
tickets. You can win the first prize 40-HRS of free labor provided by 5 members for 8 hours our 10HRS of free labor

VA HEALTHEVET - HOW TO USE VA SECURE MESSAGING

NON-URGENT VS. URGENT MESSAGES

Are you a Veteran receiving care at a VA facility? If you receive care as a VA patient and have a My HealtheVet Premium account, you're eligible to use Secure Messaging to communicate with your health care team online. You can enjoy the convenience of having your concerns and questions answered by your doctor without scheduling an appointment. But we want to make sure you know when to send a Secure Message and when to call your doctor or 911.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN NON-URGENT AND URGENT

Understanding the difference between non-urgent and urgent messages can help you safely seek information or care. It also ensures that you receive the right care at the right time. Secure Messaging is not a hotline for health problems. It should not be used if you need immediate attention or as an extension of the emergency room. Secure Messaging is for routine questions you may have for your health care team members or administrative departments such as Patient Advocates, Fiscal, Travel, and more.

NON-URGENT MESSAGES

Non-urgent messages are routine and do not require immediate attention. In most cases, these are messages that can wait to be answered, like a regular visit with your primary care clinic. Some examples of non-urgent concerns include:

- Asking about an appointment
- Renewing your medications or asking questions about your prescriptions
- Lab test results
- Message to the clinic staff or questions for your health care team

URGENT MESSAGES

Urgent messages are more severe and may need immediate medical attention. Urgent health concerns are considered serious and require emergency care. If not treated immediately, they could result in disability or death. Urgent or emergency health concerns should not be addressed through Secure Messaging. Some examples of urgent medical concerns include:

- Bleeding
- Infection or fever
- Spinal cord, back injury, or broken bone
- Trouble breathing or chest pain

If you're away from home and cannot wait until you see your health care provider for treatment, you need to go to the closest VA Clinic, Urgent Care, or emergency room. If you have trouble breathing or have chest pain, you should call 911 for immediate help.

Don't use Secure Messaging in place of seeking medical care. **Upgrade to Premium** To use Secure Messaging, you must have registered on My HealtheVet as a VA Patient and have a Premium account. Stay in better contact with your VA health care team by upgrading your account today.

How Far Would You Go for Liberty?

Watching the news lately seems like we are going back in time and witnessing the actions of Nazi Germany as they attempt to control Europe. When I witness the Ukrainians fighting back against the Russians, I can't help but to think of the word Liberty. The Ukrainians could have simply caved into Russian demands and kept their lives and property. All they had to do was give up their Liberty. Why didn't they? They didn't for some of the very same reasons our forefathers fought to protect their Liberty against the abuses of the British. So what is Liberty? In order to answer that question, we turn to the English philosopher John Locke (b1632d1704). In order to explain Liberty John Locke formulated an argument centered around the concept of humans in a state of nature. Imagine you are transported back to a time where there is no government but just you and a group of other humans residing in the same geographical area. Locke argued that you and your fellow humans are free, equal and rational and you all possess the following inalienable natural rights. The right to life (Don't kill me), the right to Liberty (Don't enslave me) and the right to property (Don't take my stuff). In order to protect these natural rights, you and your fellow humans would eventually reach out to each other and form a government because people in a state of nature would naturally seek personal advantage. In order to ensure that personal advantage by the individual does not infringe upon others a government designed to protect natural rights is required. Our forefathers struggled with their liberty being trampled by the British for the British were determining what they believed was good for their country and their colonies thousands of miles away without the consent of those living in the colonies. George Washington and his fellow colonist could have just sat back and allowed the British to tax them and govern them without their direct consent and they could have lived out their lives without war and so much sacrifice. The same is true for the Ukrainians. Prior to the bombs falling the Ukrainians could have simply opened their borders to the Russians and allowed them full control. Every building in Ukraine would still be standing, thousands of lives would not have been lost but Liberty would be absent. So, the title question remains, "How far would you go to protect your Liberty?
