

As I write this column my fingers are crossed hoping for a change in the weather forecast for the weekend. Currently, there are predictions for *monsoons* on Saturday which is when our Family Fall Festival is planned. Three cheers to Kelley, our Outreach Coordinator, who is organizing this event. She and her dozen or so volunteers are coming up with alternative plans so that the event can go on, even if it does get soggy. The Pumpkin Patch will get moved under the big tent in the courtyard, and there will be room for most everything else in the atrium.

Primarily, we offer events like this for the sake of our families and building community. We take satisfaction that we offer parents a place to bring their kids for some fun and autumn festivities, and it will not cost a fortune. In fact, aside from raffle baskets and the food concession, everything is free, even a pumpkin for each youngster. This year we tied the Family Fall Festival in with the basket raffles as a fundraiser. It is helpful to have a few events throughout the year that bring in some additional funds to help balance the budget. Sometimes people complain that the Church is always talking about money; that is certainly not the case here. We depend primarily on the generosity of parishioners in our weekly collection. Because of that support, we do not have to bombard folks with second collections and special fundraisers. Thank you to all those who consistently support us in our work.

I'm scratching my head wondering where the last seven days disappeared to. On October 2nd, I flew down to Florida to celebrate the funeral Mass for my uncle. I was only gone a little bit over 48 hours, but I was immersed in the busyness and family activity that surrounds a funeral. I was home for only a day when I came down with a cold or some sort of bug. Maybe I caught something on the plane. I was grateful it was not another bout with Covid. It took me almost four days to shake that. I'm now back to feeling fine, but it feels like I am a week behind in everything. Life always keeps moving forward. Sometimes we are in sync with it, other times we are in "catch-up" mode.

Thank you to Deacon Joe who led the blessing of the animals last Sunday afternoon. At least thirty dogs were able to receive a blessing as the Church celebrates the Feast of St. Francis. These little creatures are a source of tremendous joy to their owners.

Finally, as I write this column the tragic situation in Israel and the Middle East continues to unfold. We are shocked by the violence, hatred, and suffering that is inflicted on so many people. We pray that the Spirit will be at work to bring all the conflict to a swift and peaceful solution.

LITURGY BYTES

The 2 Saints—Therese/Teresa



A very popular saint who was canonized in 1925, **Therese of Lisieux**, was a Carmelite nun called the "Little Flower." She lived a very cloistered life in a convent in France. Her former name was Therese Martin when she entered the convent at the age of 15, and she died in 1897 at the age of 24. She saw in quiet suffering a redemptive suffering which became her apostolate. She said that she entered the

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convent to save souls and pray for priests. In recent years, 1997, Pope John Paul II proclaimed her to be a Doctor of the Church. She was only the third woman to be so recognized in light of her holiness and the influence of her teaching on spirituality in the Church. She should be an inspiration for us today because, like many saints, she sought to serve others, to do something outside herself, to forget herself in quiet acts of love. She is one of the great examples of the gospel paradox that we gain our life by losing it, and that the seed that falls to the ground must die in order to live. She believed that preoccupation with self separates us from God and from our fellow human beings. How can we re-learn to forget ourselves, to contemplate God and to serve others which is so needed in our world today! Her feast day is celebrated by the Church on <u>October 1st</u>.



The other popular saint, celebrated by the Church on <u>October 15th</u>, is **Teresa of Avila.** Her time on earth was one of upheaval during the 16th century. Her mark on the Church was that she was a woman, she was a contemplative, and she was an active reformer. She was her own woman as she entered the Carmelites despite opposition from her father. She was beautiful, talented, outgoing, adaptable, affectionate, courageous, enthusiastic, and totally human. However,

she was mysterious yet wise and intelligent. Some referred to her as a mystic. Even though she was a contemplative, she spent much of her time and energy seeking to reform herself and the Carmelites. She founded many monasteries, traveled, and wrote. Two of her famous books are *Way of Perfection* and *The Interior Castle*. In 1970, she was honored as a Doctor of the Church—a great promoter of reform and prayer.



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"Freedom of Religion" vs "Freedom of Worship" -What's the difference?

"Religion cannot be relegated to the inner sanctum of personal life, without influence on societal and national life." - Pope Francis, Evangelic Gaudium

"We in the U.S. actually have freedom of religion, not freedom of worship," said Sen. James Lankford. The terms, "freedom of religion" and "freedom of worship" are often used interchangeably, but there is a significant difference in meaning.

Freedom of worship "argues that faith should remain a private affair - relegated to personal activities or worship services," said policy analyst Sarah Torre. "Step outside the four walls of a home or house of worship and robust protection of religious freedom ends."

Freedom of religion is the more expansive term since it includes worship but also the right of believers to evangelize, change their religion, have schools and charitable institutions. "It's about the right to dress according to one's religious dictates, to preach openly, to evangelize, to engage in the public square," said a spokesman for the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty. "Everyone knows that religious Jews keep kosher, religious Quakers don't go to war, and religious Muslim women wear headscarves yet 'freedom of worship' would protect none of these acts of faith."
