stories as they develop and grow in that 'forest of stories.'



As a Regional Representative, your role will be to help identify and address major issues of concern to DKG U.S. Forum members and to provide current information regarding pending federal legislation affecting women, children, and education. In addition, you will collaborate with state U.S. Forum representatives, interested members, and state presidents.

Importantly, you will also help to plan and organize the 2026 National Legislative Seminar in Washington DC, which typically is a four-day seminar that offers attendees many opportunities to learn and practice advocacy skills, network with DKG members, discuss important issues, meet with congressional representatives; hear legislative briefings; and, participate in historical tours.
