these delightful outdoor spaces.


People lingered and chatted as they enjoyed teas and ice-creams, thoughtfully provided by the gardeners and their partners; plants




On behalf of the Gardeners, I would like to thank Sylvie for the magnificent job she

Tickets are £5 and can be paid on the door, entry includes refreshments.

After a gap of a few years we are delighted to welcome back the **Raptor Foundation** to the Upwell Hall during the half term break in October on the 23rd. Entry will be £2.50 per person but a family ticket of £10 for two adults and three children. Tickets will be available through Facebook on the Upwell Hall page and from the usual sources. Last time they came lots of children had a great time having close encounters with birds of prey, some of which actually flew inside the hall.

'What's on' is a calendar full of events, clubs, community meetings and worship services that are going on in the village daily, weekly or monthly. The calendar is interactive-click on the events to find the duration and location. If you have an event which you would like to be added to the calendar, please feel free to fill out the form at the bottom of the webpage.

'Get involved' is a new page and it's a chance for volunteer positions to be advertise for the areas most in need within the community. If you think you have some time to give back to the community then please head over to this page and see the opportunities available. There is also a generic form you can submit, using the link on the page, where you can express your general interest for volunteering if nothing calls out to you.

The 'directory' is a list of local companies, clubs, organisations and tradesmen. I hope this will make it easier for people to connect when looking for a club to join or searching for a local tradesman. NB: While the Parish Council welcome local tradesmen to publish their contact information on the website it should be emphasised that it does not operate a 'Trusted Tradesman' Scheme and cannot be held responsible for the standard of their work.

One of the new functions is designed to make reporting easier. The **'report a problem'** page is to assist the community

when reporting a problem in an effective, hassle-free way. If you think your problem is best addressed to the Borough Council, County Council or the police there are also links on this page which go straight to their respective 'report a problem' page. All other matters can be reported through the form on the website and this will be forwarded to the best person suited to address your issue in the Parish Council.

The 'news' page is designed to bridge the gap between the quarterly community magazines. These blog posts are a way to communicate information, good news and not so good news within the parish. If you would like to propose a story for the newsfeed or write for the newsfeed, please use the contact form on the website.

The minutes, agenda and accounts for the parish council can be found under documents. There are also digital copies of the community magazine to download. If you would prefer to receive the community magazine via email, please submit your email at the bottom of any page on the website.

Street Lights



Unfortunately the cost of new lights remains prohibitive, with underground electricity supply being required, & new lights can no longer be attached to existing electricity poles.



There is a small charge of £3pp but this can be offset against club membership.

THE FARMING YEAR 2018-19

Hi everybody,

We are getting through another year – where does time go? Looking back to last year, the hot and dry weather affected many crops but things did not turn out too badly by the end of the season.

The autumn was also fairly good, weather wise, and drilling of winter cereals seemed to have gone well. Later, the winter wheat looked good but a fair amount of oilseed rape suffered and I believe some farmers ploughed it in due to stem beetle destroying it, as the chemical used to control the beetle has been banned.

The winter weather was fairly dry and we did not have much in the way of frosts. February turned out to be a fairly good month for the weather, and by the end of the month farmers were starting to plant early potatoes and drill spring cereals and some onions; but then in March we had some strong winds and rain which held things up for a while. Have you noticed the Met Office gives these storms names now when they never used to? Well, not in this country anyway.

As the spring and summer progressed and crops started to grow, we had a number of heavy spells of rain. In Lincolnshire they had over 6 inches of rain, which swamped some of the fields of potatoes and also of cauliflowers, spoiling a fair amount.

Then there was a spell of very hot weather in the weeks that followed and records were broken due to the high

temperatures. I believe Cambridge recorded one of the highest.

As you went about the area crops looked good, i.e. cereals, potatoes and sugar beet and the fields of onions looked much better than last year. Early potatoes grew and cropped well. Also strawberries did well. I had some of the largest strawberries that I have had for some time. This year, the cherry trees in my garden had the most cherries that I have ever seen, but apple trees seem a bit hit or miss, some have a good show but others have hardly any fruit at all.

Harvest has started and appears to be going alright. But at the time of writing the weather has become a bit unsettled so it has stopped for the moment, but it talks of coming better over the next few days.

Thinking back, I remember how much I enjoyed farming and how many small farms there were around this area, but apart from the odd one they all seem to have gone now and everything is in big hands. I suppose that is progress.

I was watching BBC Countryfile a little while ago when a lady came on and started talking about global warming. She said farmers should stop keeping cattle and sheep, because when they pass wind the gas they produce is helping to damage the ozone layer and contributing to global warming — but she did not say where, if this comes about, the milk would come from to put in your tea and coffee - and what about your Sunday joint? Some people do come up with funny ideas.

That's all for now folks, all the best for the future.

The Wisbech to Upwell Tram Project.

This Project is to celebrate the memory of the Wisbech Upwell Tramway. The Wisbech to Outwell Tramway opened as an experiment in 1883 and was extended to Upwell in 1884. At its peak, six trams a day in each direction provided passenger and, most importantly, freight services for local produce to Wisbech and then via the main railway link to larger towns and cities. Competition from the Outwell Omnibus Company started by Charles Robb in 1920 eventually ended passenger services in 1927. Freight continued until 1966 when it was cut as part of the "Beeching Axe". The final tram journey took place May 20, 1966.

Remembering the Tramway is of importance for all living in the area but also for those much further afield - for rail aficionados and enthusiasts, for local history lovers and tourists and also for millions of fans of Thomas the Tank Engine the creation of the Reverend Wilbert Awdry who was vicar of the nearby village of Emneth (1953 -1965). Toby the Tram Engine and his coach, Henrietta and later, Mavis, the Drury diesel tram were based on rolling stock used on the Tramway. Very little evidence of the former Tramway remains today which highlighted the necessity for the Wisbech to Upwell tram projects

The idea for the Wisbech to Upwell Tram Project came from a conversation, back in the early 1980s between William (Bill) Smith and Andrew Ingram (who had at that time written The Wisbech & Upwell Tramway Centenary Album -1983 and many other branch line books). Andrew remarked that, "The people of Outwell and Upwell should have kept some reminders of the tramway. It would have elevated those two villages as there is a vast interest in the old railways". Following that exchange, Bill decided to produce a tram memento for Outwell, the village in which he lives.

Bill first embarked upon producing a tram memento for the former tram yard site at Outwell and was given an old Norfolk County Council, spherical road sign marked "Outwell" that had been buried at Bexwell Airfield in 1940 during the Second World War. It would eventually form the centre-piece of the Outwell Memento. Then, aided by his friends John Button and Tony Judd, he started to source discarded tram-related relics and other authentic railway materials. They spoke to staff at Bressingham Steam Museum who directed them to a railway "graveyard" at Hardingham in Norfolk. Bill was offered two full-size Victorian tram wheels fixed to an axle (these gave birth to the Upwell memento idea) and then also four rail chairs, four hardwood blocks and two authentic sleepers with sixteen period fixtures - many of the parts needed to make an installation for Upwell. These very early tram wheels and axle were designed to run on "bull-head rail" the same type used for the Wisbech to Upwell tramway. Help was also promised by Nene Valley railway enthusiasts - who offered other materials - and more volunteers lined up for restoration work. To beat the expiry date of the original planning permission and with huge thanks to an anonymous, five hundred pounds donation, planning started for the building and installation of the Upwell Tram Memorial to go ahead before the middle of August 2019. The securing of a grant of £250 from the BCKLWN's Small Grant Scheme and an offer from local company, SDM Fabrication of March, to provide its services free-of-charge to build and transport the memorial ready for public display helped get the installation finished on time. The event took place on Saturday 27th July and Bill Smith awarded the unveiling honour to ninety-year old Mary Williamson whose husband Bill was manager (until 1974) of Coote & Warren Ltd coal merchants who had a branch at the Upwell tram depot. Despite a downpour a good crowd turned out to witness the event and then attended the display of tram photographs and other memorabilia coordinated by Bill, assisted by Upwell WI and St Peter's Church members.



The whole day was again filmed by Welle Film Productions – look out for more details once editing has been completed.



The Outwell Memento was unveiled July 2016 by two of Outwell's oldest residents, Norman Wenn and Iris Risebrow - pictured below with Bill Smith. A vast selection of historical photographs, from Bill's collection was also put on display in



St Clement's Church. The photographs were collected by Bill over the past 40 odd years and resulted in him producing six local history books including the award winning "Discovering Upwell" book

BLUNT TRUST UPDATE

Things have moved on since my last update. We now have the much anticipated bank account and have applied to the charity commission for registration. We also had our launch meeting in July; I was disappointed by the relatively low numbers of people who attended the launch meeting, it's not often we have organisations with money to give away and I expected more interest.

At this stage we have identified three main areas we are planning to spend money on. The nature walk, educational grants and local projects. We have developed application forms and guidance notes for applicants. In time we will have a website people can access to get the details but for now you'll need to contact one of the trustees to get them. Remember you have to be a resident of the village of Upwell to qualify for a grant and any projects you apply for support for has to be based in Upwell.

At the moment our main focus is on the nature walk which we are working on to get ready for a formal opening. A lot

of work still needs to be done in the site and again I'd like to ask for any volunteers to help with the work to let us know. I'd like to thank the people who have already supported our work there.

The educational grants are aimed at people planning to go to university or take other post school qualifications. They may be for equipment you'll need, to help pay for you to visit universities during your selection period or to support you during your time at university.

The trustees have decided it was Edith Blunt's intention that the trust be long lasting, therefore we will need to put a sizeable part of the money aside to produce an income for the trust. However, we also feel it is important that the trust makes its mark in the village in the next year or two so we are hoping some significant projects apply for support in the village in the coming year.

Each child and member of staff contributes to the display and it is lovely to see the range of creativity from the different year groups. This year our theme is bees and they look amazing. Well done to Mrs Preston for coordinating this amazing display.

I was really hoping to be able to inform you that the pre-school is up and running but they are still waiting for their OFSTED registration. In the meantime, they will be running some 'Play and Stay' sessions so parents and children can get to know the staff and each other.

The sensory garden is still a project very much in its infancy, but I am determined it will happen and hopefully not in the too distant future.

I will continue to work hard to promote safe parking and turning in front of and near the school grounds. Parking notices have been installed and the zig zags are now a no parking area and FOSA have purchased some wonderful banners to act as reminders. As always, my main priority is to ensure the safety of the children and I am sure with

If there is a problem with these unwelcome visitors in any part of the Parish a 'No Cold Calling Zone' can be established by Norfolk County Council Trading Standards.

A no cold calling zone is a designated area where the residents declare they will no longer accept traders calling at their homes without an appointment.

No cold calling zones are a deterrent to unscrupulous traders and bogus callers, who do not want to be recognised or 'logged' as working within an area.

Trading Standards support the collective wishes of the residents, so the majority of the people living in the area must want the zone to be created. No cold calling zones are suitable for areas where:

There is evidence of a history of doorstep rogue trading/bogus calling

- •The area has a strong community bond/spirit and desire for the zone
- •The age and/or vulnerability of the residents causes them to be at greater risk through cold calling
- •The area is considered to be attractive to doorstep rogue traders
- •The area is distinct and can be clearly identifiable as a zone

Keeping Your Garden Safe

Your garden shed or garage often contains valuable items or the tools that can help a burglar break into your home.

Make sure your garden is as secure as it can be with substantial fencing, walls or gates and lock them with a good quality padlock. Look for a Secured by Design or Sold Secure standard.

Consider prickly planting near windows or around your fence. But make sure hedges don't give burglars a place to hide.

Make sure your rubbish bins or ladders can't be climbed onto to access upstairs windows that might be left open to air the home. Some people swear by noisy gravel so it's easier to hear people walking about.

Use permanent marking to postcode your valuables stored in sheds and garages, engrave them or use a property marking kit. Use your postcode or your driver's licence number.



Consider buying a stand-alone shed or garage alarm or link your garage to your home alarm system.

Like a lot of you and the staff here at NHS West Norfolk Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), I have just returned from my summer holidays and must admit this year it has been very busy during what is normally a "quiet" season. The reason for all this activity is the ongoing reorganisation of the Norfolk and Waveney CCGs.

As you may know from my previous articles there are five CCGs in Norfolk and Waveney and about a year ago they decided to form a single management team under one Accountable Officer. The appointment of that officer, Melanie Craig, and the new Chief Finance Officer, John Ingham, was completed at the end of April and was followed quickly with the creation of a new senior management team. This saw the creation of a new post here in West Norfolk of Locality Director. Jeanette Hucey has been appointed to this post initially on a six month contract with a view to a formal recruitment process this autumn. I would like to formally welcome Jeanette to King's Lynn and wish her well in the post. The final phase of the reorganisation is to review and restructure the remaining staff across Norfolk and Waveney CCGs to support the new senior management team. That process is under way and should be complete by December.

The CCGs in Norfolk and Waveney are also currently exploring whether to merge into one larger CCG and are inviting people to have their say on this proposal. What does the proposed merger mean for West Norfolk? The main driver for those of us involved at the inception of West Norfolk CCG was to have a locally-focused organisation that would look after the interests of our residents and ensure the best scrutiny and support was

put in place for all health services in the area. I believe West Norfolk CCG has delivered that local focus and that we have ensured that services here are at least as good if not better than the rest of Norfolk. However, the cost of maintaining five CCGs is high; five CCGs all doing the same thing five times when it could be done once is inefficient. We can be better at improving things like our mental health services if we speak with one strong co-ordinated voice. Therefore, the move to merge will mean more money is available for clinical services that you desperately need while the commissioning voice will be louder and more insistent in our providers ear.

What we are determined about is that the local voice will not be lost in this move. Over the last year we have set up Local Delivery Groups in each of the CCG areas. Here in West Norfolk I have been chairing this group which is made up of all the providers and commissioners of health care in the area (including GPs, community nursing and mental health), The Queen Elizabeth Hospital, as well as the borough and county councils, social services, voluntary agencies, pharmacies, public health and children's services. The purpose of this group is to help support and empower the new Primary Care Networks which are taking shape across Norfolk and Waveney and will see groups of GP practices working closely together with other community, mental health and social care staff to improve services for local people. This West Norfolk Local Delivery Group will ensure there remains a strong local focus on health care provision in the West.

The final decision on the proposed merger will happen soon and we need your feedback as soon as possible.
