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# Trim Tools on the Road

There are always the minimum tools you need to trim a horse, and for the most part, you probably could get away with two knives, a rasp and a pair of gloves. But here is a more extensive list of things you should have or could have with you when you are traveling to clients.



**Essentials**—always think about carrying

spares. Nothing worse than being miles away from home, something happens to one of your tools and you have to quit working for the day:

# And finally a tip for nervous horses:


