Ballfield at Cimarron Park to be Renovated by Resident Volunteers

The District was recently approached by an individual interested in seeing the ballfield at Cimarron Park (Field) being rebuilt to help meet the growing demand for athletic fields. Resident Taton Taylor recalled the nostalgia of playing on the field as a youth, and together with other fathers, wants to watch their children relive the sandlot glory. He and a group of volunteers have committed to taking on the project. As the District is challenged with providing sufficient athletic fields to meet demand, bringing another field online will certainly provide some help. Though no water access currently exists in the park to support irrigation of turf grass, the plan is to create a large skinned infield area that can host practices for teams with younger players, as well as infield practice activities for older players. New dugouts will also be installed as a part of the project as well as a refurbishment of the storage shed, which will house field grooming equipment. Thanks Taton and crew!

Highlighting District Facilities / Amenities and Permitting Opportunities

The District offers residents the use of a variety of facilities and amenities for your private events through our permitting process. When you need a space for your event or activity other than in your home or yard, consider permitting space through us. When you are looking to host a birthday party, a dance, baby shower, or other indoor gathering of 99 people or less, consider the Casey Jones Pavilion. With over 1800 square feet of space, a bar area, a stage area, and restrooms, this historic space that has been serving the Elizabeth Community for over 100 years provides an affordable local option. While the pavilion is currently the only indoor space that is available for residents to permit, the District does offer a variety of outdoor shelters in the parks. Small event shelters that can accommodate groups up to 12 are located near each ballfield in Evans Park and are ideal for youth birthday parties in the park. The wooded and naturally shaded Picnic Area within Casey Jones Park can be permitted for larger outdoor events and contains picnic tables that can seat groups up to 30.

If it is an athletic activity or larger event that you are planning, the District also permits athletic fields, the rodeo arena, the Prickly Pines Disc-Golf Course, and large open space areas that can accommodate a variety of uses such as car shows, carnivals, and other similar events. Complement your special event in the park by also permitting one or more of the District's inflatables, which always add great bouncy fun for event attendees. The last touch of course is permitting the District's digital sign board at the corner of 86 and 17 and advertising your event for all to see.
