### A Reunion Message from Pastor Jim

"But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe---the best one---and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate." ---Luke 15:22-24

A couple of weeks ago a member of Webster Church asked me if I was losing weight. "Oh no!" I thought, "That's a sure sign that I've gained weight!" And I had. I spent my entire summer vacation eating. No one killed a fatted calf for me but everywhere I went there were enormous amounts of food. You see, I spent my summer vacation attending reunion after reunion after reunion. I think the tradition of providing hospitality with large amounts of food dates all the way back to Genesis 18 when God in the form of three travelers reunited with Abram and Sari and promised to give them their first-born child.

My series of summer reunions started with a drive to Dublin, Ohio where Mike and I visited with Vilma Duffy, a long-time member of Webster Church, who now resides with her daughter there. Then we drove to Flint, Michigan where we spent four full days attending my fiftieth Flint Central High School reunion. After the reunion we drove to Oberlin, Ohio where we stayed at a bed and breakfast for four days. Then we visited Vilma again on our way back to Wilmington, where I dropped off Mike and met my biblical storytelling partner Danette at the Philadelphia airport. Danette and I rehearsed our two stories together for three days and then it was on to the Maritime Convention Center in Linthicum, Maryland for the four-day Festival Gathering of the Network of Biblical Storytellers. Then I was back at Webster Church where we successfully produced our annual Peach Festival and offered our annual Vacation Bible School at the home of Art and Ann Helton.

This is the part where I'm supposed to describe the abundance of food but I'm not going to. Because the real treat wasn't the pizza or the prime rib, the ice cream, or the peach pie. The real treat was reconnecting with folks like Danette and Vilma who I hadn't seen in person for over two years and telling stories to our boys and girls and with the members of the Network, some whom I hadn't seen in over a year, and reconnecting with my classmates, many whom I have known since I first attended kindergarten.

Here's just one highlight. Mike and I were sitting in one of the restaurants that was part of our Friday evening high school reunion dine-around with some of my close friends when a woman came up to our table and asked, "Do any of you know who I am?" I really wanted to answer, "Well, if you don't know who you are how do you expect us to know who you are?" And although I hadn't seen her since the tenth grade, I recognized her immediately. I answered, "You're Annie Shupak, and we've known each other since we were in afternoon kindergarten together at Pierce School." And she was floored. But most of my classmates grew up looking a lot like their parents so she was easy to recognize.

Ultimately, there's never enough time to spend with everyone you want to. But I had the joy of registering people at both my high school reunion and at the Festival Gathering. And there is nothing like the spontaneous joy I experience when I am reunited with a long-lost friend. My immediate response is to spring up from my chair and give them a big hug. There's also nothing like meeting our neighbors from Webster Village for the first time and connecting with them in person at the Peach Festival. "Let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" Thank God for reunions!

## FEED A CHILD FOR A YEAR

THANK YOU! THANK YOU to everyone who supplied items and bought items at the Blessings table at the Peach Festival in August. We raised \$150 for our Blessings in a Backpack outreach mission at Havre de Grace Elementary School. It is September and the children are back in school. Webster Church is continuing to support Blessings in a Backpack by providing food for children at Havre de Grace Elementary School over the weekends. The generous donations of our parishioners, people in the community, the SCCW, the scouts, and fundraisers, we can feed 75 students each week. A special thank you to the Hope Center of Maryland who donated over \$5,000 worth of food for the backpacks.

The cost of the supplies for the backpacks has increased and it costs at least \$8,000 a year to feed 75 students out of 200 eligible children for the program. Any support you can give will be greatly appreciated. \$125 feeds a child for a school year, but we are accepting donations in any amount in the hope of providing more food to more children.
