</sup>. It is requested not to commingle any branches/chipping, river rocks, bricks, mulch or any other debris in with the leaf piles for collection. Doing so will cause machinery malfunction or even worse, personnel injury. If your leaf pile has a mix of debris, it will not be collected.

For residents living in an area where public parking is permitted, please place the leaf piles close to a driveway entrance, near a street corner or an opening between parked cars so the DPW can easily access the piles for collection. It is a good idea to call 609-664-3129 and leave a message where you have placed your leaf pile for collection.

Collecting leaf piles throughout Cranbury Township takes approximately 1-1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> weeks depending on amount of leaves at the curb, weather and personnel. Please place your last pile of leaves at the curb for collection weekend of April 20<sup>th</sup>. The **final** collection of leaves will be during the week of April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Once your leaf pile has been collected, do not replenish it. Your patience is greatly appreciated. With your cooperation and the DPW crew, our Town and streetscape will be beautiful!

#### **CALL BEFORE YOU DIG**

Whether you're planning to add onto your home, landscape, install a walk, or have any reason to dig on your property, a phone call must be placed for a free mark out for any underground utility that is located on your property. Don't break the law, call 1-800-272-1000 or 811 before you dig!

#### **CURBSIDE CHIPPING SERVICE**

The fall leaf collection has ended without any major snows in December. The DPW thanks you for getting your leaves out to curb. A total of seven passes have been made throughout the entire Township for leaf collection.

Chipping of brush and branches commences on the third Wednesday each month throughout the year. This is the start date and not necessarily the day the DPW crew will be in front of your house chipping. Brush/Chipping must be at the curb by 7am.

The regulations below are for the normal monthly curbside shipping service according to Township Code Chapters §69 and §121. It seems like a lot but after reading through, an understanding of how these regulations aid the DPW to move swiftly and efficiently becomes evident.

- Residents must notify the DPW of requests for chipping services by the Monday before the third Wednesday of the month.
- Brush should be placed curbside no sooner than the weekend preceding the third Wednesday of each month.
- 3. All material to be chipped should be placed at the curb by 7:00 a.m. by the scheduled collection date (third Wednesday of the month). Material placed curbside after the scheduled collection date or time will not be chipped.
- All material should be stacked parallel to the curb or as near to the curb as possible, not in the street or on the sidewalk. Place the

larger cut branch ends together so they follow the flow of traffic. Incorrect placement is considered to be in violation of the code and may not be collected.

- Items must be placed parallel on the curb or along the street that is directly abutting your property line.
- Branches exceeding 8" diameter cannot be chipped. Brush should be at least 3' in length. Although 3' is the minimum length, longer branches are much easier to chip.
- Hedge clippings, twigs and small branches less than 3' (but not less than 1') must be bundled with string only (NO WIRE) and free of foreign debris, such as, stones, dirt, metal, sweepings and rakings.
- No construction material or landscape construction material and debris, lumber, mulch, roots, stumps, or sand and soil at the curb will be collected.

The intention is to help you understand the protocol of this valuable chipping service. Noncompliance notices will be issued. The first 3 notices are warning notices. The 4<sup>th</sup> notice will result in a \$500 a day fine. If you have any questions about the above regulations, please call 609-664-3129.

Depending on the amount of chipping at the curb, the weather, machinery cooperation, and personnel, this service can take approximately  $1 - 1\frac{1}{2}$  weeks to complete. We ask for your patience while the DPW works the route:

#### **CLEAN UP WEEKENDS 2019**

May 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> and October 5th & 6<sup>th</sup> are the scheduled dates for the two Clean-up Weekends. Bring your acceptable materials to the DPW Yard at 100 Dey Road. The hours of operation will be 9:00 am to 3:00 pm, rain or shine. The DPW crew will be on site to help unload your unwanted discards.

Acceptable materials include household items that are too large to fit inside your trash tote, like mattresses, lawn furniture and other large bulky items. If you are uncertain if an item is acceptable, please call 609-664-3129.

This service is open to Cranbury residents only. Be prepared to show proof of residency, such as a tax bill. Your driver license may indicate 'Cranbury NJ' but it is not necessarily Cranbury Township where you reside. View your tax bill; this will indicate what municipality you live in.

NO household trash, paint or hazardous waste items will be accepted. Please do not be sneaky and leave hazardous waste items at the DPW site for personnel to find.

#### SHARPS DISPOSAL

People use sharps to treat various medical conditions at home that could include allergies, hepatitis, multiple sclerosis, arthritis, psoriasis, HIV/aids, osteoporosis, cancer, infertility or diabetes.

### **DROP OFF PAINT PROGRAM**

Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management (MCDSWM) organizes a Paint Drop-Off Program for latex paint, oil based paint, stains, varnishes, lacquers, thinners, spray aerosol paint, and driveway sealer for all Middlesex County residents. Items must be labeled and in original containers. Please do not bring dried out latex paint cans (they can be disposed of in the regular trash), empty containers, or hazardous waste for disposal. #### STREET SWEEPING

In preparation of the 2019 Memorial Day Parade on May 27th, Cranbury Township has arranged to have all Township roads swept. The Township is scheduled to be swept on May 20<sup>th</sup>, 21<sup>st</sup>, and 22<sup>nd</sup>. Please avoid parking on the streets in the early morning on these dates. Doing so will allow the sweeper to easily and expediently sweep the streets. Once the streets have been swept, parking will be allowed.

Three available lots are available for overnight parking to help avoid parking on the street during the early morning sweep. The Municipal lot on Park Place West (in front of the senior complex); four off-street parking lots near the entrance of Cranbury Brook Preserve; and Village Park has two available lots available for overnight parking. Parking is on a first come basis. It is realized that the sweeping may pose an inconvenience but your cooperation in keeping vehicles and personal property off the streets during this time is greatly appreciated.

#### **2019 RECYCLING & COLLECTION GUIDE**

There are two 2019 date changes in the curbside recycle program. Memorial Day, May 27<sup>th</sup>, pick up date changed to June 1<sup>st</sup>; Labor Day, September 2nd, pick up changed to September 7<sup>th</sup>.

Do not place recyclables in large plastic bags! The plastic bags clog the machinery at the recycling facility causing delays and malfunctions of the sorting equipment. A more ideal solution is to use a large plastic 32-35 gallon container found at a discount store. Or if you would like to purchase an extra blue 20-gallon container, call 609-664-3129 for stock availability.

Many people are not aware that cardboard is a NJ mandatory item that must be recycled. Don't throw cardboard into your trash--it's like throwing money into (and filling up) the landfill. Be a better recycler, flatten, fold, and tie the cardboard into a stack, then set it out for collection along with your other curbside recyclables.

As usual, if your recyclables were out at the curb in time but were not collected, call 1-800-488-MCIA within 24 hours to report the missed stop. If you delay, the recyclables may not be picked up until the next scheduled collection date.

Residents moving out of Cranbury are requested to leave the blue recycling bins for the next homeowner.

#### WHAT'S IN YOUR TRASH CONTAINER?

Did you know that you can reduce the amount of stuff taken to the landfill by being more careful about not throwing cardboard, recyclable containers, EPS (expand polystyrene can be recycled at the Shed) or other recyclable items in it? Take a moment and ask yourself if the item you're about to toss into the garbage can be recycled or reused? You'll do the environment and planet earth some good!

#### 2019 HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DROP OFF PROGRAM

### BATTERY RECYCLING COLLECTION PROGRAM

In addition to the rechargeable & button battery recycle program, Cranbury Township now

collects household/single use batteries in Town Hall, DPW Office.

- **HOUSEHOLD/SINGLE USE BATTERIES**: a dedicated recycling collection box is located in Town Hall, DPW Office to collect AA, AAA, C, D, and 9 volt batteries. If a battery is leaking or corroded, toss it into the trash. They cannot be mailed or recycled.
- **RECHARGABLE & BUTTON BATTERIES**: bring to Town Hall, DPW Office. They include power tools, all cellphones, laptop batteries, button batteries and rechargeable batteries. Batteries must weigh less than 11 pounds.

-Household/single use and rechargeable batteries must be deposited into different boxes. Do not commingle them, keep them separated!!! All battery ends must be tape to secure that they do not touch and spark during delivery.

Media e-waste (CDs, DVDs, VHS tapes are limited to 25 per household), cell phones, button, household and rechargeable batteries can be dropped off in the DPW office at Town Hall, during business hours. Due to the cost of these programs, service is available for Cranbury residents only. **ALL DROP-OFF RECYCLE PROGRAM BOXES ARE LOCATED IN THE DPW OFFICE at TOWN HALL**.





#### **RECYCLE SHED and RECYCLING for CRANBURY RESIDENTS**

The Recycle Shed is located at the DPW Yard, 100 Dey Road. It is open on the first Friday of the month, unless it is a legal holiday, then it is the second Friday, from 9 am-12 pm, for your convenience.

Here is a list of acceptable e-waste items at the Recycle Shed. Please adhere to this list.

The recycle vendor will charge an additional per pound fee for any items not on the above list AND for packed in original cartons. Please unpack the items prior to drop off, do not bring any items in original cartons.

**Clean formed polystyrene** (EPS) will be accepted during open hours. White (only white), clean (tape & address labels removed) can be accepted. Packing peanuts and food/cup products are not acceptable. Clean packing peanuts may be brought to any UPS or Pak Mail location.

Please do not leave any of the acceptable items at the Shed when it is not open. Items must be stored inside and kept clean from the elements. Also, the wind will easily carry these light weight items to parts unknown.

Large e-waste items can be scheduled for pick-up service with the White Goods program. There is a fee of \$10 per item. Pick-up service is scheduled for the  $2^{nd}$  Wednesday of the month and arrangements must be made the Monday prior to this day. Call 609-664-3129 to make arrangements.

Scrap metal (bikes, metal/aluminum lawn furniture, metal fence posts, curtain rods, metal bed frames, etc.) or other ferrous metals **do not** belong in the trash destined for the landfill. These items can be recycled and made into other products. Also accepted are white goods (washers, dryers, refrigerators, window a/c units, dehumidifiers, etc.). If an item is too large for you to deliver yourself, arrange to have the DPW pick up the white goods for only \$10 per item (cash or check only). To schedule and pay for this service call 609-664-3129 no later than the Monday prior to the scheduled second Wednesday. This service is available for Cranbury residents only.

State law mandates that appliances containing Freon must have this gas extracted. Cranbury Township hires a responsible vendor to extract Freon containing appliances.

If you have recycling questions, concerns or ideas, please call 609-664-3129. Future generations will thank you for being a responsible recycler!

#### **RECYCLE COACH**<sup>TM</sup>

Have you noticed the changes on the <u>http://cranburytownship.org/recycling main.html</u>? Cranbury now participates with Recycle Coach<sup>TM</sup>. This waste wise app will help you recycle an item that you might be uncertain how or where it should be recycled. It has a calendar to remind you of upcoming recycling dates like curbside collection dates, chipping / leaf collection dates, clean-up weekends, it includes all the free recycling programs info offered by the MCDSWM (Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste) like shred events, paint drop-off days, and household hazardous waste days.

The Recycle Coach<sup>TM</sup> app works with Amazon Alexa and Google Assistant! The app is free to download and available on the Township website or from the <u>iTunes Store</u> and <u>Google Play</u>. There is a quick one- time set-up process to personalize the information to where you live that includes setting up your personalized pick-up and event schedule.

The Township of Cranbury's Recycle Coach<sup>TM</sup> app also asks the provocative question 'What type of recycler are you?' This 3-minute quiz provides you with a comprehensive evaluation based on several criteria, including knowledge about what should and should not be recycled in Cranbury.

The State of NJ, MCDSW and Cranbury Township have worked hard to offer this free service to you.

#### Greetings from the Cranbury School Wellness and Sustainability Council

Have you ever considered the amount of waste you personally create? On average, each American creates 4.5 pounds of garbage per day. You read that correctly... 4.5 pounds of garbage per day! Multiply that by 365 days per year and you will find each American is creating 1,642.5 pounds of garbage per year!



Students throughout Cranbury School are learning small ways to reduce the waste they create. Recycling bins can be found in each classroom and in the cafeteria. Students are encouraged to place paper, plastic, and metal in the recycling bins. Additionally, each classroom has a Terracycle box to collect small chip bags and mini muffin wrappers. Terracycle is a global company based in Trenton, New Jersey that recycles hard-to-recycle waste. If you are unfamiliar with Terracycle, you may wish to visit the Terracycle website to company's efforts learn more about this to reduce global waste. https://www.terracycle.com/en-US/





Global food waste has also been integrated into the sustainability curriculum. Last year, students in 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade used STEM activities to investigate global food waste. The students examined their own beliefs and values to make decisions related to food waste. They debated important issues related to food waste such as human population growth, food waste per country, ugly food, landfills, methane gas, food deserts, and food sustainability all the while respecting and hearing the opinions of other students. They evaluated possible solutions to food waste around the world. They investigated the impacts that food waste has on the environment. The students used the Technological Design Process to identify the problem, propose designs, and possible solutions. Students developed a variety of strategies to calculate the amount of food waste per capita and created Google Slide presentations of their research, which were featured at Cranbury School's First Harvest Day Celebration last May.

#### **ZERO WASTE LUNCH**

Making efforts to reduce your waste may be easier than you think. The Wellness & Sustainability Council would like to encourage you to pack a zero waste lunch for your child. Zero waste lunch?! It can be done! Here are some recommendations for packing a zero waste lunch:

- Pack your child's lunch in a reusable lunch bag or lunch box
- Pack a cloth napkin and reusable utensils
- Put food in reusable food and drink containers
- Provide your child with a reusable water bottle. Cranbury School has 3 water bottle refilling stations. One is in the K-1 hallway, one is in the cafeteria, and one is in the large gymnasium.
- If you must use a disposable plastic bag, encourage your child to bring it home so it can be washed out and reused.
- Purchase snacks for your child in bulk size and repack the snacks in individual reusable containers.
- Pack fresh fruit for your child since it does not require any additional packaging.

### SHADE TREE COMMISSION

### **Three Winter Benefits of Trees**



#### **Utility Savings**

Deciduous trees planted on the south/ south-east side of the house allow the sun's rays to reach through windows and help heat homes and offices during peak daylight hours in winter. Just like summer when the leafed-out trees provide shade that helps keep buildings cool and can reduce air-conditioning costs, heating costs can be reduced in winter. Appropriate species planted in the right locations are a key to this strategy.

#### **Visual Aesthetics**

Take time to notice details in the architecture of trees. Evergreens stand out now among the bare-branched trees. Many trees have a characteristic shape such as rounded crown, pyramidal, vase-shaped, weeping, etc. Deciduous trees exhibit their branching style beautifully in winter. Upon close observation you can see the buds on the branch tips that were formed in late summer. Although present all winter they only become obvious when they begin to swell in the spring. Watch then as trees begin to color-up with buds.

#### Food for Feathered and Furry Neighbors

Many trees improve life for birds and mammals in winter by offering food and shelter. Species include Canadian hemlock, crabapple, staghorn sumac, persimmon, American holly, winterberry, white pine, Norway spruce.

#### **Updated HPC Certificate of Approval Form**

HPC has recently updated the Certificate of Approval form and instructions which hopefully will make it easier to fill out the required information. The links for the updated HPC Application Form and the reference sheet for Cranbury Township Approval Requirements relating to HPC/Zoning/Engineering/Construction are provided below. It should be noted that the HPC Application for Certificate of Approval form needs to be filled out and submitted to Linda Scott, HPC Administrator, prior to beginning any exterior renovations (changes to exterior appearance) or repairs (ordinary maintenance or repairs). Applications for exterior renovations will be reviewed by HPC at a regularly-scheduled meeting and be approved if project is historically appropriate for the structure. Minor Applications for maintenance or repairs can be approved by the HPC Administrator/HPC Chair outside of a regularly scheduled meeting. Renovations may also require zoning, engineering or construction permits, therefore HPC approval is contingent on property owner obtaining the proper permits. Emergency repairs are permitted, however an HPC Application form is still required to be submitted

Some examples:

Driveways, Fences and Sheds in the historic district require HPC & possibly Zoning/Engineering/Construction approvals.

Roofing only requires HPC approval.

Painting does not require HPC approval.

Signage in the Historic District requires HPC, Zoning & Construction approvals.
