This programme is jointly funded by the Covenant Fund (through the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust) and NHS England and NHS Improvement.

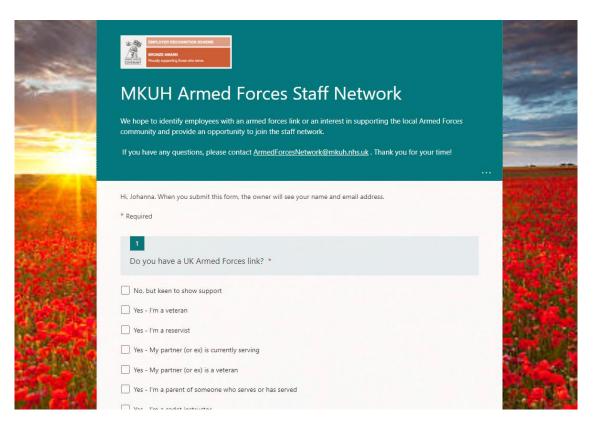

Considerations

NHS organisations demonstrate their commitment to the AF Covenant principles and commitments

Trusts must ensure that members of the AF community do not face disadvantage when accessing healthcare services and should consider:

Family members should retain their place on any NHS waiting list, if moved around the UK due to the service person being posted.

Veterans and Reservists should receive priority treatment for a condition/s which relate to their service, subject to clinical need.

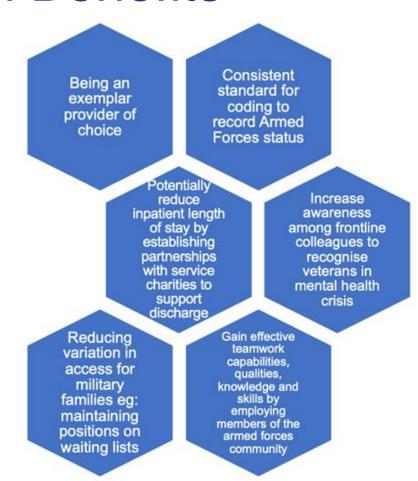


VCHA Accreditation Benefits

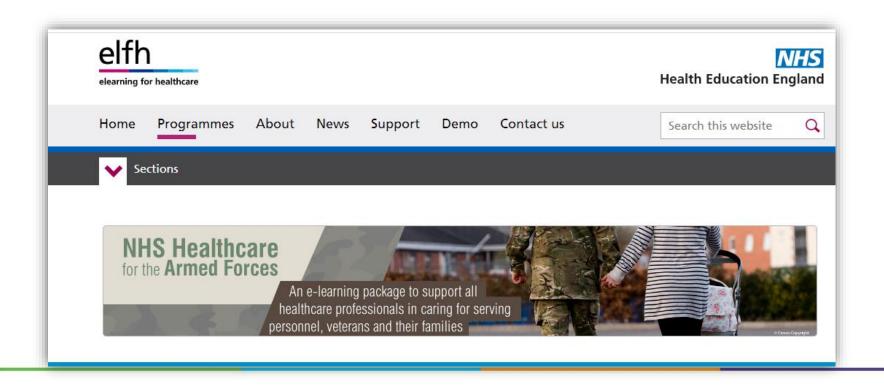
- Provide leaflets/posters to veterans and their families

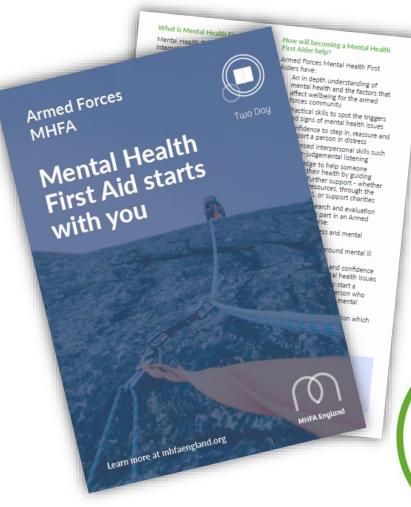

Service in the Armed Forces is different from other occupations, with obvious dangers. Risk of serious injury, for example, loss of limbs, eyes or other body parts, is substantially increased. There are approximately 2.4 million UK veterans in the UK, making up 5% of the population, about the same number as diabetics. RCGP resources are available to support in the treatment of patients who are veterans.

The government promises to help and support people in the Armed Forces when they need it most. This is 'the Military Covenant', which is now enacted in law ensuring that the veteran - and their family - are not disadvantaged

Being in the Armed Forces is an overwhelmingly positive influence for most of service personnel, giving them the skills and experiences to live a positive and flourishing life beyond their time serving in the military. Many veterans are fully integrated back into society with no specific health problems related to their service. However, while serving, they face unique risks in service and, if they do experience mental health problems, they may require specific treatments and mental health services. These needs will often continue after leaving the military

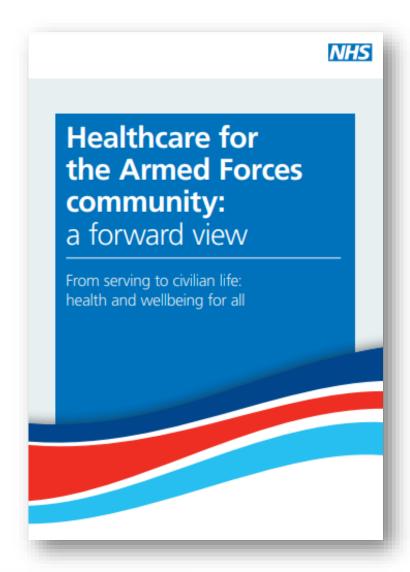
Veterans: priority NHS treatment

A veteran is someone who has served in the armed forces for at least 1 day. There are around 2.4 million veterans in Great Britain.

When servicemen and women leave the armed forces, their healthcare is the responsibility of the NHS.

It's very important for continuing healthcare that you register with an NHS GP and remember to tell them that you have served. This will help your GP to better understand any service-related health conditions that you may have and ensure that you are referred, where appropriate, to dedicated services for ex-forces.

If you've recently left the armed forces, it's important to give your GP the paperwork that your military medical centre gave you, including any medical records. This will help to ensure your military health record transfers to your NHS health record. It will also give your GP

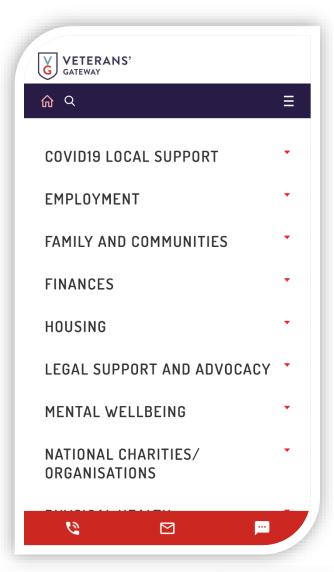
