Dear ADWSG Members,

I am so glad that my son and I joined this guild back in 2018. He was seven years old at the time, and loved anything related to yarn. Now he is 12 years old and a crazy drummer. He pretends he doesn't have time for crafting with me anymore, but he made the most beautiful Eye-of-God yarn-wrapped ornaments at Christmastime. He also was just sitting on my lap looking at our guild's Facebook page and loving all of the information and sheep memes. Now he got up so I can actually write. He decided to add "ADWSG" to my personal dictionary on the computer, whatever that means, and it tried to change Dear ADWSG Members to Dear DAWGS Members. Well, just one more newsletter for me to write as President, and I am entertaining myself anyway. I will miss this, and I know the Guild is going to be in the best of hands next year.

I would like to share an adorable bilingual children's book with you that is about sheep shearing, spinning and weaving. But of course it is about so much more. It is called "Little Gold Star," and is a Southwestern Cinderella tale written by my favorite author and storyteller Joe Hayes. You can watch him tell the story on YouTube. I will include a few pictures of this gorgeous book here, and bring it along to our next guild meeting. The father of Arcia, the Cinderella-figure in the story, gave a sheep to her and to her two stepsisters. Arcia tells her father, "Papa, I want you to shear my sheep for me. I'll spin the wool and weave it into a blanket to keep you warm when you go to the mountains."



When Arcia took the wool down to the river to wash it, "a big hawk came swooping down from the sky and snatched it away from her. Arcia calls out to the bird, 'Senor Hawk, please give my wool back to me." With such a polite request, as Arcia looks up to the sky at the hawk, a little gold star comes down and fastens itself to her forehead.



Back at home the evil step-mother says, "Take that piece of tin off your forehead!" In Spanish my students and I laugh so hard—it is funny: "Quitate esa hojalata de la frente." More or less it says the step-mother tried to scrape this piece of tin can off her forehead.

The step-sisters went off to shear their sheep and get their own little gold stars. They are mean to the hawk, however, and order him to wash their wool: "You evil bird! Bring my wool back to me." And this is what one of them ends up with on her forehead:

In the end, Arcia-Cinderella ends up with her prince, of course. But there are other themes too, like Listen to cats and Watch out for step-mothers. The most important theme though is to Be kind to animals and especially hawks, and you may get your wool washed and even "spun and woven into fine cloth."

51 Yarns to Spin Before You Cast Off by Jacey Boggs Faulkner. A fun, detailed list of spinning adventures every spinner should embark on. Includes vital information, tips, tricks and trivia. This is a small book that will be easy to pack if you are travelling this summer!

Color Exercises for the Weaver by Palmy Weigle. Through a series of carefully planned, simple exercises you will discover how each color works in combination with other colors.

Hand Dyeing Yarn and Fleece: Dip-Dyeing, Hand-Painting, Tie-Dyeing and Other Creative Techniques by Gail Callahan. Learn simple techniques to turn plain, outdated, or leftover yarn into vibrant "new" fibers using your oven, crockpot, frying pan and other standard kitchen equipment.

A Creative Guide to Knitted Lace by Jan Eaton. This book might be a helpful reference for those participating in the lace knitting workshop that Velvet will be giving.



Join Fiber Artists of Northern Arizona as we welcome Marilou Schultz, master Navajo weaver, to Flagstaff. Marilou will present a special two-hour program on her weaving journey as it evolved toward a revisit of historical wedge weave in the 21st century.



Resurgence of Wedgeweaves and Tech Inspired Weavings, by Marilou Schultz

Coming from a family of more than five generations of Navajo Weavers, I am inspired by the old Navajo weaving techniques and influenced by my surroundings and technology that I have created unique weavings. Through experimentation I have created three-dimensional wedgeweaves with a theme. I also have woven computer chip weavings and technology inspired weavings using QR codes which are interactive and other tech inspired rugs. With these creations I still use the traditional weaving techniques, tools, and upright loom that our ancestors used.

The fence is fashioned from strong black twine - the same kind that is used to make fishing nets - and Anne knitted it on specially adapted curtain rods. It took her about three weeks to knit enough lace to surround her front garden, using a 23 stitch repeat of a familiar Shetland lace pattern.
