Celebrating Marcia Bringedahl



My wife Linda and I first met Marcia in 2008 shortly after Richard had passed away. Backus was in need of a new **Publicity and Advertising** Chairperson and I think Marcia was looking for a volunteer opportunity. Marcia had 20 years of newspaper, proofreading, typesetting, office management and bookkeeping experience and proved to be the perfect match for Backus' needs. Our friendship and relationship continued to grow from that point on.

Having Marcia as our **Publicity and Advertising** person was like having a full-time staff person on board. Lynn Naeckel, one of Marcia's friends, commented on Marcia's passing, "where are we going to find three people in the community to fill her shoes?" Marcia was active in two orchestras, Tuesday Musicale, Zion Lutheran Church and as a member of the Backus Board

of Directors since 2009.

Needless to say Marcia did a fantastic job of promoting Backus through news releases, advertising, radio ads, scheduling radio interviews, tickets to radio auction, promoting and participating in events. However it was in proofreading that I came to depend on Marcia the most. Not only did she do a thorough job of reading and editing what I wrote, but she would tactfully suggest a different word or on occasion, point out that I used the same word three times in one sentence.

But the best thing about having Marcia proofread what I wrote, whether it was a grant application, article for the newspaper or Alumni News, was that she was always so complimentary and encouraging. She boosted my confidence and selfesteem every time she proof read my work. How could I ever mind a few red pen marks with Marcia's bubbly and enthusiastic compliments coming back to me?

Marcia not only became part of the "Backus Family," she also began to feel like "family" to Linda and me. Many

Norwegian/Lutheran similarities emerged as we got to know each other. Her parents were Norwegian - my mother's family was all Norwegian. We learned about growing up in Fargo (my parents lived in Fargo for almost 20 years). Marcia attended a private Lutheran College – Concordia. I attended a private Lutheran College – Gustavus Adolphus. Marcia and Richard were married while she was in college. Linda and I were married my senior year in college. We attended Zion Lutheran Church together. Marcia encouraged us to join the Sons of Norway Lodge. She often brought food for us to enjoy (which we did!). Linda and Marcia often collaborated on "gift baskets" for Backus fundraisers. Our niece graduated from Carlton College as did Marcia's grandson Tyler. We both celebrated our excitement over new "Wisconsin" babies in the family: Marcia's great-granddaughter Lana our granddaughter Lily; both born about the same time. Linda and Marcia visited, talked on the phone, worked on projects together, shared stories and even some secrets.

The most telling secret that Marcia let us in on was that the Sons of Norway often purchased frozen meatballs rather than making them from scratch – you can imagine how devastating that was. Linda told Marcia that she had used the same frozen meatballs and passed them off at our house until discovered by one of our sons. Linda confided recently that Marcia was like an older sister to her.

Marcia was continually in our thoughts and prayers over the past several months. Unsure about visiting, we reached out with flowers or a card. I thought about her frequently as I wrote a grant application on September 30 and October

1. As I attached the "List of Current Backus Board Members" to the grant, I reflected on all Marcia had meant to Backus over her eight years of volunteer work for us. I wondered, would this be the final time Marcia's name appeared on the "List of Current Board Members." Marcia passed away the next day.

Food Distribution Helps Keep Food Out of Landfill

The best place to store surplus food is in people's stomachs! Therefore, we have made an effort locally to provide food to individuals without question. To qualify, they just have to be hungry and be able to eat!

Ruby's Pantry is "a hand up, not a hand out." In reality, people feel good helping the organization with a small financial contribution. Participants receive an abundance of food.

When attending one of our distributions you are truly a guest and partner in this effort. A guest because our volunteers are there to serve you with enthusiasm and partner because you are given an "opportunity for dignity" by donating \$20 to help cover the operational cost.

Ruby's Pantry has no government funding. It is primarily funded by the contributions of our guests. Please bring cash to help to simplify bookkeeping and two large boxes or laundry baskets. We do not sell food!



When you arrive at a distribution for the first time you will need to register and then sign in. This is a simple registration that requires no documentation. After the first time you will need to simply sign in. The \$20 is donated first, then your registration form is handed in/signed in and you will be given a number.

Then you will wait until your number is called and you will go through a line where the food is then placed in your boxes. Although you aren't required to take anything that you do not want we encourage you to take it and share with your family members, neighbors and friends.

Volunteers are on hand to assist you in the line and your food will be carried out for you. Guests simply drive up on the west side of Backus; volunteers load your food into your vehicle.

Ruby's Pantry is the second Monday of each month. The next one will be held Monday, November 9 at Backus Community Center, 900 5th Street, International Falls.
