Lest We Forget

The commemorative wreath to mark the 100th Anniversay of the 1918 Armistice was dedicated on Remembrance Sunday to the 66 men of this Parish that died in WWI. It was designed and made by a local craftsman to compliment the marble statue of the Angel of Peace on the War Memorial and consists of 66 poppies, one for each man. Constructed of powder coated steel it should last for many years. It was funded by a grant from Kings Lynn and West Norfolk Borough Council and donations from the community.

Frank was our principle contact with the Police and instrumental in setting up the Homewatch, now Neighbourhoodwatch, scheme as

well as Speedwatch, for which he won an award. He also operated, single handed, the original SAM

camera that the Parish shared with Emneth and Nordelph. All along he has represented the interests of the people of Lakesend, where he used to live, and Three Holes, where at one time he was the Chairman of the Village Hall Committee. Always one to speak his mind, Frank has worked hard for the Community and his significant achievements will be remembered.

It might seem inappropriately hasty to advertise for a new Member to replace him, but with the election coming up next May it was considered to be for the best for a new Councillor to gain a few months experience in advance. A good response has been received.

A couple of NCC Highways points for your attention. First, you will read an article, elsewhere in this magazine, from Glen Gates, Watch Manager at Outwell Fire Station, about the dangers presented by parking on the yellow zigzags outside the school. It has taken a long time but at last this will be made a mandatory 'no parking' area, thanks to a change in Government Policy that has radically reduced the cost - and to County Councillor Harry Humphrey who has offered to pay for the relevant signs out of his own NCC Members Budget. Disabled and taxi parking will still be permitted but would everyone else please start right away and get used to finding somewhere else to park, if you really have no choice but to use your car.

Next, problems with the roads are often reported to the Parish Council, which are always passed on, but these can easily be

reported directly on the County Council website. There is a link on the homepage to report a highways problem, it is simple to use and by doing so you may receive a quicker response and be personally informed on progress.

Thirdly, Council were recently asked about a pedestrian crossing for the A1101 Town Street. Andy Wallace, NNC Highways Engineer for the area, advised that this would cost the Parish about £5000 to undertake a viability study and if that demonstrated a need a crossing itself would cost anything from £20,000 to £200,000. I am mentioning this because the subject of traffic calming often comes up and this startling figure is an illustration of what is actually involved.

Other matters: thanks to all who attended the Neighbourhood Planning consultation in September. Progress is being made and the Plan will shortly be put forward for pre-submission scrutiny.

Lastly thanks to all who attended at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday and the service that followed in the Methodist Church. Particular thanks to the Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, their Leaders and families for the outstanding contribution they made to the ceremony, to the British Legion for the loan of their 'Tommy' silhouette, to those members of the Community who contributed to the cost of the Centennial wreath that now stands in the Memorial Garden, to Andy Nicholson for offering the shop window for the poppy collection display and to Sally Fawkes and her helpers who made the collection and to all of you who made a donation to the British Legion Poppy Appeal.

develop friendships and engage in their local



According to 'A Neighbourly Nation' report more than half of UK homeowners surveyed know most of their neighbours by name and a quarter of homeowners would trust their neighbours with a key to their home. Although 98% of people think they're good neighbours with almost a third saying they get on better with neighbours

now than they did five years ago, two in five Brits have had a disagreement with their neighbours.

David Huse, OBE, Chair of the Neighbourhood Watch Network, said: "Being a good neighbour has huge benefits and makes your community friendlier and safer too. By looking out for your neighbours, watching out for those who are elderly or vulnerable and sharing crime prevention advice you can help keep you and your neighbours safe and your homes secure."

What makes a good neighbour in modern Britain? The report also shows that homeowners and renters approach neighbourly disputes differently, with homeowners admitting to complaining to their neighbour twice as much as renters. More than a quarter of UK homeowners and renters admit they have had a party and played loud music after 11pm, acknowledging that common causes of neighbourly disputes also include noise, parking, music and barking dogs. Over one in ten renters think they're a bad neighbour because they play loud music, compared to just 3% of homeowners.

Being Neighbourly – • 63% have taken in parcels • 54% have dropped off deliveries • 51% say they are quiet and courteous

• 49% keep an eye on the property • 38% think they are not nosey; the same amount are courteous where they park their car • 31% of UK homeowners and renters would go outside to check all was okay if they hear an alarm.

While communities are looking out for each other by doing the day-to-day things, the report suggests more can be done to strengthen meaningful relationships that form the foundations of a close-knit community. Only one in seven people have invited their neighbours over to their home and almost a quarter think they're a good neighbour because they keep themselves to themselves.

Neighbours or good friends? A third of people want to be friendlier with their neighbours with just one in 10 believing they have a worse relationship with their neighbours than they did five years ago. Overall, 15% of UK homeowners and renters don't know if they'd recognise their neighbours in a line-up!.

Traits of a good neighbour: - Good neighbours look out for each other, for example keeping an eye on the house - Good neighbours are sociable and friendly - happy for a chat or a party invitation - They're practically helpful - from taking in parcels to offering help with the plumbing - They're kind, caring and respectful - more specifically thinking about the impact they have on neighbours What can we do to be a better neighbour? Increasingly we all lead busier lives, and while often we think we are being good neighbours, how well do we really know our neighbours? For those who want to, taking a little extra time to build meaningful relationships with those around us, can help strengthen our communities and make them safer places to live.

Middle Level Commissioners Proposed Phased Maintenance Dredging 2019 Phase V — Marmont Priory Corner to Thurlands Drove Junction, Upwell Hall Bridge Road Junction to New Bridge, Upwell Isle Bridge Outwell to Outwell Boat Basin

I write to inform you of the Commissioners' intention to undertake the fifth phase of channel maintenance dredging works to remove siltation and sediment from the Well Creek. It is currently proposed to undertake the works during January/February 2019.

The exact timing will be dependent upon Norfolk County Highways' acceptance of the necessary road traffic management plan and weather/river conditions during that time.

Should the Well Creek freeze over, a contingency for dredging operations to be curtailed for up to one week to allow for 'fen skating' will be in place.

The resultant dredgings will be transported away from site to Salter's Lode, where they will be stored and left to dry sufficiently to be re-handled and reused elsewhere in the Commissioners' river system as bank raising material.

The proposed works will not necessitate a navigation closure of Well Creek, nor is it envisaged residential or business access will be affected by the proposed works. Please be assured we will endeavour to work as efficiently and effectively as conditions allow

In order to keep adjacent residents and business owners fully informed, hand delivered notices will be posted prior to the works commencing.

Please contact me at the Commissioners' offices in March if you have any other queries, or if there is any other assistance or information I can offer to the Parish Council regarding the proposed dredging works.

Upwell Health Centre Newsletter

There have been many changes at the Health Centre during 2018, the most significant of which was the retirement of Dr Williams in May after 30 years serving the patients of Upwell, Outwell and the surrounding villages. Paul was one of a group of GPs who worked long and hard to modernise the Practice and improve the services we provide. He also was responsible for making Upwell Health Centre a training practice and was so successful that four of the doctors currently working at the surgery first joined us as trainees. In August of this year we were able to join Paul and Amanda on a delightful river cruise to wish them a long, healthy and happy retirement, and I'm sure our patients would want to support us in thanking them for everything they have done for the local community.

We have also welcomed some new staff at the surgery; Debbie Craven is our new Clinical Pharmacist who will be helping the doctors to review patients on long term medications. Meanwhile Mel Marsh has taken over from Sabir as our regular Pharmacist. Our new Nurse Practitioner Penny Burrows has joined our clinical team and many of you will have met her already, and then we have our Paramedic Jake Fretwell who is helping us with triage, seeing patients, and doing home visits. I know that the subject of triage has caused concern for some patients so I will try to explain why we have started using it at Upwell. We are all aware that the NHS is coming under continuing pressure with more patients needing our help, and much tighter control on the resources we need to meet the needs of the people we look after. There is a recruitment crisis in the NHS and many of you will know that we were unable to find a suitable candidate to replace Dr Williams. At Upwell Health Centre we have responded to these challenges by introducing a triage system. This is all about making sure that you see the right person, at the right time, and in the right place to deal with your medical problem. In practice this means that the office staff will ask you for some brief clinical details about the nature of your problem before putting you on the call-back list. After that the clinical staff will either book you straight into a surgery appointment or phone you back to discuss your problem in more detail before making a decision about who you should see, and when and where. In some cases this may include directing you to other NHS services such as the Minor Injuries Unit in Wisbech or the Accident and Emergency department at King's Lynn.

Some patients have raised concerns about giving their clinical details to our office staff but, I can assure you that all of our staff are trained in the importance of confidentiality and are well aware that none of the information you give should be

discussed or shared with anyone other than the clinical staff. If you do not want to give details of your problem to the office staff you will still be put on the call-back list but it will make it harder for the clinicians to prioritise your call.

The triage system is something we are still refining to make sure it provides the best possible service for all patients. If you have concerns or ideas about this then please write to me at the surgery.

Work on our new purpose built pharmacy is moving fast and we are looking forward to opening this in February. This will allow us to provide a faster, safer and much improved service for all patients and we hope you will take advantage of all the improved services this new building will allow us to provide, And finally a few words about physical inactivity which is increasingly being recognised as a contributing factor for many medical conditions. Here at Upwell Health Centre we are looking at ways of being more active. Several members of our staff have signed up to run the Cambridge Half Marathon in March, and our lead Nurse Practitioner, Lynette Reeves, and Practice Manager, Steve Reeves, are both running the London Marathon in April.

Those are considerable challenges but there are easier ways of becoming fitter. One of these is to take part in a Parkrun which is a free to enter, friendly and non-competitive 3 mile run that takes place every Saturday morning at hundreds of parks up and down the country. We are thinking about taking a group of staff and patients to a King's Lynn Parkrun in the New Year and if you would be interested in joining us then please register your interest by emailing enquiries.upwellhc@nhs.net.

Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service News



This month i need to start with a very serious topic that I have been trying to address with the help of head teachers at local schools for some time. This subject is inconsiderate parking and stopping of vehicles during school times by an increasing minority, which is becoming extremely dangerous for

all concerned. It is an ongoing problem that has been getting worse, where some drivers park in not only inconsiderate places, but also places that are both illegal and unsafe to other motorists and pedestrians, especially small children who may not be seen by other motorists whilst trying to cross the roads.

Another aspect that these drivers seem unconcerned about is that there is a fire station locally that most of the time relies on these very roads to respond to possible life risk emergencies. What this means is that while your local Fire Service is being held up by these drivers, it is not able to reach those emergencies as soon as it should and more importantly, when needed. This could cost lives, which is something no one wants to have on their conscience.

Whilst we are unable to get through this road those who choose to cause obstructions are in fact breaking the law. For example 'The Emergency Workers Obstruction Act 2006' means it is unlawful for a person(s) to perform an action which results in obstructing or hindering emergency workers from their duties. Even though not a well-known act, it does get enforced nationwide, although hopefully it will not have to be locally. Both Church Drove, Outwell & School Rd, Upwell have various road markings that mean stopping and parking is prohibited in certain places, yet every week day the same drivers choose to park on these zig zags, other markings and unsuitable places. I have today been invited and taken part in an assembly with Beaupre school teachers to help them get the message across to the pupils, and hopefully in turn their family members, as to just how dangerous this situation is becoming. Historically such situations only change when someone has been injured or worse. Please help us and the schools preventing this from happening. I hope to be able to plan a similar visit to Upwell academy in the coming weeks.

As a guide to help those unsure as to where they should or should not park please see below.

Roadside Parking - The Law - Rule 243

DO NOT STOP OR PARK:

- Near to a school entrance.
- Anywhere you would prevent access for emergency services.
- Opposite or within 10m (32ft) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space.
- Opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle.
- In front of an entrance to a property on a bend.

The list is a great deal longer, but these are the main ones that relate to areas down both School Rd & Church Drove which are ignored on a daily basis by many drivers.

On another topic, this last month you may have seen us responding to several incidents locally & some further afield. We have seen an unusually busy end of October & start of November with varying incidents from out of control bonfires and building fires, including a house fire caused by careless use of fireworks. We have also attended several extremely serious RTC's. Hopefully this will not continue in the coming weeks.

As winter is approaching quickly, can I please urge everyone to prepare. Prepare your journeys and allow more time and ensure your cars are all checked and ready for the changes in temperatures & conditions. Also if you have any form of open fire, please prepare for winter by having your chimneys swept by a reputable person.

Please stay safe and help us to help you all stay safe.


