At Wisdom High School, our Business Education Curriculum consists of special areas of instruction that deal directly with business knowledge and skills that are necessary in adjusting to the world of business today.

We in the Business Department are trying to achieve these objectives by offering such courses as Typewriting, Bookkeeping, Office Practice, Shorthand, General Business, Business Mathematics, and Clerical Practice. Students enrolled in the Academic and Home Ec. courses are also given the opportunities to learn to typewrite or take other courses offered by the Department.

Above all, we aim at inculcating in our students certain basic attitudes and habits, so that, by their contribution to the business world of today, they will make it a better place in which to live.

The English Department strives to awaken the student's interest in literature in order to deepen his understanding and appreciation of life, its meaning and values. In freshman and sophomore years, he reads and studies all the forms of literature--short story, essay, novel, drama, and poetry. In junior year he is introduced to the American way of life. In senior year he delves into the rich heritage of English Literature.

Closely allied with the study of literature is the study of the art of self-expression. The student is taught to think clearly and objectively, to evaluate what he reads, and to express his thought meaningfully and correctly, both orally and on paper. The ability to communicate effectively must be developed through high school to enable our students to compete favorably in college or in industry.

Wisdom High is fortunate to have a corrective oral English program centered in its new language lab, to help the students with a more correct English pronunciation. This program is operative in the high school and hopefully will include the junior high next year.





FRENCH

French I on the Junior High level aims at promoting speaking through the audio-lingual approach, at introducing students to elementary reading, at teaching them to write simple sentences and at instilling into them certain basic rules of grammar.

French I in the freshman year encourages speaking in our new language laboratory, stresses the writing of correct sentences and paragraphs, teaches correct spelling and acquaints the students with the culture, geography, and literature of France.

Sophomores taking French II progress in the art of oral expression through laboratory drills and improve their writing techniques through composition practice. The study of the cultural aspects and the literature of France are both amplified.

French III accelerates the development of all vital skills. Conversations and debates on stimulating topics are conducted. Writing stresses both grammatical and logical exactness. A love for and understanding of French literature, history and culture is nurtured through selected readings and recordings.

French IV is geared to college bound students. Cultural readings, both extensive and intensive, provide a broad view of modern French life. Literature works - taken in full or in excerpt form - make up the prelude to summaries and "explications de texte."

To do this, we seek to develop an understanding of the roots of democracy, the functions of democracy in a democratic society. Thus having understood his own heritage, he will be able to understand and appreciate the socio-political and cultural heritage of those societies unlike his own with which he will have to deal in his adult life.



HOME ECONOMICS

The home economic course is primarily designed to give a young woman a well rounded education in all areas of home and family living.

The home economic curriculum provides a 3 year sequence in the following areas: child care and development, human relations, foods and nutrition; clothing and textiles, housing, home management and budgeting, home nursing; interior decoration, consumer education, plus many other related subjects. In addition to the regular home economics subjects, students are allowed to select courses in business such as office practice, typewriting, etc.

Upon completion of a home economics course a student is prepared to enter any of the following occupational fields--such as child-care aide, food service worker in hospitals, nursing homes, sales clerk, beautician, stewardess; dressmaker, food service supervisor, equipment demonstrator; teaching, extension service, business, dietetics and institutional management; journalism, television, radio, research; health and welfare.

Opportunities are unlimited in all fields to a graduate of home economics.

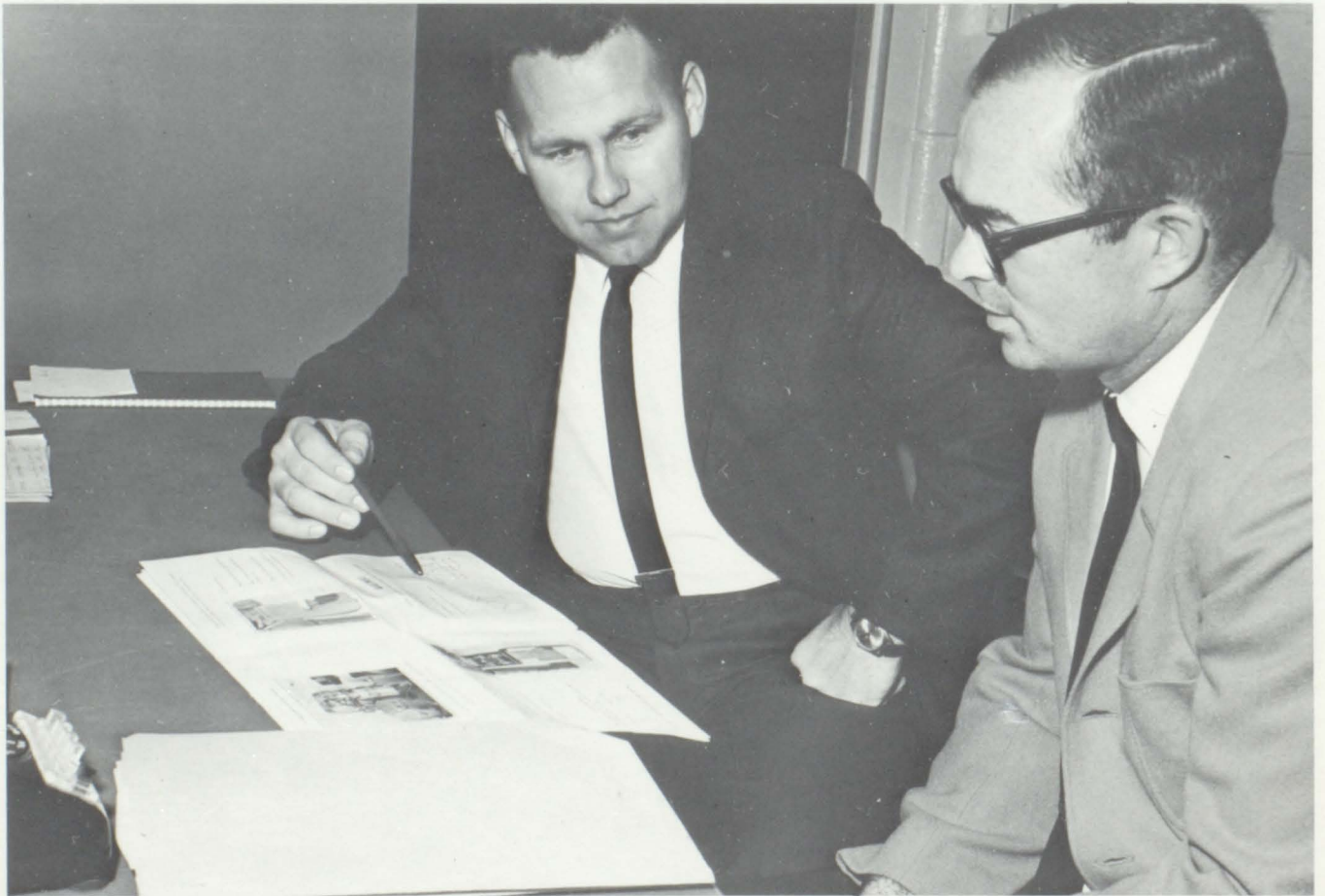

MATHEMATICS

Mathematics, an escape into reality, a journey into the unknown, can only be defined in terms of the universe whose laws it attempts to comprehend. Any other definition would impose limits on a discipline whose only limits are those of the intellect.

A variety of mathematics courses are necessitated by both student individual differences and differences in major courses of study. Courses presently being offered are Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, and Trigonometry for college preparatory students, Business Mathematics for commercial students, and Shop Mathematics for industrial arts students.

A major objective of the department is to develop and refine the student's innate ability to gather non-prejudicial information from his environment, and to formulate, from this information, new ideas which will be of benefit to himself and to society.

The Science Department has as its major objective: to make available to our students courses of study that will help each student to grow and mature as persons - especially in today's society, characterized largely by its advancement in science and technology.

A knowledge leading to understanding; an understanding leading to appreciation - both of persons and of matter - these are our specific objectives.

Our courses are of a practical nature; familiarizing students with a science of himself, of his environment as well as of current science; of a theoretical nature; preparing those students who wish to continue in further study.

More and more emphasis has been placed on laboratory work with satisfactory results. This has been possible due to increase of laboratory materials recently added to the lab classrooms.

The primary purpose of the Junior High program is to prepare the students with the necessary skills and knowledge needed for future life. Courses include English, Math, Science, French, Reading, and Social Studies. This year a new geography program was introduced to make the Social Studies program more effective. The use of the reading lab has contributed to the development of French and Reading Programs to facilitate learning. To provide for individual differences, the 8th graders have been grouped for all their subjects for the past 2 years. Some grouping in 7th grade reading has also been provided. In this way, some students can be challenged, while others can receive remedial help. Both teachers and students find this grouping effective.

All students are encouraged to assume personal responsibility and to develop their talents and use their initiative in school projects.



These two years of preparation provide the students with many opportunities which will make adaptation in high school easier.

Elected by the student body, the School Officers, along with all the members of the council, have the responsibility of organizing activities throughout the school year.

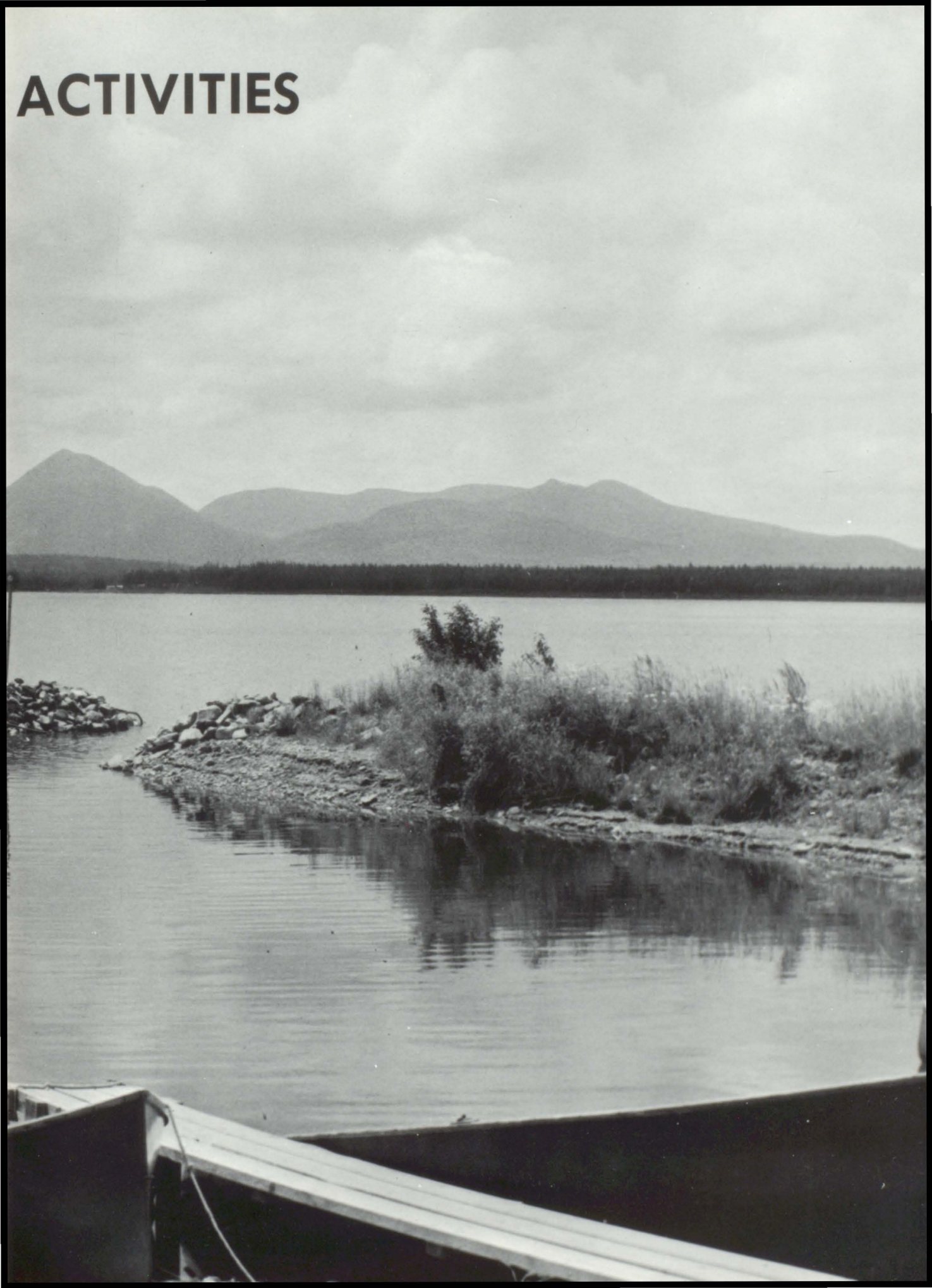

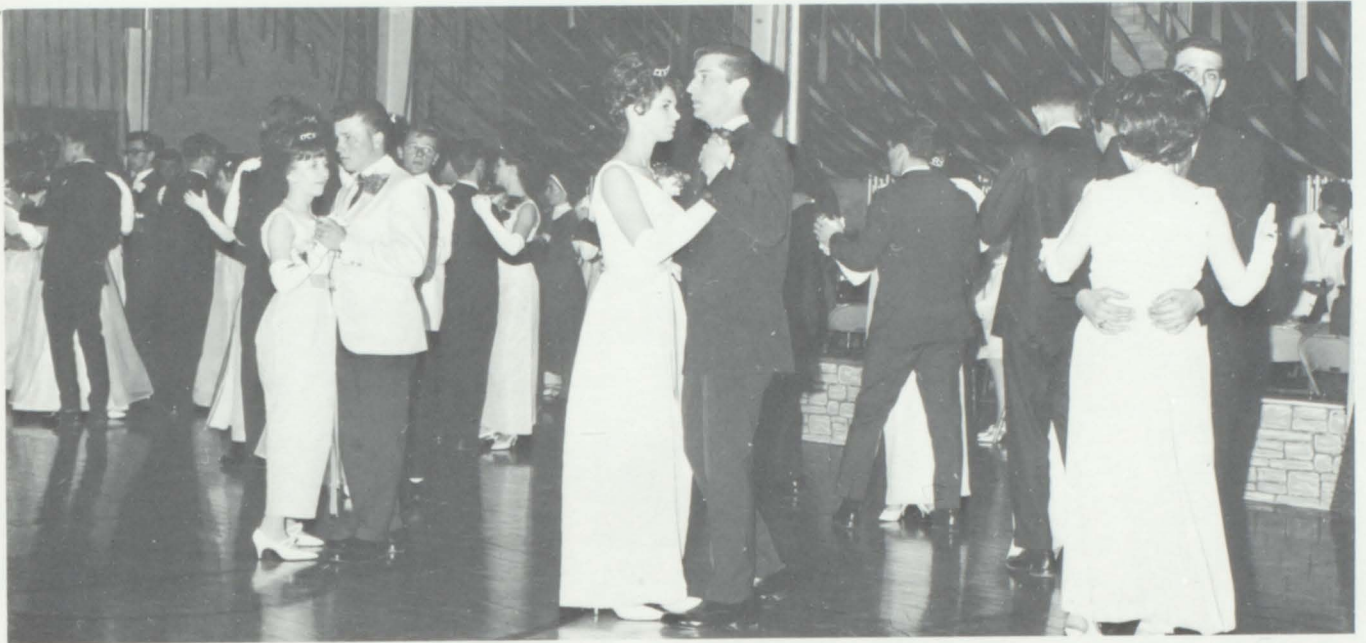

J. Raymond Brennick introduced guest speaker, Leo N. Albert, president of Prentice Hall International, Englewood, N. J.

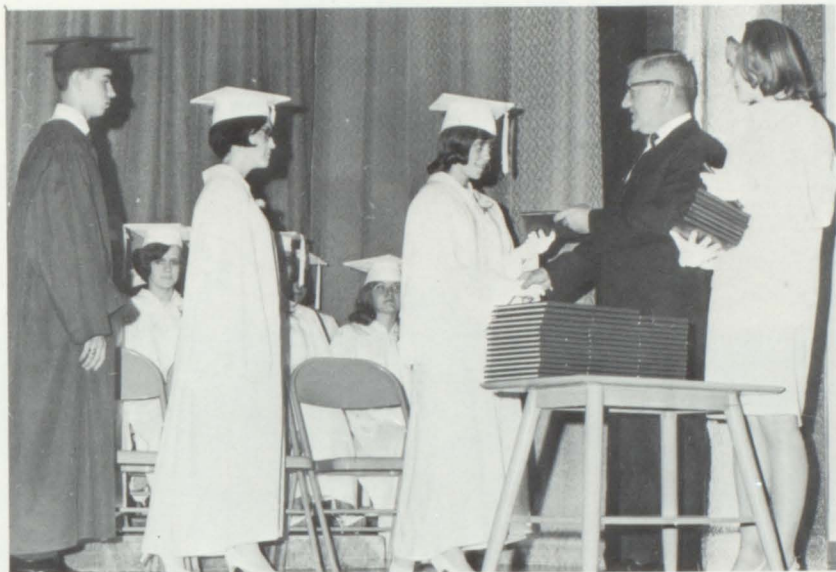
Mr. Albert spoke of his student days at St. Agatha, and his work at the present time as President of Prentice Hall International, which has taken him in travel to countries all over the world.
