
MEET THE NEIGHBOR

Artistic skills run deep in this family, among her many skills, Luise is a quilter and a painter, Chris is a silversmith and jewelry maker, their other two daughters and grand-daughters all possess a creative streak that they each express in different ways.

John's creative skills were evident from the start. He especially loved to draw as a child and young adult. His father enabled his talent by mounting a blackboard in the home for John to decorate for the seasons. The year he turned 40 he took a woodcarving class and discovered his true artistic calling.

"Everywhere I look, a field of grass, the sand on a wind-swept beach, a mound of stones, the clouds drifting by, but especially when I look at trees and leaves, I see faces, hundreds of them. All forms and shapes, all looking back at me. Sometimes they speak to me, and we may even carry on a conversation." As we talked, John showed me a video of a tree in his yard and helped me to find the face of John 'the Baptist'. It almost seemed that the breeze moving across the tree caused this face to move and change expressions.

Not every piece of wood or stone speaks to John, he has to be moved by it, or, as he says, the image within has to summon him and ask to be brought forth. He will then feel compelled to answer by bringing the hidden form within to the light of day. In the mid-2000s, John had an opportunity to acquire some chunks of 600 yr. old trees, which spent the last 100 years sunk in Lake Superior as a result of logging operations in northern Wisconsin in the late 1800s. He named the resulting series of carvings the 'Water Logged Lumberjacks'. As he chiseled away, John says he imagined the entire cacophony of an old time logging camp: singing cooks, banging pots and pans, snorting draft horses, buzzing saws and steam engines, and his formerly waterlogged lumberjacks finally warming near a hearth.

"It comes from deep within myself, something I don't recognize or understand, and after all this time I still don't. It is something I can't live without. It is like an extension of God's love for us brought forth from Nature. It is breathtaking, it can give joy or sorrow, love and even hate, all the emotions of life." A pause. "I know I'm missing saying something, it's a bit of my life's blood."

THE PORTRAIT OF AN ARTIST AS A SIMPLE MAN

There is a bond between John and each of his pieces. Each lives in John and John lives in each. He names and numbers every one. John says he does not know how a work is going to develop and that when he finishes he always feels a sense of surprise. When you look at one of John's pieces, try to look and listen or the stirrings of the invisible that called and guided him. Let us look at some of John's creations.

Monk Looking at a Skull – this was John's first ever sculpture. It is made of hard, dense cherry given him by a fellow carver. This is a familiar and often represented motif: the contemplation of one's own mortality. When you look beneath the monk's cowl, you will see the face carved there is his own.





Buck Fever – You will not find this piece in John's shop because I purchased it. John's inspiration for this piece was a friend who suffered this ailment. This man was a steady and skilled man, a fine shot who understood the forest. Each year, he would prepare to take down a fine buck, and each year, when he got a deer in his sights, his trigger finger would freeze. There would be an internal battle between his will and his body, the more his mind said shoot, the more his finger would refuse to cooperate. Within the space of those seconds, the buck would escape and John's friend would find himself utterly spent, his mind and body exhausted from going in different directions.

Bear Hunter – This is one of John's larger pieces and sits in his home. It was carved from Basswood and depicts the face of a Native American bear hunter. This man is attired in claw and bone, above him, in totem form, a bear on all fours on a mound. It is a magnificent work. This piece has won several awards and has been displayed at the state capital in Lansing, MI and in Washington DC.

Cottonmouth / Water Moccasin Agkistrodon piscivorus

The cottonmouth, the most venomous of our pit vipers, is most likely the snake you will encounter on our lake. Their beauty and



intrigue should be admired from a distance. They are designed to blend in to their surroundings and are sometimes very hard to spot.

Contrary to public opinion and myth, these are not aggressive snakes and do not chase. These, and all snakes, view us as predators and would prefer to remain still or escape. Should they move towards you, it is only because you are between them and their familiar route.

When identifying, notice the dark line that travels across the eye, the scales that cover the eyes when looking at the top of the head, and the shorter stocky build.



Juveniles will have green tails as seen in the picture to the left. There are more identifiers, but these three will assist you in your determination if you are lucky enough to cross paths with such a beautiful snake.

G. G.'s Apricot Nectar Cake

Preheat oven to 350°

Tips: Bundt pan makes a very pretty cake

CAKE

3 oz. orange or lemon Jell-0 1 box yellow cake mix 12 oz. (1 can) apricot nectar 1 c. cooking oil 4 eggs

Mix cake ingredients and pour into a floured Bundt pan. Cook for 40 minutes. Cool. Remove from pan.

ICING

1c. confectionary sugar

2 Tbsp butter

2 Tbsp apricot nectar or lemon juice

Mix icing ingredients and pour on cooled cake
