## LIVING IN THE PRESENT MOMENT (PART 3)

Because of vacation schedules, I had to provide three weeks of bulletin articles several weeks in advance. I offer this final spiritual reflection which began two weeks ago and speaks of the power of living in the present moment.

At first glance, this concept may seem abundantly easy. Where else would you live if it were not in the present moment? As I said previously, some are forever worrying about the future, and others can't get beyond the good old days. It takes discipline and focus to live one's life with this ability to embrace the present moment. There are no shortcuts to make it happen easily. However, one thing that lends itself more easily to this awareness is silence. We tend to surround ourselves with too much noise, and there often isn't any space for us to hear the voice of God speaking to us in the present. The more we can remove distractions and busyness, the better place we will be. Someone once said, "Silence is God's first language." There is great wisdom and truth to that, but we need to make it happen. Many of us prefer to listen to ourselves. After all, it's easier to hear and agree with our own ideas.

One aspect of life that is a great equalizer is time. Rich or poor, young or old, top of the mountain or bottom of the valley, we are all given the same twenty-four hours in a day. I'm sure we all know someone who seems to have more hours in a day because they accomplish so much. It has nothing to do with additional minutes, but rather the attitude and discipline we bring to the day. The good news is that with each new day, we are given a new opportunity. Too often we take for granted and don't see that the rising of the sun is a dramatic introduction to endless opportunity before us. Each day is a microcosm of the story of creation: endless possibility to those who avail themselves to what is offered. There can always be renewed efforts to give this day the focus and attention it deserves.

Once we get a few years under our belts, there can be a more natural inclination to want to live in the present moment. Sometimes with age there comes a discernment and appreciation for the things of life that are lasting and more meaningful. But this is not necessarily a chronological certainty. Just because you may be "old" doesn't mean you automatically get it right. There is still a need for focus and effort on the part of all.

Holier people than I have spoken in a much more articulate way about the power of the present moment. But it is a reminder not to take for granted that precious opportunity that is given to us time and time again. Next week I am back to my usual routine with the article, speaking about burned out light bulbs and critters running around my yard.



## **LITURGY BYTES**

## **Did You Realize?**

For many of us, going to Mass can feel pretty different from the rest of our lives. It doesn't mean that the two have nothing to do with each other. Actually, it is quite the contrary! Mass is the



celebration of Jesus' death and Resurrection in the context of our own experiences of death and resurrection. Did you ever hear the saying, "We live the Paschal mystery"? It is those dying and rising moments of our lives that link us to the sacrifice of the Mass. We come to the Mass to rekindle who Jesus is for us, right here in the midst of our present struggles. We are not coming to Mass to remember who Jesus was in the distant past.

There is a prayer right in the middle of Mass where we have a special opportunity to connect the mystery of Jesus' death and Resurrection with our own experiences of death and resurrection. After the preparation of the gifts at the altar, the priest says: "Pray brothers and sisters that **my sacrifice and yours** may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father." Simply put, it means that we bring a sacrifice to every Mass! The Mass is the spiritual sacrifice of our very selves, too!

When we respond, we say: "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church." This week let us think of some specific "sacrifice," some concrete, challenging experience that you bring to Mass that day. Perhaps, it's an illness that you have, or lack of harmony in your family, or a loved one suffering from an addiction. These burdens, real and unresolved as they are, are what you bring to every Mass, in addition to the physical gifts of bread and wine. By recollecting these "sacrifices" and offering them to Jesus, we call to mind that, just as Jesus shares in our little experiences of "burdens," he experienced the effects of suffering, conflict, and human weakness. So, too, does he share with us the experience of "resurrection," healing, reconciliation, and newfound strength, even in the midst of weakness.

Keep in mind that at every Mass, we refresh our memory of Jesus' fidelity to us in our lives. By recollecting our "sacrifice" in that little prayer, we rekindle hope that he will continue to be faithful to us in the here and now of this life.


