## South Scituate Men Answer President Lincoln's Call

Did you realize that 250 South Scituate (Norwell) men served in the armed forces during the Civil War? In a town of fewer than 1,800 citizens this statistic is startling! Of those 189 who served, 24 were either killed in combat or died during their service. These 24 brave souls are listed today on the Civil War monument in the center of Town.

It is with these facts in mind that Sam Olson will speak to those at the **Norwell Historical Society's Annual Meeting on Wednesday, October 15**<sup>th</sup>.

Sam is a life-long student of history and a lifetime member of the Historical Society. He taught history in the public schools of Massachusetts for nearly 40 years. His specialty, however, is bringing world events back home--relating what was going on in history to our little town of Norwell. Following the dinner and Annual Meeting, he will speak about how South Scituate's men fought to keep our country united.



In fact, although Congress enacted a draft in 1863, no South Scituate men were drafted because we've *always* exceeded our quota of enlisted men. Of note are the six South Scituate blacks who served in Robert Gould Shaw's 54<sup>th</sup> Regiment: Warren Freeman, William Freeman, Benjamin Lee, Jason Prince, Richard Winslow and Henry Winslow.

Civil War items from the NHS archives will be available for viewing during the meeting, and the Society encourages all attendees to bring with them any Civil War memorabilia that they would like to share with others.

Social hour begins at 6:00, roast beef dinner at 7:00 and featured speaker at 8:00. The business portion of the meeting will be concluded before the speaker begins. May, whose beaming face, so radiant with the true Christ-like spirit of helpful love cast its inspiring light on my young life, when he first came to the Unitarian Church in South Scituate, in 1836.

...He believed most thoroughly in baptism, but believed that one drop of pure water was as effectual as an ocean. However, if any one thought differently he acceded to their wishes, and when Miss Mary Merritt thought immersion the only true baptism, he gave her baptism in the North River.

...I once heard him tell of his experience when travelling in New Hampshire on a lecture tour. He was obliged to ride through a long piece of woods which had a great reputation for robbers. Just as he was about halfway through, a very rough-looking man rushed from a thicket toward his horse's head, when Mr. May, reining in his horse, said "Well, sir! You seem to be going my way. I am alone, jump in; I shall be happy to have your company." --Rather amazed, the man got in, and was soon listening to Mr. May's pleasant and interesting stories. At first the man was very reticent but finally quite sociable, and when the village was reached he said, "I will now leave you," and giving his hand a warm clasp as he left the carriage said, "You can never know the great benefit you have done me." Mr. May had good reason to believe that the man's evil intentions had been overcome by his kindness.

The same spirit was manifest in his parish life. One gentleman was so opposed to [Mr. May] on account of his great earnestness in the temperance cause that he would not go with his family to church, so Mr. May would always take pains to send [that gentleman] word when he was to exchange [sermons], that he might then have the privilege of attending.

HENDERSON MAP \_\_\_\_\_ Interesting hand-drawn map suitable for framing. It was drawn by Anne Henderson and first issued in 1967 by the NHS. A favorite depiction of the location of historic homes.
