the handicap ramp, new heating system, new fire suppression system in the kitchen, paving the front of the building and installing drywells, renovation of commander and Auxiliary rooms, repair of some of the electrical to reduce the risk of fire and improve lighting. All of these projects are just the beginning. In 2021 we received several roofer quotes and happily we discovered that we do not need to replace the entire roof. There is a large section that has many more years left on it so the funds we did raise toward the roof will be used to repair and replace sections of the roof as well as updating the gutter system. When these repairs are accomplished, we will install a ring camera and light system around the Post to help illuminate the area and ensure we have an additional layer of security. We need two new bathrooms to include handicap accessibility as the population that we serve require them. This is not a simple task as it requires an architect, plans, totally new plumbing system and possibly updates to our sanitation system. This and any other major transformation vision needs a project manager and a team of volunteers to help oversee the project. This is where you come in. When I say you, I mean those of you out there that have experience and possibly even businesses that can execute these projects. The Legion will work diligently to help raise the funds but we need your help to make these visions come true. Consider taking on just one of these projects with a group of your friends forming a team that executes a project in honor of a Veteran or Veterans. The Eagle Scout Project is a perfect example of how our kids give back to our community so we now ask our adult population to follow their example. The project you and your team oversee can be dedicated to the Veterans you wish to honor by naming that project after them with a permanent plaque similarly to all the names on the stools and chairs in the bar. When you participate in these projects, you're not just executing a construction job but directly impacting your community. Our facility not only provides a place for the recently mentioned organizations to meet but it also provides an affordable place for those in our community to host weddings, birthday parties, graduation parties, and so much more. We do not compete with local business as we all know the wealth that is coming to the North Fork and there is nothing wrong with that change; however, more and more of our local population is priced out of such venues and I'm a perfect example. I held my wedding at the Post because I was in no position to have my wedding at a Vineyard

or catering hall unless I wanted to take out a substantial loan. I'm constantly running into people that express to me their fond memories of their wedding at the post or birthday party. We can't continue to serve the community unless we update the facility to ensure its future use. Will you partner with the Legion to take on a project? If you do then please give me a call 631-702-3083. Take a look at the rest of the Reporter and you will see some of the artist rendering or vision photos of what we would like to see for our future and possible projects you can volunteer to help come true. We will continue throughout the year to communicate our vision and we are excited for the future because we know the North Fork always steps-up.







THIS MONTH: VACATIONS FOR MILITARY | BY MILITARY

If you're planning a vacation and trying to find an available hotel/apartment/home for a temporary stay, CONUS or OUTCONUS, reasonably priced and sometimes owned by a deployed military member, look to website specifically designed for military members; AHRN: www.ahrn.com (Automated Housing Referral Network);

Homes.mil: www.homes.mil, and MBO: www.militarybyowner.com which, if you're advertising, charge fees. AHRN is the current version of the old Department of Defense (DoD) website for housing referrals and HOMES.mil is a publicly accessible Department of Defense (DoD) website. When a customer searches for a rental, they are required to select a specific installation, then they can include other information such as number of bedrooms. A list is returned that includes all the properties that meet those search criteria.

Which One Should You Use? MBO, AHRN, and Homes.mil are all designed to provide the same service: to provide a database of properties available for rent or sale to military families. All three allow you to search by installation, property features, location, or cost. I recommend that you use all three.



The American Legion was chartered by Congress in 1919 as a patriotic veterans organization. Focusing on service to veterans, service members and communities, the Legion evolved from a group of war-weary veterans of World War I into one of the most influential nonprofit groups in the United States. Membership swiftly grew to over 1 million, and local posts sprang up across the country. Today, membership stands at nearly 2 million in more than 13,000 posts worldwide. The posts are organized into 55 departments: one each for the 50 states, along with the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, France, Mexico and the Philippines. Over the years, the Legion has influenced considerable social change in America, won hundreds of benefits for veterans and produced many important programs for children and youth. Following is a chronology of significant dates in **Legion history:**



March 15-17

Members of the American Expeditionary Force convene in Paris for the first American Legion caucus.

May 8-10

St. Louis Caucus. "The American Legion" is adopted as the organization's official name. The Legion's draft preamble and constitution are approved.

June 9

The National Executive Committee adopts the Legion emblem.

Sept. 16

Congress charters The American Legion.

Nov. 10-12

First Legion convention convenes in Minneapolis. The Constitution and preamble are adopted. Delegates vote 361-323 to locate the Legion's national headquarters in Indianapolis, instead of Washington. A resolution is passed in support of Boy Scouts of America. *Today, the Legion is the chartering agency for more than 1,700 Scouting units made up of approximately 64,000 youths*.


1920s —

Aug. 9, 1921

The Legion's efforts result in the creation of the U.S. Veterans Bureau, forerunner of the Veterans Administration. *Today, the Legion continues to lobby for adequate funding to cover medical, disability, education and other benefits for veterans.*

June 15, 1923

The first "Flag Code" is drafted during a Legion conference in Washington. Congress adopts the code in 1942. *Today, the Legion is at the forefront of efforts to pass a constitutional amendment to protect the U.S. flag from physical desecration.*



July 17, 1925

The Legion creates the American Legion Baseball program. Today, more than 50 percent of Major League Baseball players are graduates of the program. About 82,000 youths play on Legion-sponsored teams each year.

1930s -

September 1932

The Sons of The American Legion is officially recognized during the 1932 National Convention in Portland, Ore.

June 23, 1935

The first American Legion Boys State convenes in Springfield, Ill., to help youths gain an understanding of the structure and operation of the federal government. The first Boys Nation, bringing together youth leadership from all the Boys State programs, convenes in 1946. *Today, more than 19,500 young men participate in Boys State, and 98 in Boys Nation, from 49 of the 50 states*.

June 1, 1938

The final round of the Legion's first annual National High School Oratorical Contest is conducted in Norman, Okla. Today, more than 3,400 high-school students from around the country compete annually in the contest, which promotes a greater understanding of the U.S. Constitution. Winners receive thousands of dollars in college scholarships.
