The Weekly Recorder, a 135-year-old weekly newspaper founded in Claysville, Pennsylvania, is back and covering Washington County.

The publication, which was originally run as a print edition served primarily the Claysville, Pa area. Over the years, the paper changed ownership multiple times. In the 1960's, George Melvin, who at the time was the owner, had briefly closed the paper then found a buyer late in the decade. Gene Shaw purchased and ran the company until 1973, when he sold it to "Buck" and Betty Jones.

The Jones Family continued to run the newspaper until it was sold in 1982 to Douglas Teagarden. Teagarden ran the paper until 2002 when it was purchased by Cody Knotts. Prior to the Knotts purchase, the paper concentrated on the news of the McGuffey School District in Southwestern Pennsylvania. Knotts switched format and the publication become an investigative tabloid concentrating on politics and crime.

In early August 2011, Knotts sold the Weekly Recorder to DFM Publishing. DFM continued to carry political news, but also focused on a wider variety of content such as sports, arts and entertainment, fitness, etc. DFM also expanded the publications content and distribution into other counties in Southwestern PA. The paper then had an interactive website which was updated frequently and allowed users to chat and view past issues.

In 2023 the intellectual property of the paper was acquired by Penn West Media with Daryl W. Price and Matthew G. Uram serving as Publishers and W.R. Smith as the paper's Editor in Chief. The new version covers the entirety of Washington County PA including all 67 municipalities and 15 school districts. The Weekly Recorder's current focus is government, faith, business, energy, agriculture, sports and outdoors, features and events. Print circulation will be weekly with an online version available. The company will also publish multiple special editions throughout the year, focusing on special events and important news.

Co-Publisher Matthew Uram listed some of his reasons for relaunching the paper.

"I took on this investment and role of publisher to further my interests and beliefs in Washington County. And to help the county in general."

"For example, highlighting and reporting on addiction recovery and the state of Human Services, will bring light to the counties needs and hopefully lead to solutions. I'd like this part of the paper to be a beacon of hope for those that have none. This is an opportunity to dive into existing services, their pros and cons and innovative new therapies, some with a techy spin, as we help those strug-

Uram went onto to explain that solutions based local government and consensus between both sides is a need. "I hope we can help to recognize important benchmarks and achievements while also scrutinizing waste, fringe politics, fraud and malfeasance," he said.

When asked why a newspaper publication, Uram said, "Washington County is my lifelong home. We have so many great people and businesses. This is an opportunity to highlight our gems for all to see. From agriculture, to entertainment, to infrastructure and much more, our county has a great story to tell. We have work to do, but just maybe The Weekly Recorder can bring to light what is good and what we can do to improve in the areas where we need to do better."
