Dear Messiah,

Easter is here. I write this Monday morning, April 1st and it feels like a dream. With services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Saturday with the Easter Vigil, and a packed Easter Sunday service, I can barely believe it all happened! But it did, with credit going to the many volunteers, worship participants and all those who just showed up: The Spirit was at work in all of you this week and it was a blessing to the church and the community of Red Lodge. Thanks be to God.

But it's Monday. While Easter Sunday has come gone, the season will continue for the next six Sundays. This has me asking a question that I've had some trouble putting words to – basically, what do we do now? It's a question about what has changed. It's a question about our eyes, the way the world continues to look but that we see it now in a new light. It's a question about identity – who are WE now that Jesus has risen from the dead? Easter makes us a Resurrection People, and the season of Easter is for us to figure out what that means and looks like.

My Easter sermon, if you missed it, was based on the reality that people get "hung up" on the resurrection (did it really happen?) and that this shouldn't stop us from living the life Jesus taught us to live. In other words, Easter isn't theory, it's action. Jesus gave us all these ways of practicing resurrection that allows it to grow on us and form us into a new kind of people — a Resurrection People.

I'm worried. We have a presidential candidate selling Bibles that fan the flames of Christian Nationalist understandings of the world and the place of the US in it. We have wars waging across the globe threatening to spiral beyond their boarders. We are facing a long hot summer here in the American West without a winter melt to keep fires at bay. And we have more to do, one year later, in this new location – landscaping is at the top of that list, with trees, bushes, rocks, and even sheds and bridges (!) on the horizon. It's exciting to be sure. But I'm afraid living even more into this place, we will lose sight of what us Resurrection People are about.

So as the Easter Season progresses, I want you to join me in thinking about the life that God opened to us when Jesus emerged from the tomb. It will take all of us to find our way in this new and uncharted territory, but the resurrected body of Jesus will guide.

I wish you Easter blessings and the promise of new life in Christ into which we now move together.

Easter Message 2024, Elizabeth Eaton, ELCA Presiding Bishop

"So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone for they were afraid." That's where the Gospel of Mark originally ended. And it just seems so odd to me. It's so abrupt. I mean, the women had seen the angel. He'd announced that Jesus was raised from the dead, and then he tells them all this good news and wants them to go on their way. And they just are not going to say a single word. There are three words in that passage that really stand out for me, especially in the Greek. One is fear — phobos. We get phobia from that. The other one is amazement — ekstasis. We get ecstasy from that. And the other one has to do with being seized. It actually means "being possessed." So we take a look at these women, and they've had this miraculous appearance by an angel. They've heard the good news that Jesus has raised from the dead, and they're too afraid to do anything about it, and they just are going to be silent. It seems that nothing changed. They came to take care of Jesus' dead body because on the Sabbath they could not work. But on the first day of the week, they were there. They have this announcement, and then it's all the same. Sometimes I think we feel like nothing's changed. Sometimes I think that the events in our country, in our church, around the world are just so terrifying and so overwhelming that it seems like the resurrection really didn't make a difference. But these three words really say something about the women, and I think about us and, most especially, about Easter. When they said that they were filled with amazement — this is this ecstasy, ekstasis — they were really standing. It means literally standing in a different place. So though they were still in the tomb and they hadn't reacted yet, nevertheless, everything had changed. And because of the resurrection, we, all of us, are standing in a different place. The whole of creation is standing in a different place. And the word for fear, phobos, phobia we get from that. But it's really a sense of trembling in the presence of God, of awe that they were actually filled with awe — not paralyzed by fear but filled with awe. And I hope this Eastertide and all year round, we have a sense of the presence of God that fills us with awe. And it also says that they were seized with fear. Well, the word means "possessed." And yes, we believe that in baptism because of the resurrection, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit and we now are all Spirit-possessed. When things seem to be staying the same, when things seem to be happening and coming at us so quickly, I think it's very important to take time to be a little amazed, to be standing in a different place, to have a sense of this awe and trembling before the Lord, and to allow ourselves to be possessed by the Spirit, who will give us power and courage in these times. My favorite hymn is "Lord Jesus, You Shall Be My Song." It's ELW 808. And the last verse goes like this: "I fear in the dark and the doubt of my journey; but courage will come with the sound of his steps by my side. And with all of the family Jesus saved by his love, we'll sing to his dawn at the end of our journey."



Fabric Kits for Lutheran World Relief

Dianne Milleson has used one of her \$250 Thrivent grants to purchase fabric and thread for fabric kits to be donated to Lutheran World Relief. With her \$250 grant money, Dianne was able to purchase fabric and thread for 8 sewing kits. Each kit consists of two pieces of coordinating fabric, 3 yards each and 2 large spools of coordinating thread. The Fabric Kits make it possible to train and support students and individuals, especially at-risk young women, and facilitate their access to employment.

FABRIC KITS

SOME IMPORTANT GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER


- · Fabric should have no stains or holes.
- Pieces do not need to match in size or color/pattern as long as they fit into one of the three size options.
- Each spool of thread should match one of the pieces of fabric included. Neutral thread is also a good option.
- · Please give new items only.
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name.
- Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.
- . Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.
- . Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags

HOW TO PACK YOUR PROJECT PROMISE KITS

- Wrap one piece of fabric and spools of thread inside the other piece of fabric, ensuring nothing will fall out.
 Secure with yarn, ribbon, string or rubber bands.
- Pack completed Kits, like items together, in boxes.
 Label contents in LARGE, BLOCK LETTERS on the outside of the boxes.
- Use strong cartons secured with packing tape, not to exceed 40 pounds.
- Include the name and address of your group or congregation on each box and label the contents.

INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING IN EACH FABRIC KIT

- TWO spools of neutral-colored, general purpose thread, 250-300 yards each
- TWO pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits of 100% polyester). Each piece should match one of the sizes below:
 - · 2 1/4 yards of 60" wide fabric
 - 3 yards of 44" wide fabric
 - · 4 yards of 36" wide fabric
