

SPRINKLE THOSE ASHES!

This Wednesday begins the holy season of Lent. Traditionally, we come to church with the expectation of being signed with ashes. This year that experience will be very different. We received specific guidelines from the Diocese that the signing of ashes on the forehead cannot be administered this year. Instead, there will be a sprinkling of ashes on the top of a person's head. I was surprised when I first heard that the Pope had suggested this. Apparently, it is an ancient practice in the life of the Church. And also, it has remained a practice in many countries throughout the world. But for us, it will be an unusual moment. It is another piece in these unprecedented times that have been impacted by the Covid crisis.

We have chosen a theme for these days of Lent, "I Give My Life Away." This line is inspired by a song entitled "Gracious God," which we will sing throughout the season. The reality is for almost a year now many people have been making heroic sacrifices to meet the challenges that the pandemic has presented. Clearly, health care workers and educators have done remarkable things during these times. But there are many others who also have made enormous sacrifices to hold family life together, such as parents and caretakers to an elderly or homebound family member. In different ways people have given part of their lives away out of love for others. We cannot overlook all the saintly work that has been accomplished. In many ways this Lent presents opportunities as never before. There will be many who will make a powerful connection to Jesus giving his own life on the cross and their own lived experiences. May it be a holy and prayerful season for you.

During the weeks of Lent, different parishioners will be writing brief articles for the bulletin. These articles will appear under the title of "I Give My Life Away." They have been asked to share some of the circumstances they experienced as well as some of the spiritual insights they gained during these days. I hope these articles will bring us to a deeper appreciation of what has taken place throughout our community. I pray it adds to the holiness of this season that we share.

To those of you who are married, Happy Valentine's Day. There are married couples for whom these months have deepened their love and appreciation of the other. At the time of your marriage, you never would have envisioned Covid-19 being part of the deal. But it has become part of your story, and you made it work between you. May the Lord strengthen and deepen the covenant of love that is shared by so many.

ASHES & ASH WEDNESDAY



On **Wednesday**, **February 17th**, countless Christians will receive ashes. This symbolizes the beginning of our **40 Day Journey through Lent**. As this significant day in the life of Christians arrives, we wonder WHY ARE WE RECEIVING ASHES? We must be careful not to judge others' intentions, but we are challenged to reflect on our own motives for being blessed with ashes.

- Ashes have been considered a sign of penance.
- Christ is the beginning and the end of our life's journey.
- We are called to internal conversion and change of heart.
- We consciously are entering into the central mystery of our faith...
 that the way to Resurrection is by way of the Cross.

WHY RECEIVE ASHES? Ashes are meant to be an external sign of our interior desire to make these 40 days of Lent a special and sacred time. We begin Lent with ashes, reminding us of our need to die to anything that keeps us from growing in the love of God.

"Repent, and believe in the Gospel."

Ash Wednesday is February 17th. Ashes will be distributed at: 7 AM, 9 AM Mass, 12 Noon, 4:00 PM & 7:00 PM.

Fast and Abstinence

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.



Numbering more than 60 now, these men show promise that the Church will continue to flourish and minister to the future needs of Nicaraguans.

But to continue their formation, they need the support of faithful Catholics like you. Your generous support of the Collection for the Church in Latin America is an expression of solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Nicaragua. It creates assurance not only for these seminarians but also for all who look to the Church in Nicaragua for hope, peace, and justice.

Lent offers us a unique period of time to evaluate our life journey as a follower of Christ. We are encouraged to assess if this journey has led us to an improved understanding and deepening of our relationship with our Lord, with our neighbors and with our brothers and sisters of the world community.

For the last 30 years we at Holy Cross have embraced our Lenten Project **Eat Simply So Others May Simply Eat** as a way to raise our consciousness to the significant needs of our struggling friends. We willingly sacrifice larger or better meals for simpler meals during Lent. Our joint effort to **EAT MORE SIMPLY SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT** unites us in a special way with one another and also with those who are struggling on Long Island.



We encourage you not only to participate in this program, but also to discuss it at the dinner table with your children and family members. Many of us are not consciously aware of the number of people that are struggling and hungry right here in our own area. During 2020, our Outreach pantry served an average of 140 people each month.

The Lenten envelopes marked, **EAT SIMPLY...SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT**, will be available throughout the weekends of Lent. We suggest that you place the envelope in a prominent place in your kitchen as a reminder of how you and your family will be uniting yourselves with our struggling neighbors and with the starving of the world. We encourage you to reflect, discuss and to decide how you will eat more basic meals during Lent. Perhaps you have a favorite simple recipe to share. We'd be happy to put it in the bulletin for fellow parishioners to try.

Each weekend or whenever you choose during Lent, you may place your envelope in the basket on the pillar by the Altar or in the collection basket. The monies donated will be used to help those who come to Parish Outreach for assistance. We are continually grateful for the very generous response of our parishioners of Holy Cross in donating money, food and supermarket gift cards, which enables us to meet their needs.

Thank you to our parishioners for your "Super" response to the "Souper Bowl of Caring." As always, your constant and generous support is deeply appreciated by all those we serve. A special thank you to our Youth Group for all your hard work and dedication in making this event successful!

The New Normal for Ash Wednesday



This Wednesday, February 17th, begins the season of Lent with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. Because of COVID, the Pope has requested that the priests use the European method for the distribution of ashes. For many years, all over Europe, it has been the tradition to sprinkle ashes on the head. In our country, this is definitely something new! However, we will acquaint ourselves once again this year to another "new normal" experience of our faith through the sprinkling of ashes. As always, our parish will have take-home packets of ashes for those unable to come in person.

Lent encourages all of us to retreat, reflect and even keep silent. The environment of the Church moves into that penitential purple color, minus the display of flowers. We are also urged to follow the traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving and, as many do, decide on what to give up for Lent. Or as I like to say, "What am I fasting from this Lent?" Some try to keep their resolutions for all 40 days, while others change weekly.

Many are asking, why give anything up after what we have been through since last March of 2020 with the pandemic? I am sure that hits home with most of us. Re-focus on this - Lent need not be depressing. Yes, we should be repentant and realize that sin led to the suffering and death of Our Lord on the cross. However, there is more to the story. During Lent this year may I suggest remembering repentance, suffering and death but also remember that NEW LIFE arises from these very things. Let us help each other grow in faith and holiness. Remember God loves us even in our sinfulness, and God never tires of cleansing our hearts and renewing our spirits!




