Don oversees and coordinates outreach volunteers for The Seeing Eye's Pennies for Puppies and Dollars for Dogs programs, which raises over \$100,000 annually. He even developed and implemented a computer system to help manage the entire process.

Don gave us an overview of The Seeing Eye, including its history, and its breeding, puppy raising, and training programs.

He explained how the on-site training of recipients has helped them be “ordinary people” with the help of their Seeing Eye dogs.

Each year, approximately 260 people from across the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico, come to Morristown, N.J. to train with a new Seeing Eye® dog. The Seeing Eye tuition is \$150 for the first dog, \$50 for each subsequent dog, and just \$1 for veterans of the military. The tuition covers the dog, travel expenses, room and board, specialized training in the care and use of their dog, and the dog’s equipment. The rates have been unchanged since the early 1930s, despite the cost to breed, raise and train a Seeing Eye dog rising to more than \$60,000 today. The funds to cover the expenses are donated by private individuals, corporations, bequests and other planned gifts.

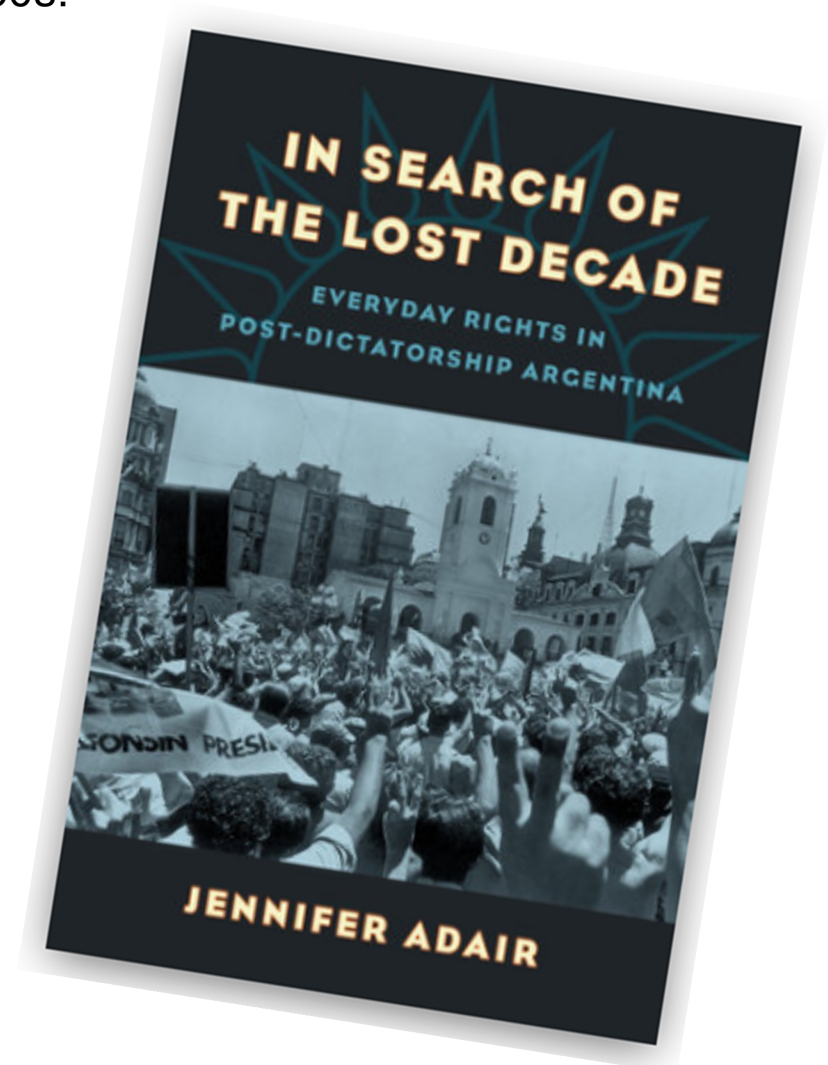


Professor Adair was awarded a fellowship grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) in recognition of her groundbreaking academic research on the history of Argentina's transition to a democracy in the 1980s.

Our guest speaker was Jennifer Adair, PhD, and Associate Professor at Fairfield University, and daughter of WCC member Nancy Adair.
