Rational

Exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation in childhood is a major risk factor for developing skin cancer later in life. By implementing a best practice Sun Smart Policy and practices, early childhood education and care services can help protect educators and children from UV radiation and teach children good sun protection habits from an early age.

Implementation

Scheduling Outdoor Activities - Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety

The World Health Organization's Global Solar UV Index measures UV levels on a scale from 0 (Low) to 11+ (Extreme). Sun protection is recommended when UV levels are 3 (Moderate) or higher. The UV level is affected by a number of factors including the time of day, time of year, cloud cover, altitude, location and surrounding surfaces. Before heading outside Educator's must consult the sunsmart app and make a sun protection decision based on the current UV level, being an overcast or cooler day does not mean the UV will be lower.

The sun protection times are a forecast from the <u>Bureau of Meteorology</u> showing when UV levels will be 3 and above. At this level there is a risk of skin damage for most Australians.

Outdoor activity times and sun protection practices to include:

October-March: Minimise outdoor activity between 11am and 3pm (daylight saving time). Sun protection practices are required at all times when outside.

April-September: Outdoor activity can be planned at any time of the day. Sun protection practices are required between 10am and 2pm, except in June and July when the UV index is mostly below 3.

All sun protection measures will be considered when planning excursions and all events at the service.

The SunSmart app will be installed on all centre devices so that educators can regularly check the current UV.

Shade - Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety. Quality Area 3: Physical environment

All outdoor activities will be planned to occur in shaded areas. Play activities will be set up in the shade and oved throughout the day to take advantage of shade patterns.

The service will provide and maintain adequate shade for outdoor play. Shade options can include a combination of portable, natural and built shade. Regular shade assessments should be conducted to monitor existing shade structures and assist in planning for additional shade.

Hats - Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety

Educators, children and students are required to wear sun-safe hats that protect their face, neck and ears. Sun safe hats include:

- Bucket hats with a deep crown and brim size of at least 5cm (adults 6cm)
- Broad-brimmed hats with a brim size of at least 6cm (adults 7.5cm)
- Legionnaire style hats

Please note: Baseball caps or visors are not sun safe hats.

Children without a sun safe hat are required to play in an area protected from the sun or will be provided with a spare hat.

During the cooler months children and educators are able to wear beanies, during June and July no additional sun safe care is required (ie sun cream) but any other cooler month sun cream is required.

Clothing – Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety

Educator, children and students are required to wear sun safe clothing that covers as much of the skin (especially the shoulders, back and stomach) as possible. Children's shoulders must be covered at all times (singlet tops should not be wore to the centre). This includes wearing:

- Loose fitting shirts and dresses with sleeves and collars or covered neckline
- Longer style skirts, shorts or trousers
 Please note: Midriff, crop or singlet tops are not sun safe clothing

Children without sun safe clothing are required to play in an area protected from the sun or will be given spare clothing.

Sunscreen – Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety

Educator's, children and students are required to apply at least SPF 30+ broad-spectrum water-resistant sunscreen 20 minutes before going outdoors and reapply every 2 hours. Sunscreen is stored in a cool, dry place and the expiry date is monitored.

The widespread use of sunscreen on babies under 6 months old is not recommended.

Babies - Quality Area 2: Children's health and safety

Babies under 12 months should not be exposed to direct sunlight and are to remain in full shade when outside. They are required to wear sun safe hats and clothing and small amounts of SPF30+

sunscreen suitable for babies can be applied to exposed skin if they are older than 6 months.

Role Modelling – Quality Area 5: Relationships with children

Educators and students are required to act as role models and demonstrate sun safe behaviour by:

Wearing a sun safe hat, clothing and sunscreen and using shade

• Wearing sunglasses (optional)

• Encourage families and visitors to role model positive sun safe behaviour when at the

service.

Slap on a sun protective hat

- All children and educators wear hats that protect their face, neck and ears (legionnaire, broad-brimmed or bucket style).
- Caps and visors are not considered a suitable alternative.
- Children without a sun protective hat are provided with a spare hat where possible.

Slop on sunscreen

- SPF30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen is supplied by the service and/or families.
- Sunscreen is applied at least 20 minutes before going outdoors and reapplied every two hours, or more frequently if sweating or swimming.
- To help develop independent skills ready for school, children from three years of age are encouraged and given opportunities to apply their own sunscreen under supervision of staff.
- Sunscreen is stored in a supervised, cool place, out of the sun. The expiry date is monitored.
- Where children have allergies or sensitivities to sunscreen, parents are asked to provide an alternative sunscreen or children are encouraged to play in the shade.

Slide on sunglasses [if practical]

Where practical children wear close-fitting, wrap-around sunglasses that meet the Australian Standard 1067 (Sunglasses: Category 2, 3 or 4) and cover as much of the eye area as possible.
