IN ALL THE UNUSUAL PLACES

Most of us prefer that our lives have a certain degree of balance. We try to structure life in such a way that there is a certain predictability. Routines keep us from having to decide every moment of our day. Responsibilities and relationships to others such as our family, our workplace, or even our church may impact and guide the way in which we live. Many of these points of reference are helpful and keep our lives moving forward in a fruitful way. It's not as though any of this is misguided or inappropriate. But, when it comes to experiencing the presence of Christ, the thoughts and activities of living our everyday life, may not apply. This is not some new-fangled thought, but it is rooted deeply in scripture. That is what we hear today.

The beginning of Mark's gospel immediately turns the focus to John the Baptist. There is nothing predictable or conventional in who John is or what he does. While proclaiming God's message, he does not do so from the temple; his place of ministry is the Jordon River. We hear that he literally lives on the fringe of society in the desert. He does not eat the traditional food nor does he dress in ways that would be expected. It is from this obscure voice that we hear proclaimed the message of Jesus. And in time, Jesus too will demonstrate that the way by which God's graciousness is revealed does not necessarily follow expected paths.

I'm not saying that all conventional wisdom and traditional structures should be thrown out the window. We often need those parameters in place to keep life in balance. They help to form our identity. They can offer real guidance and wisdom. We just can't limit or control God's Spirit to those same formats.

In the gospel, John speaks of two baptisms: one by water, the other by fire and the Holy Spirit. Most of us can name the time and place of our sacramental baptism by water which is, indeed, a holy and defining moment in life. But was that a moment in which we were caught up in the power and presence of God? Probably not, as most of us were just infants at the time. But can you name a time where you experienced a baptism by fire and the Holy Spirit? Can you remember an experience where you knew in your heart you were a child of God and God's Spirit was burning within? For me, I had moments like that in a retreat house in New Mexico, a convention center in California, and even in the midst of a pandemic. God spoke abundantly in times, places, and ways I never would have expected. As the season of Advent continues, may we allow the words of John the Baptist to keep us focused in all the unusual places where God's grace may be revealed to us. Come, Lord Jesus!

LITURGY BYTES

The Gospel of Mark

As we embark on the new year in the Church, we will hear from the Gospel according to St. Mark. This Gospel is the shortest of all New Testament gospels and the first to be written. It also contains much of Jesus' ministry in more detail than we hear in Matthew and Luke. The



opening verse about good news in Mark 1:1 serves as a title for the entire book. The key verses of Mark 1:14-15 summarize what Jesus proclaims as gospel: fulfillment, the nearness of the kingdom, and the need for repentance and for faith.

In Mark's gospel, Jesus is portrayed as immensely popular with the people in Galilee during his ministry. He appoints twelve disciples to help preach and drive out demons just as he does. He continues to work many miracles—healings, feeding of crowds of people—and in Mark 7, he teaches about the Word of God over the tradition of the elders. Opposition continues, with many saying that Jesus is possessed. His own relatives think that he is out of his mind. All too often, his own disciples do not even understand him.

Mark's gospel is partly geographical, seeing him in Galilee, the area across the Jordan and through Jericho to Jerusalem. Rarely does Jesus go into Gentile territory. His gospel is also oriented to Christology. We read of passages saying Jesus is the Son of God, anointed King of David's ancestry. He also is seen as the Son of Man, a term used in Mark not simply as a substitute for "I" or for humanity in general or with reference to a mighty figure who is to come.

As the story unfolds in Mark's gospel, Jesus is sometimes viewed around the term mystery. There is a sense that Jesus' real identity remained a secret during his lifetime. Mark depicts the person of Jesus as someone very natural. He reacts to events with human emotion like pity, anger, triumph, sympathy, surprise, admiration, sadness, and indignation.

John Mark is credited with writing most of it. It is believed that he was a cousin of Barnabas and also accompanied Barnabas and Paul on missionary journeys. Tradition says it was written shortly before 70 AD in Rome, at a time of persecution and much destruction looming over Jerusalem. Its audience seems to have been Gentile, unfamiliar with Jewish customs. Take a look each week this year, as we experience the Gospel according to Mark!


