Scoutmaster Minute:

It's amazing to look back 70 years and imagine what Troop 85 was like in the beginning. As many of you know, our original Troop was made up of, exclusively, WWII orphans - boys who probably felt quite afraid and alone until they discovered how transformative leadership, a robust camping program and camaraderie can be. The vision of the Williamsville United Methodist Church, to create a Boy Scout Troop for them, made a profound impact on their lives and the community as a whole. Troop 85 grew and evolved over the next few years and the membership expanded to include the entire community. Once The Methodist Home for Children sold their property, and become Gateway (a home for at risk youth) in the early 60's, the affiliation with the church came to an end and the secret history of our Troop laid buried for decades - like one of those time capsules.

As unique as our origin is, it pales in significance when we consider the *longevity* of Troop 85. Many other community Troops have folded over the years...struggling to hold together, losing membership or losing their way organizationally. But not Troop 85. We only seem to be getting stronger and stronger and have created a culture of leadership training, retention of membership, Eagle Scout numbers that far exceed the National average by 10-20 times and one of the most diverse and exciting outdoor programs in all of Western New York. And I've been around for more than half of it. Yet, it does not make me feel old. It instead makes me feel overwhelming pride. The percentage of my life that does not include Scouting pales compared to the portion that does. It's just ingrained into me.

I wanted to take an opportunity to say thank you to our entire Reunion Committee for making our 70th Anniversary such a memorable night. And thanks also for the kind words, letters and recognition bestowed upon me for my 40th consecutive year in the BSA. Many of you donated financially towards a gift which was very much appreciated. So thank you, all of you for making the day truly special. Yet, after all the memories shared, proclamations read, catered dinner consumed and memorabilia viewed, the highlight of the event, for me, was the addition of two more Eagle Scouts in the Troop. These are the moments that I cherish the most year after year. Seeing the transformative effect of attaining Scouting's highest honor. I look forward to seeing, hopefully, 12 more Eagle Scouts in the next couple years as the Troop currently has that many Life Scouts. And 5 years from now I look forward to our 75th Anniversary - which will be quite a major milestone for us.

Scouting has changed and evolved over the years and I think in very good ways. 70 years is only a beginning...a groundwork laid down by those before us and a torch we carry forward today. Let us never forget how we came to be and how we still are, in many ways, a family of Scouts.

A Word from The Treasurer

A Word from The Treasurer:

We typically start every scout year with the excitement of looking forward to the campouts, the advancement, and the general sense of enjoyment that scouting brings. This year we have another factor adding to the excitement: We are starting off the year with the strongest financial footing we have had in at least 4 years. Based on our existing budget, including our campout costs, and our forecasted income, the annual dues have been lowered to \$60 per scout for the 2016-2017 year.

Note: Dues payments need to be made to the Troop by 11/15/16.

While we earn a significant income from the fish frys and the pancake breakfasts, our single greatest income source is popcorn sales. Please make every effort to sell as much popcorn as possible. Approximately 1/3 of the popcorn sales revenue generated goes directly to our troop.

A few money-matter notes:

- * Please use our reimbursement request form whenever submitting a receipt for reimbursement These very short ½ page forms provide a record of our reimbursements.
- * Submit any reimbursement request from camping trips within 10 business of days of the date on the receipt.

- * ANY checks made out for ANY payment to Troop 85 such as for popcorn sales, dues, or campout attendance, should be made out to "BSA Troop 85".
- * If you receive a reimbursement check from the troop, please cash or deposit it promptly; ideally within the next 5 business days after receiving the check. This greatly helps in tracking our troop's cash flow.

Venture Patrol

Troop 85 Venture Patrol

The purpose of the venture patrol is to provide older scouts the opportunity of having a youth-lead scouting program with greater challenges than would be achievable within the troop or mixed aged patrols. This is done through "trips of a lifetime" that offer memorable destinations, challenging activities, and fun. Venture patrol is not a BSA program but a cross between a Venture Crew and Troop Patrol. Boy Scout awards are available to earn for activities but only Venture Crews can earn venture achievements.

The youth set the schedule and leadership for the events and trips. The advisor(s) acts to provide experience and safety contingencies. The venture patrol events are funded by the scouts participating in the activity and do not use troop funds. The group equipment is provided by the troop. This includes backpacking tents, light weight stoves, light weight cooking gear, water filters. When appropriate the troop also uses this equipment.

High adventure trips are planned each summer. Efforts are made not to interfere with summer camp, youth leadership training, or summer school which dictates our trip the third week of August most years. The trip is determined in the scout year prior to the trip. This one to two-year lead time gives youth leaders, participants, and chaperones enough time to plan, train, and save for most trips.

High adventure does not mean high expense or long distance travel. Philmont, Sea Base, and other BSA high adventure bases are great places to go and the troop will do its best to support those trips if scouts and scout families truly want to have those experiences. Families need to understand that the costs of such trip are typically \$2000-\$3000 per person or more. Unless the youth decide to do one of these trips, the plans will be more modest with costs of \$200-\$800.

Summer 2011-High Peaks near Lake Placid NY

We spent 5 days in the High Peak of the Adirondacks. 7 youth and 5 adults which included recent troop alumni. Rented 3 lean-tos at John's Brook Lodge. Climbed Mount Marcy and several other ADK high peaks. Trip cost was \$125 per person.

Summer 2012-Cranberry Lake 50

Backpacking 52 miles near Cranberry Lake on a loop trail. 4 youth 3 adults. Cost \$140 per person.

Summer 2013-Cycling the C&O Canal w/Washington DC tour

This trip was 5 days of cycling on the C&O canal from Cumberland MD to Washington DC. This trip included a venture only portion and a full troop portion. Venture patrol cycled 200 + miles to Washington DC meeting the troop and toured historic sites for 4 days. \$315 for full trip (9 days) and \$195 for DC only (4 days).

Summer 2014-Nantucket

Cycling on the island of Nantucket for 6 days. Activities include oceanography merit badge, conservation project, beach swimming, and museum visits. Staying on BSA camp Russell. Trip cost \$350 (approx.).

Summer 2015-Cranberry Lake 50 (again!)

Backpacking 52 miles around beautiful Cranberry Lake. 4 youth 3 adults (again!). Cost \$140 per person.

Fall 2016 – Bristol Mountain Ropes Course (day trip)

Winter 2016 – Sledding, Snowshoeing, and Eating at Chestnut Ridge State Park (day trip)

Summer 2015- Nantucket (again!)

Cycling on the island of Nantucket and possibly visiting mainland Cape Cod attractions. Activities include beach swimming, museum visits, and much more. Staying on BSA camp Russell. Trip cost \$350 (approx.).

Drivers

Scout campouts and outings would not be possible without the help of parents as drivers and chaperones. The troop appreciates the support you have all given in the past. Look at each of the campouts and choose a few that you would like to drive to, then tell Mr. Seidan. Most importantly, **please respond to the e-vites**, even if it is a maybe. It's the only way we know who is planning to attend an event and we need this information to plan for drivers.

Camping

All troop activities have been planned with a list included in this newsletter. Please use it to mark your calendar now. **Make scout outings your first choice this year!**

Before almost every campout, we gather at the Williamsville United Methodist Church parking lot. Departure times may vary a bit due to driving distance, so look for announcements before every trip. Monday after each campout, but **elected scouts is required to attend the Jr. Leader meeting** on those days.

Our camping fee this year will be approximately \$20 per scout per event. Chaperones don't pay for campouts.

Cancellation Policy for Trips:

You cannot change your RSVP after the Wednesday before a campout using the E-vite. Any and all cancellations in attendance must be texted directly to Steve at (716) 553-6370. Any cancellations received after 6:30 on Thursday shopping nights will still cost families \$10.00 per scout. We are shopping for your food and cancellations cost the Troop money in food we cannot return and have bought for each scout.

POPCORN (Fundraising)

Hello Troop 85!

Our 2016 popcorn selling season is off to a great start. Including the table sales and any donations we received, the troop has collected almost \$5,000 as of the mid-sale check-in. Thank you to Mr. Posses and Mr. Kerr for their assistance in the sale this year.

Mr. Posses was able to coordinate the table sale events through the month of September, giving the scouts in the Troop the opportunity to participate in show and sell events at Ed Youngs in the village of Williamsville. We had over 20 scouts participate in the events across 5 weekends of sales. Everyone did a great job welcoming potential customers and thanked them for their sales as well as their monetary contributions to our troop. It was a terrific display of Scout professionalism.

Thanks to everyone's efforts, we were able to double our sales over last year's event. This is an extremely important statistic considering that this is our largest fundraiser which helps to support our activities all year! Keep up the good work Scouts and let's all continue to work diligently toward achieving our Troop's goal of \$11,400 this year. As of the mid-sale check-in, we are 37% of the way there!

If time permits, the end of sale prize raffle will be held at our Troop meeting on 10/24/16. As for the midsale prize raffle all the show and sell as well as table sales have been tallied and the raffle tickets have been assigned according to the sales. We had a scouts who had as many as 16 tickets / \$813 in sales in the raffle. The winner had 9 tickets / \$478 in sales in the raffle ... AND THE WINNER IS John Kerr! Congratulations John!

Don't forget the sale continues till 10/24/16. Please make arrangements to make payments, submit take orders, return any unsold inventory, and make your council prize selection by that date.

Troop Communication

E-MAIL – after each Jr. Leader meeting, the Troop Scribe will send an e-mail to everyone letting us know about upcoming events and meetings. Please check your e-mail often during the scouting year so you are up to date on Troop 85 news.

E-VITE – Before each camp out, Steve will post an e-vite to each scout family. Information about the trip will be provided along with a map and a response section. **Please respond to the e-vites, even if it's a maybe**. It's the only way we know who is planning to attend an event. We need this information to plan for drivers and food for our camping trips.

WEB SITE – Please put www.bsatroop85.com on your "favorites" list and check it periodically, especially as events draw near. Our Webmaster also posts pictures from troop outings, so you can see what the scouts have been up to. Every scout is encouraged to take pictures for the troop.

Uniforms

Uniforms are required at all scout meetings and some special events (e.g. summer camp, Court of Honor). Troop 85's uniform is the BSA-approved Field Uniform with all patches sewn on, troop neckerchief and Boy Scout slide. If you are purchasing a shirt, make sure it's the new style. We have never required official pants; the boys may wear either khakis or jeans for the meetings. A troop appears uniform when all its members look the same. Please wear your scout shirt and neckerchief to every meeting so your patrol looks the best!

Our troop also has an Activity Uniform; this is a navy blue T-shirt with an emblem of an eagle with an "85". This shirt is worn at some campouts, outings and at summer camp. All scouts should have an Activity Uniform. T-shirts are currently in stock and may be purchased for \$15 each – see any adult or Jr. Leader.

Dues and Registration

Troop dues and registration are collected at the beginning of the scout year usually in September and will be expected by **November 2nd**. Our dues and registration **fee will be \$60** per scout. Dues help pay for camping fees, wood for campfires, troop equipment and supplies.
