2nd Vice President message

Member retention and recruitment still serve as main focal points for our organization. The 2nd Vice Presidents play a pivotal role regarding membership for their chapters. They keep valid and up-to-date membership information for DKG to function properly. In addition, accurate membership data is studied and discussed for suggestions and recommendations for state and chapter organizations and used for budgeting and event planning. They develop and support a membership plan to sustain and expand the chapter's membership. And they, along with other chapter officers, help to empower our members and encourage them to take on an active role in the Society.

Some simple ways to give members a sense of belonging and to keep them actively engaged is for them to reach out and encourage chapter members to serve as a mentor in some capacity, stay current on worldwide issues by assisting in a committee, program, or leadership role, foster fellowship among our DKG sisters through on-going communication, and help to plan and participate in meaningful chapter activities and events. Communication is key. Offering various modes of communication (e.g., text, email, phone call) can help to build relationships. Talking with and listening to members about what they care about builds trust and friendship while providing personal and professional support and encouragement for members with a mode of communication in which they are comfortable.

Mentoring is the act or process of helping and guiding another person to support their personal and professional development. Mentoring is great for relationship building, allowing the mentor to offer and share their knowledge with the mentee, who grows through the experience. Here are a few ideas about mentorship that you may want to incorporate into your chapter goals.

- The new Member Sponsor can sit with the mentee at meetings, respond to questions, ask questions, and communicate regularly with the mentee in between meetings.
- A chapter committee chair can encourage members to take on active roles through committee work to engage them in activities and events while helping them develop their leadership skills and remain active.
- Chapter officers can help to mentor members following in the line of succession. They communicate, ask questions, and offer help and guidance in performing their role. They also invite members to think about becoming a future officer and highlight skills, abilities, or talents each member can offer to the chapter while helping keep members actively engaged.
- Other members can mentor each other; it's a way to share the many skills members bring to DKG. Everyone has a talent, strength, or skill they can offer to the chapter. For example, young educators are knowledgeable in technology and would be willing to share with and teach their chapter members.

Remember that we are more likely to retain members if we keep them actively engaged. Mentorship opportunities are a simple way to keep members in our chapters and the Society while reminding us of our purpose and connection with other women educators.

Finance committee news

Since the last publication of Aloha i ke Akea, the Finance Committee has not received questions. However, if there are last-minute questions about the state dues, please forward them to hiratap@byuh.edu.

The suggested increase in state dues is proposed with concern to continue programs such as scholarships, state conferences and conventions, and taxes. Therefore, a suggestion for your next chapter meeting is to discuss a potential increase in dues:

- If your chapter plans to vote "yes" for the state dues increase of \$5.00 incrementally for the next three years resulting in an increase of \$15 by 2026, your chapter should review how the increase will affect your yearly chapter dues. Each chapter collects a different amount for chapter dues, where dues are distributed to the International and States. The remaining amount is for chapter activities.
- If your chapter plans to vote "no," there might not be a need for chapter discussion.

DKG is approaching its 75th birthday in 2024. HSO must continue to unite our sisters in programs and activities that promote professional and personal growth and excellence in education. This can only be accomplished with adequate funds for HSO.

Since initiating the Supporting Early Educators (SEE) project, *Theta* has enthusiastically taken on the challenge. In charge of the Pearl City/Waipahu Complex Area, Theta first volunteered at all of the new teacher meetings, helping wherever and whenever we could.

Celebrating Japan State's 10th anniversary

Sixteen travelers representing 4 Hawai'i chapters and DKG International traveled to Osaka, Japan, on Tuesday, October 18, 2022. Excited yet anxious to join our Japan State sisters in celebrating their 10th anniversary, we were well acquainted with each other, yet unsure of what to expect in Kochi. Upon reaching Kochi, *Carole Mitsuyoshi-Sugai* (*Kappa*) stated, "We get along so well now that we no longer represent our chapters, we represent DKG Hawai'i State."

Celebrating Japan State's 10th anniversary included a whirlwind of activities chaired by Yasuko Kita. Our initial meeting with the Kochi sisters was at dinner at Coco's Restaurant. It was great to meet the members of Japan State, but dinner served by a robot was the highlight of our first meal.

The next day was a cultural experience at Chikurinji Temple. We enjoyed learning to play a 1-string koto and were treated to a calligraphy demonstration by Taeko Ogawa depicting her passion for world peace. She gave each Hawai'i State member a book, "Spirit of Hiroshima, Transcending Generations



from Hiroshima to the World." She brushed characters with messages of peace on four scrolls that were then gifted to members of our group. We practiced calligraphy writing the characters for "Peace."

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News from Delta

Delta Chapter celebrated the induction of Dr. Doris Ching to the Roosevelt High School Hall of Fame. Ever humble, Doris tends to downplay her many accomplishments: Forty years at the University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa (UHM) as an administrative and educational role model and champion of students, first female vice president for student affairs, the first woman of color and first Asian Pacific Islander elected president of the National Associate of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA), UHM College of Education Distinguished Alumna, recipient of the Hawaii Okinawan Association Legacy Award as well as the NASPA Legacy Award. Recognizing her many amazing talents, ten years after Doris "officially retired from, but still involved" in the UHM system, she was appointed interim chancellor at the University of Hawai'i at West O'ahu. Doris has been a member of Delta Chapter for over 48 years, served as Chapter President and State Program of Work Committee Chairwoman, and currently serves as recording secretary.

Past Chapter President *Pua Ka'ai* is leading the chapter's participation in the State's Early Career Educators initiative by expanding the definition to include inexperienced teachers, experienced teachers, and part-time teachers who are new to the culture of the school. To that end, 30 copies of *Feeling Grateful* by Kobi Yamada will be distributed to "new" teachers at Mid-Pacific Institute and another school yet to be selected. The message: gratitude transforms everything it touches.

Delta is excited about finally being able to offer face-to-face Chapter meetings and Zoom meetings. Our first meeting of the year was a planning session with President *Gale Ikeda* challenging members to plan meetings aligned with our chosen SAP goals.

Since October is Farm to School month, our second meeting featured Samuel Kakazu, Jr. His informative presentation shared about the Farm to School program, which will enhance the total well-being of students, families, and school and community food systems. This program is comprised of three core elements: 1) school gardens and farms, 2) experiential education, and 3) school food improvement through local procurement. *-Karen Koles, Delta*

Excitement followed when it was announced that *Eileen Clarke* (*Iota*) and her husband, Hugh Lee, would be dressed in Japanese wedding *kimono* and *kazari* and groom's *hakama*. *Donna Shiroma* (*Kappa*) and her husband, Dallas, were dressed as *nakahodo*, the matchmakers who serve as a go-between for the couple. Everyone in the group selected *kimonos* and was dressed by an expert. Dressing in *kimono* provided an appreciation of how Japanese women stood with straight postures and walked with small steps.



On Sunday, the 10th Anniversary Celebration began with greetings from Japan State. Messages of congratulations from Governor David Ige were presented by *Gail Ogawa (Kappa)* and from Mayor Rick Blangiardi, presented by *Kathy Sakuda (Iota)*. HSO sisters performed a hula as a gift to the Japan State sisters. The program included slides of the 10-year history of Japan State. A touching moment was the presentation of a certificate of appreciation from Japan State to Japan member Shige Yamanaka, who started the "Kochi Kimono Wearing Class" and retired after 50 years of teaching *kimono* dressing. Yamanaka sensei was a charter member of DKG Japan and promoted Japanese culture at DKG International events. Another *sugoi* moment was a video showcasing the K-9 students of Sensei Miwa Kawagoe from Tosayama Gakusya. HSO members were each given gifts created by the students. Finally, an "aha" moment was expressed by *Soo Boo Tan (Mu)*, who realized that Japan State included traditional classroom teachers as well as a diverse group of educators who taught opera singing, nursing, calligraphy, and kimono dressing.

On Monday, Hawai'i and Kochi sisters visited Kochi dignitaries. HSO, accompanied by DKG International President *Debra LeBlanc* and her sister, Julie Anderson, represented DKG with dignity and professionalism when meeting with the Deputy Governor, Hirouki Inoue. She was interviewed by KUTV, Japan, where she "encouraged the mentoring of teachers in the country, promoting literacy for all children, and collaborating to support early teachers." The group then visited Mayor Seiya Okazaki. Both the Deputy Governor and Mayor received certificates from DKG International. *Ellen Tanoura (Mu)*



presented gifts and lei as Eileen addressed the group in Japanese, "Despite our geographical distance, differing educational systems, and interesting customs and cultures, we are amazingly united as women educators."

After the visits, activities included washi and soba making. Then, after a stop for drone shots on the Nagoya Sunken Bridge over the Niyodo River, we continued to the Ryōma Sakamoto Museum. Sakamoto Ryōma of Tosa - now Kochi Prefecture- is honored as he was one of Japan's favorite historical figures known for his efforts to overthrow the shogunate 150 years ago.

After three busy days, the Hawai'i sisters said their aloha to the Japan sisters. The memories formed a bond for sisters of both states to continue collaborating and strengthening relationships that will endure as we meet at regional conferences and international conventions. At the end of this incredible trip, we leave each other with memories that will forever influence our DKG lives.
