Our kids learned about the appropriate skills to utilize when trying to put their best foot forward in hopes of becoming employed. Handouts with tips, resources, and employment advice were placed in every youth's personal bag to take home with them when they leave so they can have all of the above information on hand! Former U.S. Army Soldier Kurtis Tolley presented!

On October 22nd, Kurtis Tolley joined us to share his story with our youth. He was an infantry soldier in the U.S. Army who worked funeral duties at Arlington National Cemetery. Throughout his years of service at that sacred and historical site he had the honor of carrying past Arizona Senator John McCain and the 41st president of the United States, George H. W. Bush to their burials. Kurtis spoke about his experience being involved with 600 to 800 funerals of heroes and the mental strength it required to accomplish that mission. He commented how especially difficult it was for him to present an American flag to a six-year old boy during one ceremony, the next of kin of a fallen soldier. We are grateful for his service and for the time and energy he offered so our kids could learn from him, his fascinating experience serving at this national treasure which still sees 25 - 30 funerals held each week.



Twon Billings

We had a special guest and friend come in recently and talk with our kids about their futures. Twon has been here in the past and he always connects well with our youth. We won't go into detail here but just know that Twon moved from Los Angeles to Cleveland back in the 80s for the sole purpose of starting a Crips gang here. And he did. At one point he had more than 500 members on the streets of Cleveland. Twon also ended up being sentenced to 25 years in prison on some very serious charges but was released after 13 years because of the person he established himself to be while incarcerated. After re-



entering the Cleveland community Twon got his life turned around and for decades now he has been a role-model for countless others. He even trains law enforcement agencies!

Twon created a character-building curriculum for men many years ago that has been used in our state prison system, and he is interested in designing something similar for us to use here. We are exploring that possibility. Mr. Billings always tells "it" straight to our kids, making sure they know he is no nonsense when it comes to many of the poor decisions they make. He encouraged our kids to make better decisions so that they, too, can get their lives on track and lead very happy and fulfilling lives. We are happy he cares enough about them to visit when he is able.




