



ENVIRONMENT POINTS (E-POINTS)

Introduction:

The E-Points system aims to elevate the significance of game day behaviour to the same level as the game's outcome. It seeks to commend teams for demonstrating positive conduct during game days.

Implementation of E-Points:

Incorporating E-Points into the scoring mechanism acknowledges the impact of game day behaviour. Teams may miss out on qualifying for finals if they lose E-Points throughout the season. Conversely, teams with fewer wins but consistently fostering a positive environment may earn a place in the finals.

Scoring Criteria:

To assess the quality of the environment maintained by each team, an E-Points system is established. Each game allows a maximum allocation two (2) points to both participating teams. E-points are seamlessly integrated into the competition ladder on Play HQ.

Operational Procedure:

- 1. Game Day Reporting: Reporting is only necessary if an incident occurs that could lead to the loss of E-Points. Refer to Figure 1 for breach criteria.
- 2. Reporting Responsibility: Referees, Referee Coaches, and Games Controllers are tasked with completing incident reports. Evaluating the environment is a pivotal aspect of officials' reporting duties. Officials are encouraged to include environmental observations in their reports. Referees are encouraged to complete the report with the support of the Games Controller. The Games Controller is responsible for submitting the breach report via JotForm or paper incident report, which will then be forwarded to the Competitions Manager.
- 3. Administrative Review: The final decision on E-point allocation lies with the Competitions Manager. The Competitions Manager reviews referee reports and considers all pertinent factors before making a final decision. MBA will notify the registered Team Contact of any E-point deduction. Final decisions are not able to be contested.

Actions	Points Scale
Behavioural Technical Foul on Coach and/or Player	-1 point
Disqualifying Foul	-1 Point
Player, Coach and/or Team manager reported to tribunal and found guilty	-1 Point
Poor spectator behaviour. Eg. Swearing at referee, abusive slurs towards players and/or referees.	-1 Point
Breach of Code of Conduct, Zero Tolerance, Domestic Manual or Policy relating to inappropriate game day behaviour.	-1 Point
