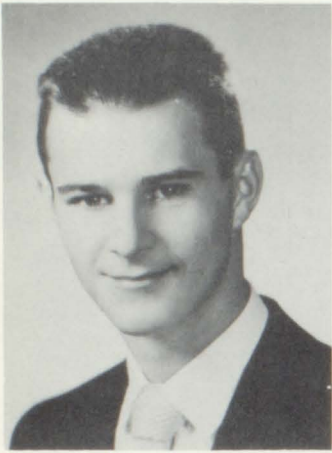
SENIORS

A group of the quieter type was often found in the recreation hall enjoying popular music, even appreciating the masters.

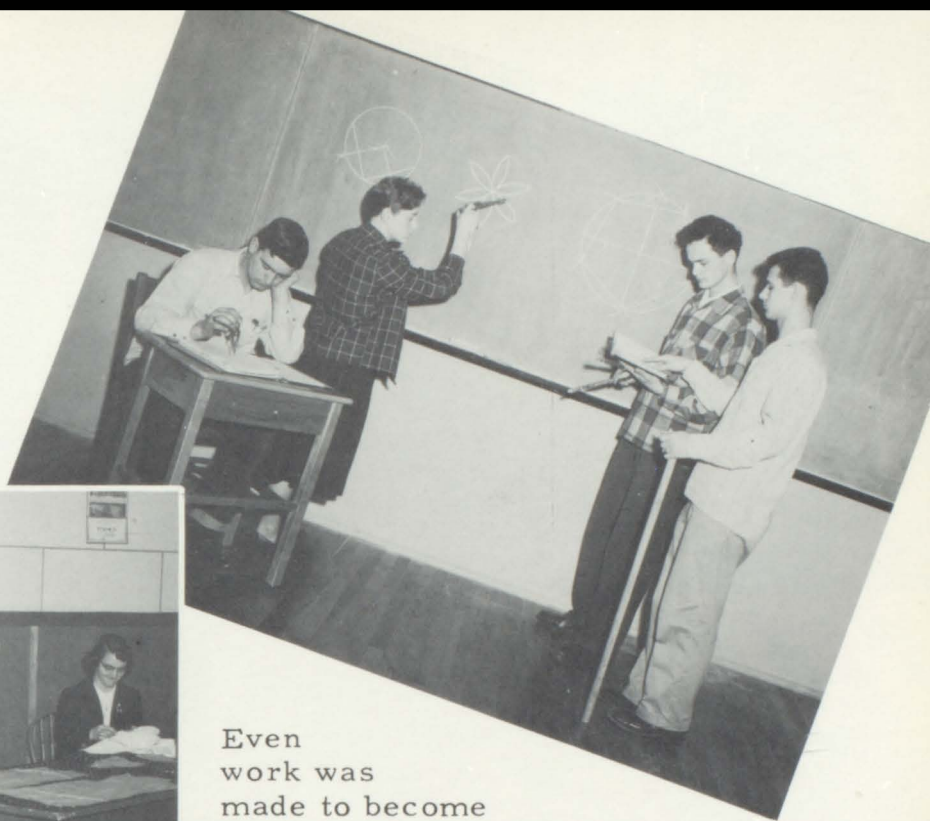
Then, there were those, who often enjoyed a good game of cards, not only as amusement but as a means of improving mental alertness.

Our two pianists, not only enjoyed the satisfaction of playing beautiful music, but also realized that music has a particular charm.

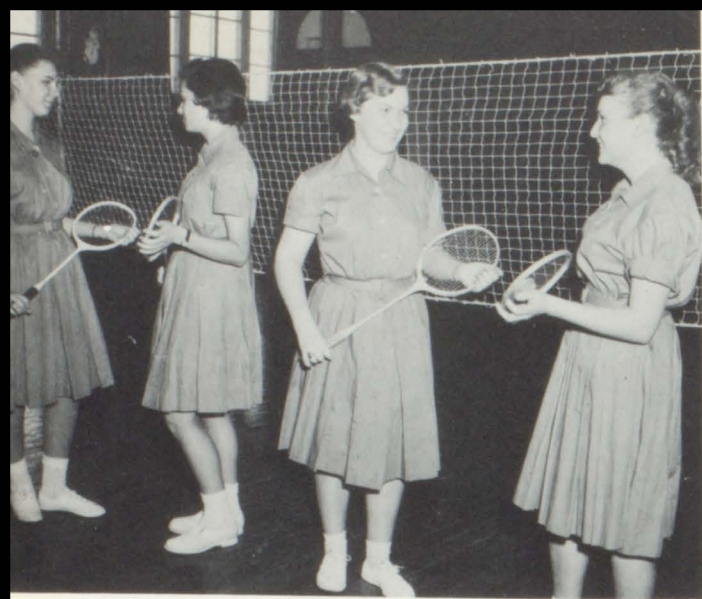
And, would you believe it? Our mathematically-minded students actually derived enjoyment from their geometry constructions. . . . outside of school hours, if you please!!!

Many an hour was spent in playing badminton. It's lots of fun!

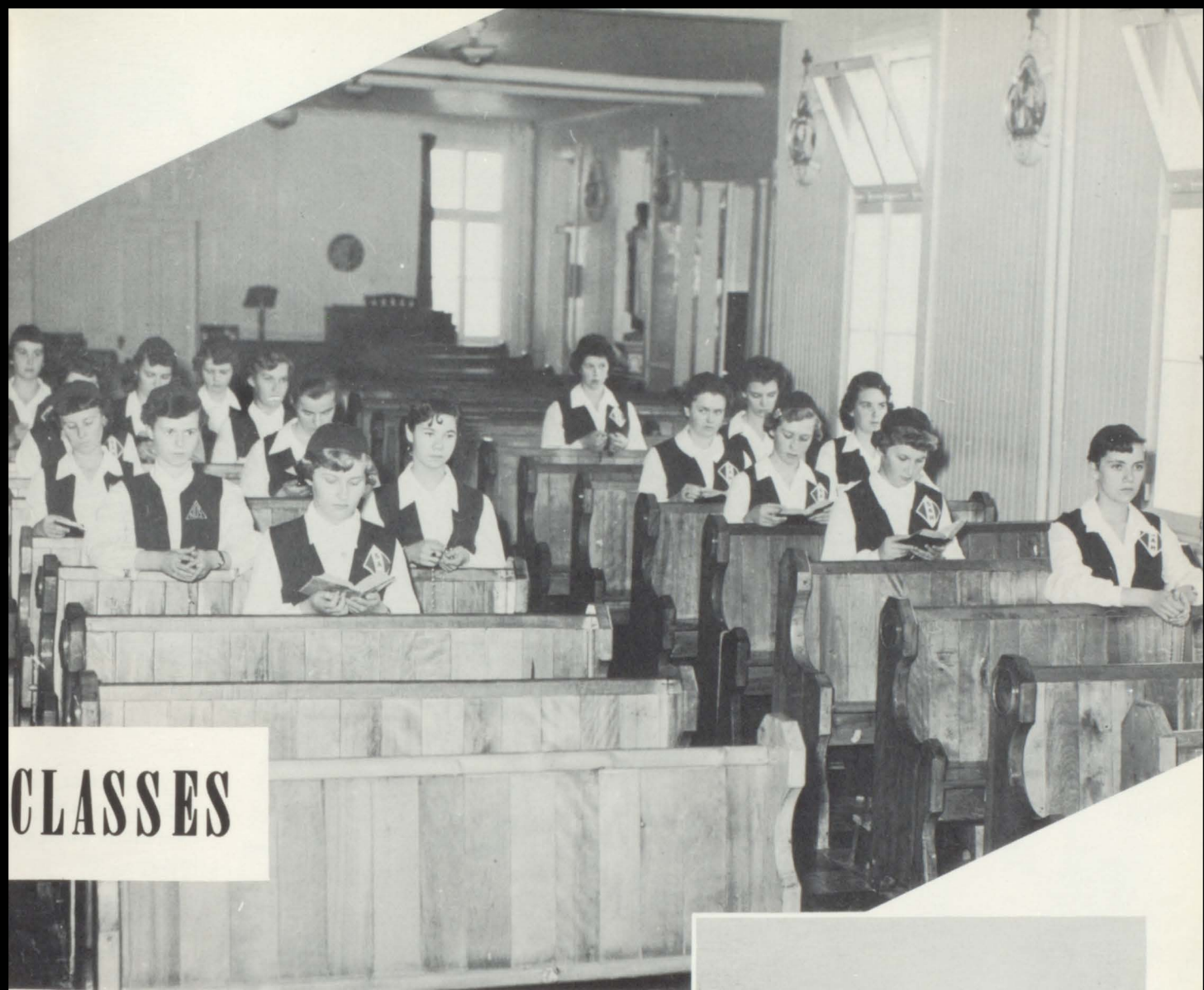

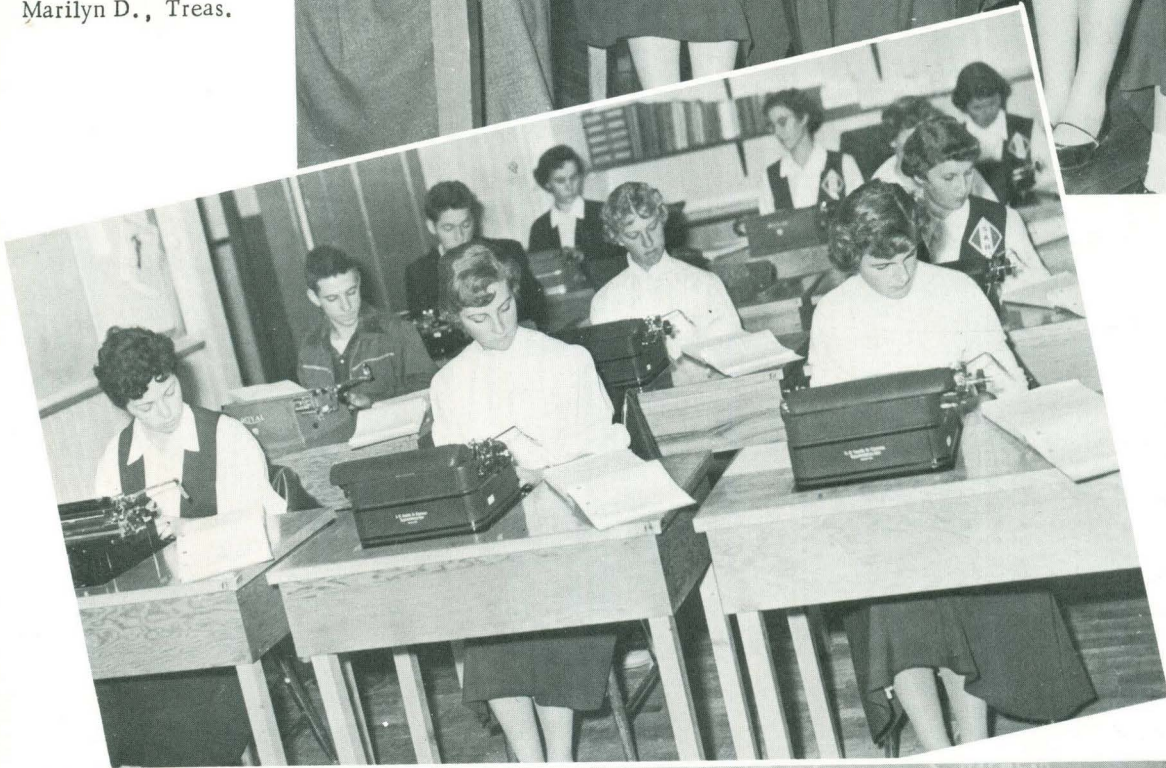
RIGHT TO WORSHIP GOD IN ONE'S OWN WAY

In the snowshoeing race two Seniors won first and second place while a Junior and a Freshman were runners-up.

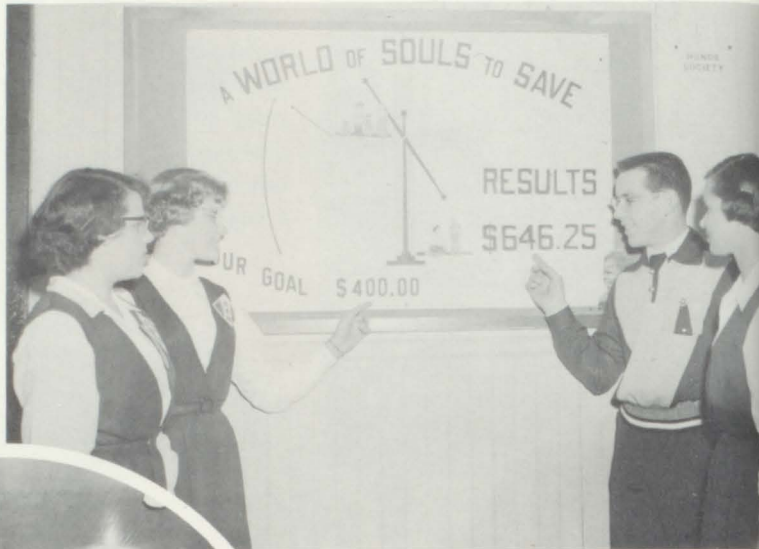
Kathleen Thibodeau, a Freshman, circled the rink in 28 seconds to find that she had successfully beaten all the other racers.

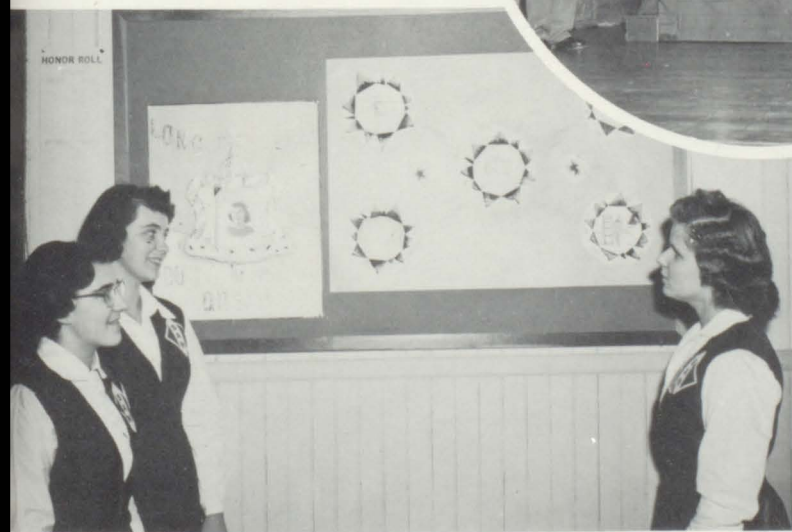


The boarders' Chorale greatly enhanced our Christmas Program by their beautiful singing of Christmas Carols.
