Light in the Beartooths

Acts 2:1-21

¹When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place. ²And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Dear Messiah,

This spring, I've been going through my books. If you happen to stop by the pastor's office, you'll see that I have a large bookshelf full of them. If you can believe it, the volumes on that shelf don't even scratch the surface of the library I've collected over the last few decades. This is what you get if you go to seminary - be warned!

Sitting on my kitchen counter, I have books on emotional intelligence, reflections on the Christian life for young people, different translations of the bible, books on organizational leadership and liturgical guides for worship. On a bookshelf identical to the one in my office that sits in my living room, I have books of poetry, novels, fiction, non-fiction for days (!), books on theology, ecology, hiking guides, cookbooks and US histories of race relations. There are more books a few feet away under my coffee table, and yet more (still in the living room) under a little lamp stand table next to the couch. None of this includes the boxes, shelves and closet of the parsonage "office", or the spare volumes in my bedside tables and a bedroom closet shelf.

If you go through any kind of higher education program, you take on a kind of static electricity that attracts books and makes them stick. Have I read every book in my collection? I would wager less than 15% of them. But I "might" read them someday! Thus the conundrum of seeking knowledge outside of school in late-capitalism: knowing and learning is promised in "these" pages.

I am embarrassed about my relatively sprawling library. But the truth is, learning through books is a part of who we are as Christians, and especially as Lutherans. Truly, we are "People of the Book!" The founder of our faith was a scholar, someone whose life was lived through the study and reading of one book in particular - the Bible! Is that not true for some of us as well? His knowledge and faith grew from his engagement with scripture and many of the books of his age, as have the knowledge and faith of those who have engaged his writings, including us! Books are one way, an important way, for us to find our way through the world we navigate together.

And so, perhaps the time has come for me to shed some of these books in the hopes that they can bless the minds and imaginations of others, including the communities I serve. I wonder if the new location of Messiah Lutheran on Lower Continental drive would benefit from a library - from a space dedicated to reading, discovery and contemplation of the word. I wonder if such a space would be an aspect of our welcome, in which people can find voices in and outside the church that help them find their home with us.

As we continue to live into this new place, asking questions about who God has made us and who God calls us to be are important. The stirring of spirit I have experienced in the books I've acquired over the years is a reminder of the blessings we share in the journey we take through life as people of God. I invite you to think about the books that have blessed you, and the blessing they might be to others.

Words from the Bishop: Wondering in the Spirit



In those days I will pour out my Spirit, God declares. Acts 2:17, 18

Pentecost Greetings to you in the name of the Holy Trinity as we welcome the coming of the Holy Spirit and celebrate the birth of Christ's Church this Sunday.

Last January, I wrote about liminal spaces. In her book *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going: Leading a Liminal Season, Susan Beaumont describes the times and spaces that the church lives in today as "liminal,"* as standing in the threshold of an open door to something new but we haven't gone through yet. In this space, part of us stands in the former things, part in the future things, and part in the right now and here, the confusing and messy "this."

This threshold is not an easy space/time for us to live in. In this threshold between already and not yet, we find both anxiety of an unknown future and the grief of losing a dying past that felt stable (whether it was stable is another question). In the threshold, we feel pushed by some to go too quickly into something we feel we're not ready for yet or we feel held back by those clinging too tightly to something that doesn't work anymore.

And in this threshold we find God. In fact, it's in the liminal spaces, the times we aren't in control, the times of not knowing and uncertainty that we actually find ourselves closer to God than any other time.

The pouring of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples that Pentecost morning was definitely a liminal experience for them. Their self-constructed walls of future agendas, plans and judgments were torn away and they were brought face-to-face with what God was revealing to those around them through their own voices speaking unfamiliar tongues.

The pouring of the Holy Spirit upon us is a liminal experience as well. In fact, as followers of Christ who have been filled with the Spirit in our baptisms, every day is a liminal experience of wondering in awe and fear about what God may be doing next in our lives and the lives of the Church. Contrary to what some thought, there is not going to be a post-pandemic stability. We're still standing on the threshold between former things and new possibilities, a time of both worry and wonder. And we may be standing there for a while.

It is in these times of liminality that the Holy Spirit can better break through our closed and frightened minds, hearts and wills. As our reliance on our own ways, goals and identities is peeled back layer by layer, we can begin to see more clearly God's presence with us and the new things that God has been, is and will be doing among us. We see through a glass dimly, for sure, but with open eyes, hearts and wills, we can see.

And not only does God appear more present to us during this time, but our Spirit-given faith (trust) tells us that "God is Able." This sermon title from Martin Luther King Jr. continues to resonate with me: that God is indeed able. I think we forget that at times and begin to believe it is all up to us. But God is able to bring abundance out of scarcity. God is able to bring hope out of despair. God is able to bring life out of death. God is able to do all this and more again and again.

It's in the liminal spaces that the Holy Spirit enters into our lives, sometimes with violent winds and tongues of fire, often with still small voices of witness to the new life in Christ every moment of every day. It's also in the liminal times that we need to cling to the promise that God is with us and is able to make change in us and through us whether we feel it or not.

As we celebrate Pentecost this week, I am offering my thanks to you for your ongoing work of equipping for the ministry of the Gospel in your liminal places across the Montana/N. Wyoming Synod. Thank you for the many resources, including the financial resources, you have shared with the synod, the ELCA and our ministries over the past year so that we can better equip you. Thank you for your time, energy, commitment and willingness to persist and be resilient in the many ways you have been called to serve Christ and his Church wherever you are located.


