

# Did you know?.....

So Fay Osborne was a prime benefactor of the Sunapee Historical Society. But what else did he do? Do you enjoy the convenience of brewing your tea packaged in paper tea bags? Fay was a Sunapee boy who became a chemical engineer at the C.H. Dexter Company in Windsor Locks, CT and is credited with developing the process to make long-fiber paper used to hold single-servings of tea inexpensively but effectively. Here's the story!

Fay graduated from Colby Academy in New London and began college at Dartmouth but transferred to MIT. In the summer, he piloted the Kearsarge and Ascutney steamboats around Lake Sunapee. During that time, Elsie Young, an Osborne family friend and housekeeper to A. D. Dexter at his summer residence in Sunapee, suggested to Fay that perhaps he could find a job at C.H. Dexter and Sons, a paper manufacturer in Windsor Locks, Connecticut. Fay had long been fascinated with paper-making, having observed the process frequently at the Emerson paper mill in Wendell, and thought she had a good idea. So he talked with A. D., was hired, and after graduating from MIT, began work in 1922 as a third hand at the rate of \$17 for a 48-hour, six-day week.

At his retirement 40 years later, the company presented Fay with a book illustrated with original paintings that outline his professional progress through the years and praise his hard-work, dedication, and all that he brought to the company. We have recently been given this book by Wayne Osborne and draw heavily on it as well as on a book written by Fay, *The History of Dexter's Long Fiber Paper Development*, to tell you the rest of the story.

During his first years at Dexter's, Fay had to win over the entrenched employees while trying to add some science to the process.

He would work a normal 8-hour day and then spend 4 more hours setting up his lab and developing tests for quality control and more. After about 5 years of thoroughly learning the business of paper making and applying his technical expertise, Fay was ready for more when he came across a box of cigars, each wrapped in a special tissue paper that was soft, strong, and flexible. Research showed him that it was hand-made in Japan from unusually long fibers at great expense. Thus began the search for an automated process to produce similar papers that would end up useful in many applications, from anti-tarnish paper to meat casings and coffee filters, and most notably tea bags. In 1936, Fay was granted 2 patents for his long fiber process. But that wasn't the end of Fay's research. The company was nearly scuttled by the Great Depression (it was saved by selling the patent to a British firm), and then WW II cut off the supply of fiber from the Philippines extending the research to a synthetic fiber (viscose) with the proper porosity and wet strength for "Victory Tea Bags" (patent granted in 1949). Then came Fay's development of a heat-sealable paper made of hemp and thermoplastic fibers and a patent issued in 1947.

Fay was also involved in marketing. After developing a product that he thought a company needed, he would visit the company and work with it to tailor it more precisely to their application. He was credited with perseverance, independence, and optimism as the keys to his success. After starting as a third hand, he retired from the company in 1962 as senior vice president and had been awarded at least 8 patents.


In retirement, Fay was able once again to spend more time in Sunapee. We will be forever grateful to Fay for the vision he exercised in buying his cousins' shares in the Flanders Osborne Stable and presenting the building to the Sunapee Historical Society to be used as our museum. In accordance with his wishes, we have kept the suggestion of horse stalls in place and left the horses' names on the rafters. We hope he would have been proud of all we've done at the Museum!


