FROM DESERT TO LIVING WATERS

This week is Ash Wednesday which begins the great season of Lent. There is something remarkable about Lent. We normally associate it with fasting and sacrifice, which to most people are not terribly inviting practices. On Wednesday we will see some of the largest crowds all year for a day that is not even a holy day of obligation. There is something that makes sense to the soul in being signed with ashes. Entering into this season with renewed spiritual disciplines feels like the right thing to do. The call to repentance, transformation, and sacrifice makes sense to the heart. Although it may demand discipline, we know that in some way this is a path that will make us better people. These days can draw us closer to God. Use well the days of Lent to experience the Spirit at work in your life and to be more mindful of how each of us can be a more loving person.

I am happy to let you know that we will be offering a Lenten Mission this year. Mr. Jim Ryan will be here at Holy Cross from March 20-22. He will also speak at all the Masses on March 18 & 19. He has a fine reputation for giving inspiring missions across Long Island and beyond. We hope that you can make these evenings part of your Lenten journey.

The first Sunday of Lent reminds us of how Jesus himself was tempted in the desert. The desert can be a place where silence and separation foster a deeper sense of prayer. During the season of Lent we hope to reflect that spirit of the desert into our prayer. The environment in our Worship Area and atrium will be different reminding us that we are in this special season. We intend to end each Mass in silence. The priest and ministers will wait until the end of the concluding song before exiting the church. We ask that you refrain from applauding at the end of Mass during the days of Lent.

Personal discipline can be a helpful practice during these days. We want to improve ourselves and live our lives in virtuous ways. But we also need to have a wider focus than just our own lives. There is tremendous suffering in our world that has come about through earthquakes, war, hatred, and oppression. There is great value in somehow uniting ourselves with those who bear the weight of the cross. Even if just in our prayers we can remind ourselves of others who walk a difficult path, it can help keep us focused and grounded. May these days of Lent be a rich opportunity for you to know that life and hope of the Lord can emerge from what seems to be barren and desolate. May the Paschal Mystery of dying and rising lead you through this holy season.

It is Here Again!

Yes, it is that time of the year again – the Lenten season. Lent officially gets started February 22nd with Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday falls six and half weeks before Easter.

Ash Wednesday dates back to the 11th century. Yet, the tradition of receiving ashes has seen earlier roots with the ancient Hebrew custom of clothing oneself in sackcloth and dusting oneself with ashes as a sign of penance. The Bible does not explicitly mention this first day of Lent, but there are many instances of repentance in both the Old and New Testaments.

Ash Wednesday is not a holyday of obligation, yet receiving ashes is a practice among many Christians to begin their Lenten journey. Ash Wednesday awakens us to Jesus' entry into the desert preceding his death. We begin to prepare our hearts for Easter by recognizing our brokenness and need for turning our hearts to God.

The ashes come from the leftover palms from Palm Sunday which are burned from last year's palms. These ashes symbolize our mortality. They are a physical reminder that our bodies will decay but our souls will live on in eternal life.

As this day gets closer, may we think about making a commitment to turn things around in our lives for the better, embracing the love that our God has for each of us and truly celebrating our Faith come Easter Sunday.


Fast and Abstinence

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.
