Getting started.

- · Call Social Security to confirm your eligibility. If you're already collecting Social Security, you'll automatically be enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B when you turn 65.
- · If you're employed, ask your employer about company-sponsored health benefits.

- To learn whether you're eligible for financial help with the costs of Medicare, call your state's Medical Assistance or Medicaid office.

Medicare choices.

After you enroll in Original Medicare (Parts A and B), there are two ways to get additional coverage since Original Medicare does not cover all medical expenses and does not cover prescription drugs.

Medicare Supplement Insurance Offered by private companies



Helps pay some of the out-of-pocket costs that come with Original Medicare

Medicare Part D Plan

Offered by private companies



Helps pay for prescription drugs

Medicare Advantage Plan Offered by private companies



Combines Part A (hospital insurance) and Part B (medical insurance) in one plan



Usually includes prescription drug coverage



May offer additional benefits not provided by Original Medicare
