





# Therapy Dogs Visit Residents Weekly

When Assistant Superintendent Millikin started in her role, she was interested in learning more about animal therapy. She was fortunate enough to grow up around animals and knew, from her own experiences how people can find solace when simply being in the presence of animals. Also, in her time at the detention center, she had witnessed the youth having conversations where they could not stand by while an animal was being abused. This prompted her to start researching therapy dogs. While visiting another facility, she saw dogs with red vest being escorted by their owners. Naturally, she enquired about the little red vested pups and learned they work through a nonprofit organization, Therapy Dogs International. People volunteer their time to have their furry companions become therapy dogs. In August of 2017, the MCJDC had their first therapy dog visit. "It was priceless to see our youth's faces light up when they watched Groot walk through the door. You could see them transform into kids instead of the hard exterior they have created for themselves." Now, the MCJDC has two

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


