

Dear Messiah,

Our first autumn in this new location is pretty much over. There has been a lot of activity for us these autumn months. Everybody's Birthday Party and Variety Show was a huge success enjoyed by everyone who attended. Sunday School has started with the growing number of children at Messiah. The Men's Breakfast is also back up and running with monthly gatherings as we get going (The next one will be Monday, Nov. 13th at 7:00 am in the church gathering space). The women's bible study continues as it has without fail through the pandemic, shifts in locations and buildings and more. And there is a growing community of quilters making good use of the quilting room, while the Meadowlark Children's Center next door is making good use of the Sunday School room and Nursery. This church is growing into itself in exciting ways. Moved by the Spirit, your presence and participation is making it happen.

As the liturgical year comes to a close this month (Sunday, Nov. 20th we'll celebrate the Reign of Christ) there are two more activity areas that I'd like to lift up here. First, we had a successful Bible Study on the subject of prayer during September and October. That study has now morphed into a study of prayer bringing in a few more resources for inquiry. The possibility of congregation members eventually leading the Prayers of the People during worship is something we're looking at together. How does that sound to you? A little scary? Something you might like to try?

The second is the tech booth. The technology in which we've invested helps us broadcast our services to remote streamers and control the sound in the sanctuary. It's being used to great effect. We have more questions aimed at growing our capabilities, but those who've been handling our sound and streaming, though few, have been doing great work. Doing this well is not easy and the learning curve is steep, but this is an important ministry of this church - making available our services to those who feel unwelcome but curious. That is important work. Whether they show up on Sunday or not, making the gospel accessible to a broader audience is key to who we are as Christians.

So, in service to those we don't yet know who might be joining us from home, I am going to be planning some Tech Booth Trainings held in the new year. Four to six "sessions" where the interested and uninitiated might learn one or two aspects of "how to". It is not nearly as difficult as you might think, especially in these "bite sized" trainings, and I hope you take me up on the opportunity to learn how the system works.

These are two simple invitations to deepen your relationship with the church - enrich your relationships at church and in the work of Christ in the world. Participating in such things may not seem important to you in a world such as this, at a time such as this. After all, wars are raging, storms are growing, confidence in the future is elusive - both overseas and closer to home. But it does matter. Perhaps in quieter, more mysterious ways, by showing up to this community in these and other ways, we are weaving a different world than the one we have in participation with the Spirit that gathers us.

There are a variety of answers to discover for yourself as to why participation at church matters. These are simply two avenues available to you as this church grows more and more into itself - avenues for you to explore and discover your own answers.

Words from the Bishop: Truth, Healing and Boarding Schools

This year the ELCA began the "Truth and Healing Movement," an opportunity for this church to increase our understanding of our colonizing impacts on Indigenous people in the past and present. As a church, we are committed to understanding our role in this tragic and sinful history so that we can journey towards healing together. <u>Please go to the website</u> to learn more about the opportunities and resources available to do work that will impact minds, hearts and lives across this church.

As part of this movement, the ELCA participated in the National Day of Remembrance of Indian Boarding Schools (September 30) by calling on us to wear orange to remember those who suffered because of such schools. (For resources about the federal Indian Boarding School policies and the ongoing trauma those policies have caused, please go to the "<u>Truth and Healing</u>" website.).

Some people are wondering why this past is being dredged up and exposed now rather than buried in the past. In part it is to help bring healing to the families and communities of Indigenous peoples whose children were stolen from them and placed in boarding schools, often in the name of God, in order to assimilate them into the American culture and turn them into "good Christians." For nearly 100 years, children were forcibly taken from their families, communities and nations, sins that have left behind horrible scars on Indigenous communities and had traumatic effects on the health, the well-being and family structures of our Indigenous neighbors even unto this time.

Imagine having your children taken away, not only out of their family but out of their culture, and "parented" by boarding school officials, often abused, neglected, starved, even killed. Now imagine this happening to all the families in your community or nation. Imagine most of your children just gone, some to never return, and others who have been changed forever, losing who they were – their language, their customs, their spiritual practices and community stories. Whole generations lost, only just now trying to recover what's left, including their missing but not forgotten children.

And so another reason we must expose the past to the light is that we must face the horrible truth of what we as a church participated in, whether through our actions or through tacit acceptance of what Christians were doing in the name of Jesus Christ. We must learn the truth of what actually happened in the past rather than continuing to cover it up, so that we will never do such a thing again and especially in God's name.

Such learning can take place through paying attention as the truth is explored and exposed rather than burying our heads. We can also learn through an honest education about our intertwined histories as Indigenous peoples and descendants of settlers. And we can act in various ways, including through the offerings of the Montana Synod Racial Justice Task Force and the ELCA's "Truth and Healing Movement."

We are also called by Jesus, the head of the whole Body of Christ past, present and future, to confess and repent for the actions of the church of the past. Even if we ourselves didn't participate in these actions, our ancestors did. And since they aren't here to confess and repent themselves, we as their descendants who have inherited the life and work of Christ's church are called by God to do so on their behalf. And since the injustice is still happening, we as church must also acknowledge, confess and repent for the actions we continue to do today that perpetuate the ongoing harm to our indigenous neighbors and their families.

Some may have noticed as they visited the synod office that we have orange banners hanging in the window and on the wall. Those have been hanging there as we continue to recognize, honor and remember the lives of the families and people who were harmed as a result of the boarding schools. Please consider how you might engage in a remembering practice for the sake of those who experienced such loss.

No, we cannot undo the past. But we can learn from the past, including our past sins and mistakes. And we can make amends on behalf of those who are not here to do it for themselves. We as followers of Christ can have the faith to confess our sins in the love and grace of God in Christ, receiving the Spirit's transforming forgiveness. But at the same time, through the command to love our neighbor and speak the truth in that love, we also hear God's ongoing call to enter into the light of the truth and care for and lift up our Indigenous neighbors who are suffering by helping them in the healing process as they request.

Shirley graduated with a teaching degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha in 1957 and received a master's degree from the UNO in 1968. In 1978 she married her love, John Overton, sharing an active and joyful life together. She energetically taught, planned, mentored staff development encouraging students and her fellow teachers and friends, sharing her experience and passion. She loved to entertain their good friends and worked as a good team with her husband John, assisting him with his catering business.

In 1997 she retired from teaching and in 1998 she and John moved to Red Lodge Montana for new adventures. They quickly became active in the community and developed many new and wonderful friendships. Shirley served on the school board, hospital board, and was an active member of Messiah Lutheran Church. She was involved in PEO and book club. Shirley and John dearly loved their friends and family from Nebraska to Red Lodge and beyond. The two of them enjoyed volunteering, dinner clubs, their church, community, Grizzley Peak and traditionally serving up warm hot chocolate on New Year's Day as the annual horse drawn sled came by. They liked to judge the Red Lodge 4th of July parade entries. In 2007, Shirley and John were selected as Red Lodge Citizens of the Year. It is a bit of an understatement to say that Shirley and John were avid fans of the University of Nebraska Cornhusker football team. They traveled back to Nebraska for the football season for many years, as well to many away games, sharing the excitement with family and good friends.

She is preceded in death by her husband John, parents, and brother Glenn. Shirley is survived by her sister Jan (Chuck) Matzke, sister-in-law Sharon Swanson, sister-in-law Nancy (Tom) Calvert, son Mark (Josi), stepchildren Jane, Sue (Tom), Linda (Dave), Dan (Beth), Amy (Eric), twelve grandchildren and numerous great grandchildren.
