EVENTS THAT TOOK PLACE IN MAY

3 May 1469

Italian philosopher Niccolo Machiavelli, whose writings have influenced modern political leaders, was born. A native of Florence. Machiavelli served as the Florentine Republic's defense secretary, where he abolished the existing mercenary system in favor of a citizen militia. He also rubbed shoulders with popes, kings, and emperors. As often happened in the political environment of the day, he was accused of conspiracy by powerful enemies, imprisoned, and tortured. In an attempt to regain his power and win back the trust of the Medici family, whose favor he had lost, Machiavelli wrote The Prince. his most famous work. This small book outlined Machiavelli's idea of a perfect leader and expressed the conclusion that it is better to be feared than loved. The manuscript failed to sway the Medici family. It also alienated Machiavelli from the people of Florence, although the plays he wrote were popular during his lifetime.

10 May 1872

On May 10, 1872, though she herself couldn't cast a vote, Victoria Woodhull was nominated for president of the United States by the Equal Rights Party. Having begun her campaign in 1870, Woodhull earned favor among woman suffrage groups for her advocacy of women's rights, but her bid was ultimately rejected because she endorsed "free love"--- meaning that she believed women should have the freedom to choose who they wanted to marry and to divorce their husbands. After becoming the target of personal attacks, she published accusations of adultery against Reverend Henry Ward Beecher, which resulted in her arrest for distributing obscene materials. She spent election day in prison. She later moved with her children to England, where she married her third husband and remained active in the woman suffrage movement until her death in 1927. Woodhull had an eccentric personality and perhaps lived in the wrong century; in addition to running for president, she was also a clairvoyant, spiritualist, business owner, newspaper publisher, and one of the first female stockbrokers.



18 May 2004

On May 18, 2004, forty-year-old Arizona Diamondbacks' left-hander Randy Johnson became the oldest pitcher in major league history to throw a perfect game, leading his team to a 2-0 victory over the Atlanta Braves.

23 May 1934

On May 23, 1934, police officers gunned down Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker in an ambush near Sailes, Louisiana. Four policemen from Texas and two from Louisiana fired more than 10 rounds in two minutes. The coroner's report noted seventeen entrance wounds on Barrow's body and twenty-six on Parker's. Each lawman was armed with a shotgun, an automatic rifle, and pistols, and all weapons were fired.

26 May 1927

On May 26, 1927, Henry Ford drove the fifteen millionth Model T out of the factory, marking the automobile's official last day of production.

THE KENTUCKY DERBY

4 May 2024

The Kentucky Derby, first held in 1875 at Churchill Downs racetrack in Louisville, is the longest-running sports event in the United States. Dubbed the "Run for the Roses," the Derby features three-year-old thoroughbreds racing a distance of 1.25 miles. Today, over 150,000 spectators gather annually on the first Saturday in May at Churchill Downs for the Kentucky Derby, sometimes referred to as "the greatest two minutes in sports." Besides placing bets on horses, Derby fans are famous for drinking mint juleps, singing "Old Kentucky Home" and wearing flamboyant hats.

FIRST KENTUCKY DERBY

The Kentucky Derby was started by Meriwether Lewis Clark Jr., grandson of explorer William Clark, of Lewis and Clark Expedition fame. Clark, who was inspired by horse races he'd seen in Europe, raised the money to build Churchill Downs on land donated by his uncles.

In 1872, Clark traveled to Europe, where he visited leading horse-racing sites in England and France. He was inspired by England's Epsom Downs racecourse, home since 1780 of the Derby Stakes, a 1.5-mile race for three-year-old horses organized by the 12th earl of Derby and his friends.

Clark returned home to Kentucky, founded the Louisville Jockey Club and raised money to construct a racetrack on land donated by his uncles, Henry and John Churchill. Famed for throwing extravagant parties, Clark envisioned his racetrack as a place where the city's stylish residents would gather.

On May 17, 1875, some 10,000 people attended the first Kentucky Derby, which featured a field of 15 three-year-old thoroughbreds racing 1.5 miles. The winning horse, Aristides, finished with a time of 2:37.75 and was ridden by Oliver Lewis, an African-American jockey.



EVOLUTION OF THE DERBY

Thirteen of the fifteen jockeys in the inaugural Derby were black, and black riders played a dominant role in the race's early years. Between 1875 and 1902, eleven black jockeys rode 15 of the winning horses.

However, by the early 20th century, prejudice and jealousy of these jockeys' success resulted in African-American riders largely disappearing from horse racing. Jimmy Winkfield, the last black jockey to win the Derby, did so in 1901 and 1902.

Another change to the Derby that occurred in its early years was the shortening of the race. In 1896, following complaints by some members of the racing community that the distance was too long, the event was reduced from 1.5 miles to 1.25 miles, the length it remains today.

COLONEL MATT WINN

In 1902, a new management team took over Churchill Downs that included Martin "Matt" Winn, a Louisville native and larger-than-life promoter who was instrumental in transforming the Derby from a local event into America's most iconic horse race.

In 1908, Winn, who eventually started using the honorary title "colonel," played a key role in introducing a new system of placing bets at Churchill Downs, replacing human bookmakers with French pari-mutuel machines, a move that proved popular with race fans.

Winn also started the publicity-generating practice of inviting celebrities to the Derby, and advocated broadcasting the race on the radio, something other racing executives thought would hurt attendance numbers.

In 1925, the Derby aired on network radio for the first time; and afterward, attendance continued to grow. 1949 marked the first year the Derby was locally televised. Three years later, in 1952, the Kentucky Derby made its debut on national TV.

HORSES AND JOCKEYS

In 1973, Secretariat became the fastest Derby winner in history with a time of 1:59.40, a record that still stands.

Three years earlier, in 1970, Diane Crump became the first female jockey to ride in the Derby; she finished 15th in a field of 17 horses. Crump also broke ground in 1969, when she became the first woman to ride in a pari-mutuel race in North America, at Hialeah Park in Florida.

In 1986, 54-year-old Bill Shoemaker broke ground in a different way by becoming the oldest jockey to win the Derby.

TRIPLE CROWN

The first horse to win racing's prestigious Triple Crown—by winning the Kentucky Derby, the Preakness Stakes, and the Belmont Stakes—was Sir Barton in 1919, although it wasn't until the 1930s that the three races were widely known by that term.

In 1968, Dancer's Image became the first Derby winner to be barred from receiving prize money after testing positive for a banned medication following the race.

To qualify to ride in the Derby, a horse must compete in designated prep races at a series of tracks. The top four finishers in each race receive points, and the 20 horses who accumulate the most points are eligible to enter the Derby.

In 2023, the guaranteed prize money for the Derby was \$3 million, which was divided among the top five finishers as follows:

1st Place - \$1.86M (10% or \$186,000 went to the jockey)

2nd Place – \$600K (5% or \$30,000 went to the iockey)

3rd Place - \$300K (5% or \$15,000 went to the jockey)

4th Place - \$150K (\$4,500 went to the jockey) 5th Place - \$90,000 (\$2,500 went to the jockey)



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KENTUCKY DERBY TRADITIONS

The Derby is steeped in tradition, including some, such as mint juleps and "My Old Kentucky Home," that link the race to a romanticized version of the Old South.

When the horses parade onto the dirt track before the start of the race, the crowd sings along to the 19th century ballad "My Old Kentucky Home" by composer Stephen Foster. According to some accounts, the song was first played at the Derby in 1921.

The mint julep—a drink that originated in the South and is made with bourbon, sugar, mint, and crushed ice—has been a Derby tradition for nearly a century.

RUN FOR THE ROSES

Roses are another longtime Derby tradition. In 1884, Meriwether Clark started the practice of giving the winning jockey a bouquet of roses.

In 1925, a New York sports columnist nicknamed the Derby the "Run for the Roses." Since the early 1930s, it's been customary to place a large garland of roses over the winning horse.

Fashion has been a part of the Derby since its inception, thanks to founder Clark, who wanted to improve the image of American racetracks and attract an upscale crowd to Churchill Downs.

In the 1960s, spurred on in part by the presence of TV cameras at the Kentucky Derby, both male and female Derby-goers started the tradition of sporting fancy hats on race day.

ITALY IN MAY HOLIDAYS AND FESTIVALS

May 1: Festa del Lavoro (Labor Day)



Energized beats at II Concertone, Rome's Labor Day heart

Festa del Lavoro, celebrated every May 1 in Italy, is more than just a public holiday. It's a day of reflection and recognition for the tireless efforts of workers and the invaluable contributions of the labor union movement.

A signature event on this day is the "Concertone" in Rome's Piazza San Giovanni in Laterano. Orchestrated by Italy's leading trade unions – CGIL, CISL, and UIL – this mega concert becomes the day's highlight for many, drawing large crowds eager to catch performances from top-charting and up-and-coming artists.

Beyond Rome, the spirit of the day resonates across the country. In industrialized cities like Milan and Turin, marches and parades championing workers' rights are commonplace.

May 1: Saint Ephysius Festival (Sardinia)

This festival remembers the miracle of 1656, where Saint Ephysius emerged as a beacon of hope amidst a devastating plague in Cagliari. This cherished event, deeply rooted in Sardinian tradition, connects several villages on the island, each buzzing with months of anticipation and meticulous preparations.

A sight that always captures the heart is the parade of authentic Sardinian costumes. Every attire tells a story, symbolizing the region's heritage and pride.

SPAM

Despite this apparent unpopularity, SPAM has been a cupboard staple in Britain since 1941, after originating in Minnesota, USA (Austin Minnesota is known as Spam Town USA). But did you know that the word SPAM is a portmanteau or a blend of words?

So, if you're unfamiliar, SPAM is a processed meat, found in tinned cans and it can be eaten hot or cold. It's made up of ground pork and processed ham, combined with preservatives and flavoring agents such as sugar, salt, potato starch and sodium nitrite and then closed and vacuum sealed.

SPAM was introduced in 1937 by the food company *Hormel* and due to the ease and the preservatives, it became essential to soldiers in the US and later the UK. Margaret Thatcher later described it as a "wartime delicacy" as it was included in food rations to families.

It tends to be quite a polarizing food but despite that, it has soared in popularity with over nine billion units being sold since it started all of those years ago, so, love it or hate it, it clearly has a place in many people's hearts and cupboards.

So, what does SPAM actually stand for? Some social media users have weighed in on this with one saying that she thought it was an acronym for "Shoulder Pork and Meat," while another suggested that it was an acronym for "Smoked Plastic and Meat". But the answer is a little more interesting and a little less funny than the social media user's guesses.

The word SPAM is actually a blend of the words "spiced ham"...! The name was dreamt up by the brother of a Hormel executive during a naming contest.
