

Our story

I have been working for several foster homes to help orphans and other children who are at-risk and in need of help in China for almost 19 years. Children came to our foster home with all types of different and complex health issues such as heart disease, spina bifida, cerebral palsy, cleft lip palate etc. They were all given great amounts of love and care and received necessary surgeries, therapies, and education to prepare them to go into their adoptive families in the future. In the summer of 2018, I continued my foster home in Langfang and had 13 children to care for, but I also began to help children in poor families helping fund their education and giving much needed donations such as food and clothing. I also began to arrange much needed mental health training (Psychiatric and Psychological) to staff members in a multitude of orphanages.



Everything is in HIS plan and HIS hands. In the summer of 2019, most of the children at my foster home in Langfang either went back to their orphanages, were adopted before going back, or were transferred to friendly foster homes. A happy ending for me is our last sweet little girl who will be adopted to a family whose home is only 40 mins away from my home in Chicago. In May of 2019, our new foster home, an orphanage in Inner-Mongolia, was opened and currently has 13





orphans residing there. Nannies have already been provided to take care of the children 24/7 and to provide them with good nutritional food. Therapist have been assigned to help these children with their multitude of needs and a brand new and beautiful environment has been provided for these children to live. Our children are incredibly happy to live in this new home.



As a result of the continued support of many good friends Yipai, Johanna, Guan Wei etc. LILYS FOUNDATION was established and currently has a 501(c)(3) nonprofit status. You can now receive a tax deduction if you donate to Lilys Foundation. Allen Kuo and I are co-founder and founder of LILYS FOUNDATION. Allen Kuo, MD is a practicing psychiatrist and has worked over 20 years in the field of Psychiatry. He will oversee our training program. We work as volunteers receiving no salary because we want to be HIS servants to continue to help in any way we can in the future.


major showcase project in the entire orphanage. The mayor of the city and the leader of the Civil Affairs Bureau has actually paid us a

visit celebrating Lily's House's accomplishments and giving gifts to the children. Our desire for all our children this year is that their adoption files can be finished so they will have an



he found his adoptive family. He should have gone to his adoptive family this summer before his 14th birthday in August 2020, but the pandemic delayed this process, and his adoptive family was unable to go to China. Chinese adoption law requires that a child be under 14 years old to be adopted but fortunately for him the laws were changed this year to 18 years of age.

Brian has cerebral palsy, but he speaks fluently and can walk for himself without aid for about 100 feet. He also uses a walker. He loves to sing songs and he sings constantly in the orphanage.

Please pray for him and his adoptive family that the doors will be opened soon so they can go to China and bring him home.



Mental Health Training Project

Mental health training will be one of our main projects of our work in the future. After working and discussing with many orphanage directors

and foster homes, we knew that mental health, its understanding and clinical usage, is becoming a growing need in orphanages. We have since had the privilege to travel to

several orphanages to teach their staff as well as work on clinical cases together to improve the lives of some of these children. One orphanage we visited we had the privilege to work with a 28-year-old boy who in the end the result







was nothing short of a miracle. This boy arrived at the orphanage at the age of 24 and has spent the last 4 years of his life solely at the orphanage. The staff provided him good care, was very friendly to him and attempted to obtain information from him such as his home address and telephone number so they could send him back to his family, since he had not connected with them for a long time and they were certain his family missed him. Unfortunately, he never disclosed this information to them and

was unwilling to tell them why he would not do so. While we were there, we were able to have about 20 minutes alone with him. Before the 20 minutes were up, he broke down and told us everything and then asked to borrow the director's cell phone to call his father. After talking to his father for a short period of time he told the orphanage director his home address and informed us that his father would be coming to bring him home right away. What a miracle to not only see him talking again to his father after such a long time but to see that in 20 minutes his life was changed for the better. He now has a new life, a new hope, and a new future. We are very encouraged and hope

eventually we can help more and more children with mental health issues. A big thanks to Selah Healthcare Professionals, to Dr. Kuo, MD and Dr. Ronald Ercoli (Psy.D.) who went to China to help orphans, and to all of the group members for their selfless dedication. We are very saddened, because of the pandemic, that we have had to cancel trips this year, but we hope we can continue our training after the pandemic has settled down.
