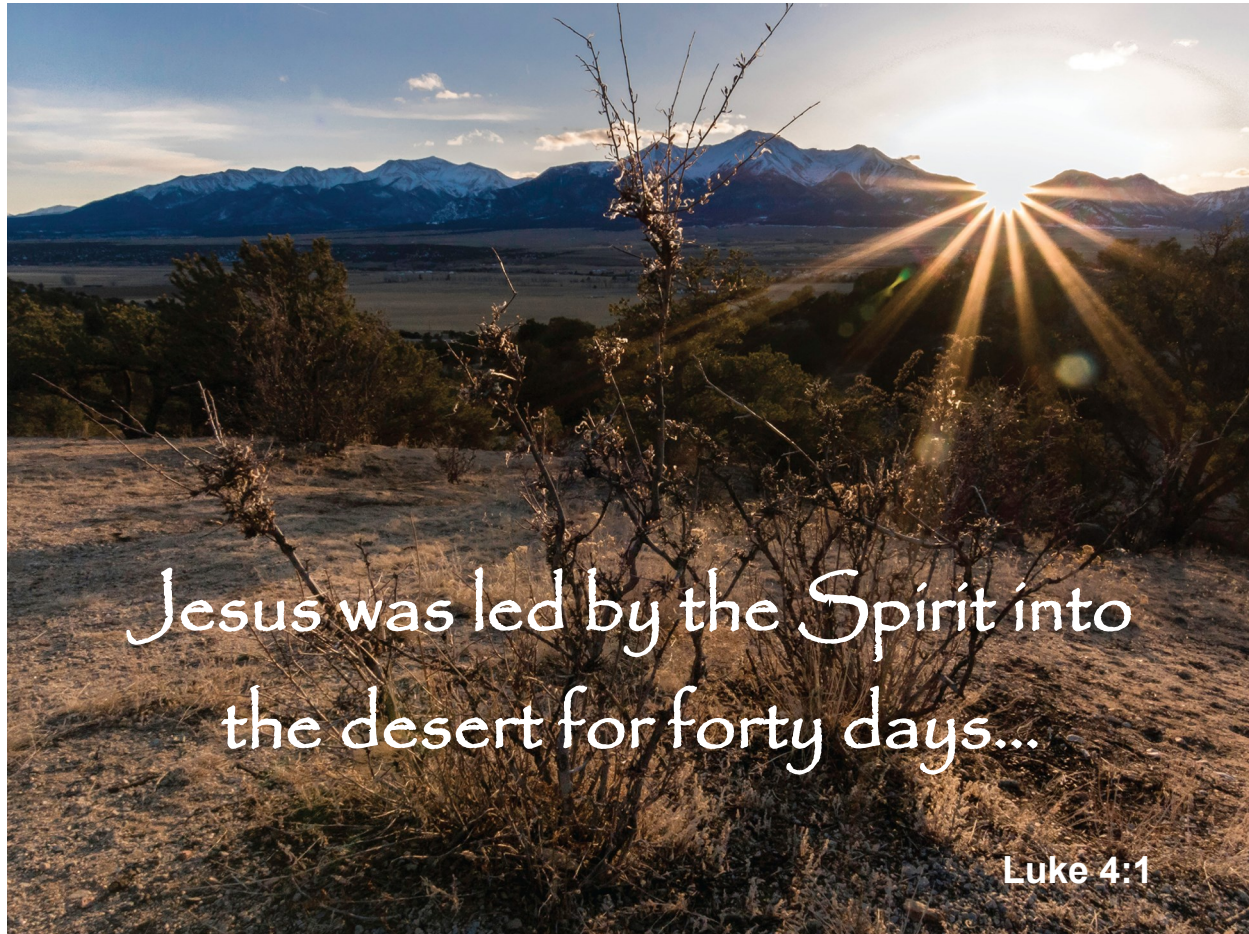

A MOST HOLY SEASON

Lent began with the imposition of ashes this past Wednesday. It is remarkable that a season that speaks of reconciliation, fasting, and sacrifice rings true in the hearts of so many people. It seems there is something deep within all of us that recognizes the need for conversion, growth and facing the darkness of our lives. I encourage you to embrace a discipline that will in some way deepen your relationship with the Lord. Growing pains are never easy, regardless of how old we are. We pray that each of us has the courage and willingness to grow with the Lord to allow his mercy and compassion to bring us new life.

As I said, I hope each person can use well these holy days for personal growth. But beyond that, in a particular way this year, our focus must also go beyond our own lives. Each day reveals more hardship and destruction in the Ukraine. There are many innocent people suffering on both sides of the border. The Holy Father has urged us all in some way to hold in our prayer and fasting those who are in the midst of turmoil. May our prayers help to relieve the suffering and foster a resolve for peace. There is an abundance of discord in life. May we come to experience unity as we prayerfully embrace all those whose lives have been impacted by the war.

Remember our Level 2 Religious Ed children this week. They will be celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time in preparation for their First Holy Communion. As young as they are, and as busy as it is to hear all those confessions, there is something beautiful and healing in the experience. If it has been a while since you celebrated the sacrament, it is something to consider, especially during this season of Lent.

Fr. John Fitzgerald passed away last Sunday. Some parishioners may remember him as he would be one of the priests I would call to assist with Mass when I was away. He helped out most often with the midweek morning Mass. He was in residence at St. James Church in Setauket. He was my first pastor at St. Elizabeth Church in Melville when I was a newly ordained priest. He was a man for whom academics came naturally. He used his love of knowledge in his preaching and priestly ministry. May he rest in peace.

Last weekend I was on the annual Catholic Faith Network telethon for a few minutes. I was reading pledges and chit chatting with the host. Msgr. Vlaun who runs the Network and is a friend and classmate. I am always happy to support him in his ministry. CFN does provide a spiritual lifeline, most especially to the homebound. It is common when I visit someone for a Communion call the TV is tuned to Channel 29.

Eat Simply...So Others May Simply Eat

Lent offers us a unique period of time to evaluate our life journey as a follower of Christ. We are encouraged to assess if this journey has led us to an improved understanding and deepening of our relationship with our Lord, with our neighbors, and with our brothers and sisters of the world community.



For the last 31 years, we at Holy Cross have embraced our Lenten Project **Eat Simply So Others May Simply Eat** as a way to raise our consciousness to the significant needs of our struggling friends. We willingly sacrifice larger or better meals for simpler meals during Lent. Our joint effort to **EAT MORE SIMPLY SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT** unites us in a special way with one another and also with those who are struggling on Long Island.

We encourage you not only to participate in this program, but also to discuss it at the dinner table with your children and family members. Many of us are not consciously aware of the number of people that are struggling and hungry right here in our own area. **During 2021, our Outreach pantry served an average of 65 people each month.**

The Lenten envelopes marked, **EAT SIMPLY...SO OTHERS MAY SIMPLY EAT**, will be available throughout the weekends of Lent. We suggest that you place the envelope in a prominent place in your kitchen as a reminder of how you and your family will be uniting yourselves with our struggling neighbors and with the starving of the world. *We encourage you to reflect, discuss and to decide how you will eat more basic meals during Lent.* Perhaps you have a favorite simple recipe to share. We'd be happy to put it in the bulletin for fellow parishioners to try.

Each weekend, or whenever you choose during Lent, you may place your envelope in the basket on the pillar by the Altar or in the collection basket. The monies donated will be used to help those who come to Parish Outreach for assistance. We are continually grateful for the very generous response of our parishioners of Holy Cross in donating money, food and supermarket gift cards, which enables us to meet their needs.

How Can I Help with Emergency Relief for Ukraine?

Catholic Relief Services has supported Caritas Ukraine in its emergency efforts, since the conflict began in 2014, by providing shelter, food and livelihood support for individuals and families displaced and affected by crisis. As the situation worsens, CRS is helping Caritas Ukraine respond to the challenges.



Initial urgent efforts and plans to support displaced families include the following:

- Field kitchens to provide food
- Reception services at Caritas offices, train stations and other locations for displaced families in transit. These will provide information, referrals, food, water, hygiene items and psychosocial support.
- Transportation for displaced families
- Evacuation centers providing shelter and support for displaced families
- Evacuating vulnerable children from centers in conflict areas to centers in safe zones

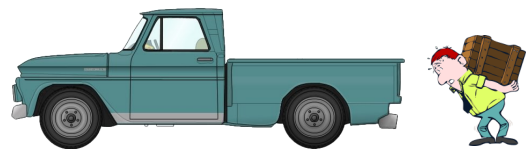
Wish List

Lent 2022

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Lent is a journey from the desert of death to the springs of new life. We follow Jesus into the wilderness of the desert to renew our baptismal covenant with the Father. During this sacred time, we die to sin, and washed clean from our self-centeredness and attachment to the world, rise to divine grace and love. As we enter this privileged season, let us reflect once more on the three means we employ during this forty-day journey of penance and conversion: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Prayer. Prayer is most simply a conversation with God, and St. Paul reminds us that this conversation must be continual. The Apostle to the Gentiles enjoins us to “pray at all times” (Eph 6:18), “pray without ceasing” (1 Thess 5:17), and “be constant in prayer” (Rom 12:12). To pray this way requires effort. It demands silence, artful listening, and remaining in the presence of God. This Lent we remember two powerful ways we enter into this holy conversation: by sitting in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament and through *lectio divina*, a prayerful reading of Sacred Scripture.

Fasting. The Church Fathers speak extensively on the power of fasting to break sin and open our hearts to the grace of God. Saint Peter Chrysologus writes: “Fasting is the soul of prayer, mercy is the lifeblood of fasting. So if you pray, fast; if you fast, show mercy; if you want your petition to be heard, hear the petition of others. If you do not close your ear to others, you open God’s ear to yourself” (*Sermo* 43: PL 52, 320, 322). Let us remember, too, that bodily fasting is useless unless it is joined with spiritual fasting, that is, fasting from our passions.

Almsgiving. Scripture brings the three marks of our Lenten journey together and puts the emphasis on the last: “Prayer and fasting are good, but better than either is almsgiving accompanied by righteousness ... It is better to give alms than to store up gold; for almsgiving saves one from death and expiates every sin. Those who regularly give alms shall enjoy a full life” (Tob 12:8-9). Almsgiving is better because it points to charity. We remember we are not only to give materially to those in need but also give of ourselves as we love God and neighbor.

Last October, Pope Francis invited the Church into a synod on synodality. The Holy Father wants the Church to journey together in a multi-year process listening to each other, hearing the Word and celebrating the Eucharist. As we journey towards Easter, let us be united in mind and spirit. May the spiritual exercises of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving prepare us for Easter and an experience of the power of God, which “dispels wickedness, washes faults away, restores innocence to the fallen, and joy to mourners, drives out hatred, fosters concord, and brings down the mighty” (*The Easter Proclamation - Exsultet*). Then, alive in Christ, we can go forward evangelizing, as Pope Francis would want, with *parrhesia*: “Boldness, enthusiasm, the freedom to speak out, [and] apostolic fervor” (*Gaudete et Exsultate* 129).

May the loving presence of the Blessed Virgin Mary, who remained faithful to her son at the foot of the cross, protect and sustain us in our Lenten journey.
