RECIPE OF THE MONTH GRANNY LOU'S PECAN PIE

¾ cup white/brown 3 Tbsp butter or Oleo

Sugar 3 Tbsp Flour

3 eggs 1½ Tsp Almond Extract 1/3 Tsp Salt 2 c of Broken Pecans

1½ cups Karo Syrup (heaping)

Cream butter and sugar; add beaten eggs, the flour, salt, extract, and syrup. Add broken nuts last. Stir together thoroughly.

Bake at 350° in uncooked pie crust for 30 minutes or until center of pie is firm. Jiggle oven rack pie is on to see if pie is firm. Don't be afraid to cook longer until center is firm.

Cool on pie rack. Best Pecan Pie Ever!

MR. JIMMY W STAFFORD JR

Tell me a little bit about yourself.

I am from Cleveland, MS. My father was a patriot and served 4 years in France during WWI, in turn, I joined the Navy the year after I graduated High School and served during WWII. While stationed in California, I attended the University of California-Berkeley for one year. After the Navy, I returned to Mississippi and worked at Pidgeon Thomas Iron Company in Memphis. In 1962, I purchased Memphis Wire and Iron Works.

While on leave my girlfriend, Arweda Pearson and I eloped and married in Indianola, MS.

We have two kids, my first-born Jimmy W Stafford III and a daughter Karen Stafford Cook. I have 4 grandchildren (Jes, Marie, Kristen, and Kary) and 2 great grandchildren (Gabe and Shea). Jimmy and Jes have swum the length of the lake, 1.25 miles.

How did your family come to own a lot/house on Woodland Lake?

My boss, Mr. Charlie Bull (lot 198) and I would go fishing on Sunday afternoons. The wives would make a snack and they would stay until dark. I bought lot 199 from Mr. Bull's sister. One day, I heard my neighbor while laboring to clean his lot, saying, "If I could get what I paid, I would sell it right now!" I approached him and asked if he was serious, and he said, "You bet I am!" This is how I came to be the owner of both lots, 199 & 200.

My son, Jimmy and I built a basic cabin shell on lot #199. We came every weekend for more than a year and finished the inside with the unusual pecky cypress boards. Jimmy cut and put up every board. The cabin became more than a weekender, as my wife and I lived in the basic cabin for over a year while building a home in Memphis. Weda often hosted her Bridge Club here. We often enjoyed

In 2012, my son Jimmy and his wife Sandra took possession. They updated it with a new modern bathroom, new floors and new windows. They added new support for the carport and widened the driveway. And don't forget the wonderful Tram!!!

Were there any other people living on the lake when you moved in?

Yes, about 50-60 homes - The people I knew were the Cottams, Mr. Pitts, Mr. Shook next door, and maybe the Millers. I remember that Mike and Elaine's home once had a windmill and lighthouse on the point. Seems like the property was owned by one of the old ice cream families, like The Fortunes or similar. The Botto's place was previously owned by The Davenport's (Wrecker Service).

How has the lake changed?

The lake itself hasn't changed much, same size as I remember, but it has grown in number of houses. It has certainly changed for the better. It's more like a community and much more social.

Fishing was good! The state would stock the lake. The state record bass was caught in Woodland Lake in the mid 60's. Bream fishing was good.

Mrs. Stafford loved fishing and had her own Jon boat. She was not going to spend all "that money" on a fancy pontoon boat when I could design and build one at the iron shop. It was made of steel angle frames and had ornamental iron railings....VERY HEAVY!!!

A funny story I remember is when Weda and I told the Grandchildren not to go to the dock without us. One morning she looked out the window and saw Marie, Jimmy's young daughter, on the dock in her gown fishing.

SPILLWAY UPDATE

In late December 2020, we discovered a small sinkhole on the west side of the spillway near the headwall. After further inspection, we found water flowing underneath the lower end of the concrete spillway on the west side at the toe wall.

Due to the amount of rain this year, we have delayed scheduling our engineering firm to perform inspection and soil testing at the spillway. The volume of water flowing over the headwall has made it unsafe to work on the concrete spillway.

Board members continue to monitor the situation on a regular basis. As more information becomes available, we will provide updates.

Lake temperatures have dropped which means fish are on the move. All kinds of fish will use deeper water and may head to the middle of lake.

The water is more clear, use natural colors!

	*
Species	Detail
Bass	As water temperatures drop, fall patterns are in full swing. You can find schooling bass feeding heavily on shad in 6-12 feet of water. Swimbaits, crankbaits, or jerk baits prove effective. Other isolated bass may be around laydowns, riprap, and flooded timber with crankbaits and other reaction baits showing a lot of success. Limits: All bass 14" and under must be harvested. All bass over 14" must be released
Crappie	Best luck has been jigging around fallen trees or brush or other cover (stake beds, etc.) for suspended fish using advanced electronics. Otherwise, troll/drift with jigs and/or minnows or pull/push crankbaits 8 – 12 ft. deep in the middle of lake. Use bigger baits and fish deeper to target larger crappie. Use single hooks and pinch down the barbs to make releasing short fish faster and less damaging; it does no good to release dead fish. Limits: No limit on size or quantity
Bream	Fish with crickets. Use small rooster tails and beetle spins for the big momma. May be holding in the same place as bass. Limits: Panfish including Bluegill, Redear, Shellcrackers, warmouth, and sunfish are 10 per person per day or 20 per boat maximum
Catfish	Fish lines or jugs (noodles) with minnows in the shallow water (3-5 ft. deep). Best fishing by bright or full moon. If using Yo-yos, jugs, or trotlines – Please check with Chris Christian Mfallrabb@gmail.com for rules/guidelines. Limits: No limit on size or quantity

HOLIDAY PET SAFETY



Pet Poison Helpline 1-855-764-7661



Winter holidays can be a joyous time for humans, yet a dangerous time for our four-legged family members. The curious nature of cats, plus a dog's strong sense of smell, causes both animals to get into holiday decorations, food and drinks that could lead them to wind up at the emergency room. Keep the Pet Poison Helpline on your refrigerator for quick access.

A FEW TIPS FOR PET PROOFING YOUR HOME DURING THE HOLIDAYS:

- CHRISTMAS TREE, TIMBER! Know the causes and danger of a tree falling to a curious pet. The evergreen needles, if ingested, can get stuck in your pet's intestines. And never let your pet drink the water, with or without additives, can cause stomach upset.
- CHRISTMAS TREE ORNAMENTS, hang ornaments high so they are out of the reach of curious cats and rambunctious dogs.
- TINSEL & RIBBONS, pets love the feel of chewing tinsel and ribbons. However, if ingested, these can cause an intestinal blockage leading to an emergency surgery.
- SHOCKING! If your pet chews on electrical cords it can result in serious injuries such as electrical shock and oral burns.
- UNBAKED BREAD DOUGH, raw dough, especially if it contains salt can be harmful. Ingested yeast dough can rise inside a pet's digestive tract, blocking or rupturing internal organs and potentially causing seizures and respiratory failure.
- TOYS AND BATTERIES, Keep small toys and loose batteries off the floor, away from the mouth of a pet.
 Batteries, board game pieces and other small household items can contain zinc, which can cause pancreatitis and renal damage if ingested by a pet.
- ALCOHOL, can be poisonous to pets and, in some cases, can lead to a coma or death. Even seemingly,
 harmless amounts can be lethal. As little as one ounce of alcohol can kill a small pet. Remember that
 alcohol can be found in many baked goods, such as fruitcake, also keep these out of reach of your furry
 friends.
- CHRISTMAS SWEATERS, pet costumes should allow pets to move freely, breathe easily and bark or meow. There should be no dangling parts for pets to tear off and swallow. If your pet doesn't enjoy dressing up, it's best to let them be themselves over the holidays.
- ANTI-FREEZE AND ICE MELT, be especially careful of using anti-freeze with the chemical ethylene glycol. Rock salt can irritate paw pads, and if ingested, will result in agitation and vomiting. Look for ice melts with a propylene glycol base that is a relatively pet-safe way to melt ice.
- PLANTS AND FLOWERS, holiday plants can be toxic to pets. These include:

Amaryllis	Juniper	Azaleas	Mistletoe	Chrysanthemums (Mums)
Evergreens	Lilv	Holly	lvv	Poinsettias

Did you know? While poinsettias are widely thought to be toxic to dogs and cats, ingestion may cause irritation to the mouth and stomach and result in vomiting, but they are generally considered low in toxicity.

TOP 2 DAY TRIPS

Oxford, Mississippi

The charming town has a spectacular Christmas Market, an ornament auction, and a fun Christmas Parade. Visit the Gingerbread Village, located inside the Ford Center of the Performing Arts and then after, head out and explore the magical light displays on Oxford's main street.

Canton, Mississippi

Dubbed as the state's "City of Lights," Canton is a premier vacation destination for families wanting to get into the Christmas spirit. View Canton's Winter Wonderland at the Canton Animation Museum that features 135 life-size animated figures decked out for the holidays. Take a ride on the holiday trolley tour. Head to the downtown area to see the city's decorated tree, storefront window displays, and lights strung throughout the town.

TOP 2 WEEKEND TRIPS



Childersburg, Alabama

Consider visiting Childersburg, Alabama, in December. A mere ½ day drive, the town itself is full of decorations and pretty twinkle lights. Take a tour of the historic buildings decked out in period decorations. But the coolest thing is "Christmas at the Cave" in the Desoto Caverns. On the grounds around the caverns, there are food vendors, street performers, stories with Santa, and as you descend into the caverns, you'll be able to see a spectacular Christmas performance.

Natchitoches, Louisiana

Our longest trip, a good 6 hours away, is our favorite and well worth the drive. Celebrate the joy of the Christmas season with a visit to Natchitoches, the oldest permanent settlement in the Louisiana Purchase. The Natchitoches Christmas 6 week Festival – ranked 3rd "Best Holiday Light Show" behind Rockefeller Center and Disney Land by Yahoo! Visitors are captivated by more than 300,000 lights illuminating downtown Natchitoches and over 100-lighted set pieces along Cane River creating a magical backdrop for spectacular fireworks and entertainment. Experience traditions, such as carriage tours, fireworks each Saturday, live entertainment, and the Christmas Tour of Homes. Shops and restaurants stay open late during the holidays. Don't forget the food, enjoy gator on a stick, hot gumbo and of course Natchitoches meat pies.



MISSISSIPPI SNAKES

We decided to share an article to educate and help us find tolerance for our shy, not so welcomed neighbors. I want to challenge those who are afraid of, or not fond of, snakes to take a few minutes to read this article. If interested, take the next step to learn more about them (see the information at the top of the next page).

How do I know which snakes are poisonous or which are not? Why is it safe to leave a venomous snake on my property? Why not just kill it and remove the danger? These are some of the most common questions we hear, so we reached out to some of Mississippi's best experts on the matter to find the answers you're looking for.

Killing snakes does nothing to reduce the risk of you, your family, or your pets being bitten. There are direct and indirect risks that make this more dangerous than simply avoiding the snake.

- 1. I know everyone that kills a snake says "it won't be me" but every year a large percentage of bites are from intentionally trying to injure or kill a snake.
 - Examples I've seen picking up a snake that wasn't actually dead, having a snake bite your leg trying to step on it, tripping and falling on top of the snake, and there are many firearm injuries related to trying to kill snakes, I've even seen where someone got venom in their eye from using a stick to kill one.
- 2. Killing snakes around your property will not affect the population. As a biologist, I'm not so much worried about this bringing down a species. Habitat change/destruction is the main driver of population changes in wildlife. You only see a fraction of the snakes that are on your property.
- 3. The resources are still there. As long as there is suitable food, water, and shelter, wildlife will take advantage of it. Remove any debris or brush piles, keep firewood away from walls and up off the ground, keep grass cut short, don't feed animals in a way to attract rodents. Use 1/4" mesh to exclude snakes from chicken coops and crawl spaces.
- 4. Indirect risk: That adult snake you killed has likely been on your property it's entire life. In some cases that can be several decades never being more than a couple acres away from where you found it. It may be the first time you have seen it, but it has seen you and your family regularly. They learn our habits and avoid high traffic areas and times of day when we are active. Killing that snake simply opens the area up for another to take its place. The newer snake may not know your habits or what areas to avoid. Which leads to an increased chance of conflict. Leaving the snake alone and teaching children and pets how to properly react is less risky.

Maybe the next time you encounter a snake, the knowledge you've gained through this site, will make you less fearful. Instead of killing it, take a picture of the snake, and post it for true dentification, so the MSFI team can properly track the populations.

What's Next?

DID YOU KNOW

There are few things that can chill you to the bone like a huge heating bill! Most of us have lowered our thermostats and piled on the blankets to lessen the blow. But what else can you do? Actually, plenty! You can keep those home fires burning without being raked over the coals. So make yourself cozy, and settle in for some warming advice.

Maintain and Prosper

One of the best ways to put a lid on fuel bills is to keep your heating system properly maintained, so it will function for many years to come. That means changing your furnace filters every three months, making sure all air ducts are sealed. Gas-heating systems should have a thorough inspection check every two years.

Turn On the Fan

Contrary to popular belief, ceiling fans can actually keep you warmer in the winter. Most fans are equipped to run both clockwise and counterclockwise. If you run yours clockwise at a low speed, the fan will circulate heat gathered at the ceiling, forcing it down into the room.

Turn Off the Fan

The exhaust fan, that is! It can get rid of an entire house-worth of heat in no time at all. So don't keep your bathroom or kitchen exhaust fan running for more than 20 minutes at a time. Otherwise, your furnace will be working extra hard to replace all of that warm air.

Cover Your Conditioner

If you have a window air conditioner, either remove it or protect it from the chilly elements with a tightly fitted cover, which is available in home centers and hardware stores. This is also a good time to make sure the seal between the air conditers and the window is in tip-top shape. If the seal doesn't look up to par, apply duct tape around the inside edges between the unit and window frame or give it a double blast of protection and use shrink wrap to encase the whole kit and caboodle – Window and all!
