
BIG ISSUES OUT WEST... (FROM THE PRESIDENT, ROBERT NORRIS)

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On a recent visit to San Diego, I happened upon an interesting piece of history. The Mason Street School in the Old Town of San Diego apparently had many concerns in 1848--none of which related to the then-current struggle between the states regarding slavery and secession. Of concern was the appropriate behavior of their students--a list of which I've attached. Recently re-produced by the San Diego County Historical Days Association, it certainly puts today's methods of discipline in perspective!

Did You Know?

... the answer to the last issue's Trivia Corner Question? The question was: What Norwell resident designed the first Massachusetts state seal (used from 1780 until 1898), and *where is his memorial in town?* The answer is: Nathan Cushing, whose stone memorial lies on the north side of Main Street between Paradise Drive and Lincoln Street. Mr. Cushing's seal (shown at left) is displayed on the memorial, which is currently receiving a much-needed overhaul (see article on page 3). The state seal used today is altered only slightly from Mr. Cushing's original design. Today's seal uses color (blue and gold), a lessintricate coat of arms, and a more accuratelyclad Native American.

NORWELL BOY SCOUT OVERHAULS THE NATHAN CUSHING MEMORIAL

Nicholas Cunio, Norwell resident and a member of Boy Scout Troop #44, is currently working on a complete overhaul of the Nathan Cushing Memorial on Main Street as his Eagle Scout project.

The memorial, which has been completely overgrown by brush and poison ivy over the years, was all but invisible to passers-by until recently. Wes Osborn, former Norwell Tree Warden, alerted Nicholas of the dire condition of the monument. The formerly beautiful wrought iron posts and chains in the fence surrounding the memorial had broken and the memorial stone was all but invisible because of the tangle of vines. With help from his parents, Nicholas braved the jungle of brush (contracting a serious case of poison ivy in the process!). With help from Norwell resident Bill Moore (a former Scoutmaster himself), Nicholas is welding the broken posts and replacing the connecting chains. Plymouth Quarries has donated a stone bench placed near the memorial that will encourage passers-by to stop and read about Mr. Cushing.

Although many of the materials for this project are being donated, help is always needed to cover additional costs.
